

**‘BARANGAROO’
NEW YEAR’S EVE FIREWORKS VIEWING AREA**

Friday 31st December, 2010

ALCOHOL MANAGEMENT PLAN

- 1) The function is part of the City of Sydney New Year’s Eve celebration and is open to the public. The previous event in 2009 was predominantly attended by family groups.
- 2) Tickets to the event will be pre-sold via Ticketek. A small number of tickets may be available for purchase at the door.
- 3) The event is under the authority of the NSW Dept of Planning and is being produced by the Barangaroo Delivery Authority. It will be held at the North-West end of the Barangaroo precinct which will provide an unsurpassed view of the NYE fireworks display.
- 4) The event will be fenced and a Licensed Security company will be engaged by the Authority for the duration of the event. Hours of operation of the event are from 6.00pm on 31st December until 12.30am on 1st January.
- 5) BYO alcohol will not be permitted into the event.
- 6) In order to properly cater for patrons, the producers will allow for a licensed area to operate within the event site.
- 7) The licensed bar area will be surrounded by a defining barrier constructed of ‘pool style’ fencing. Entry/exit points to the licensed areas will be manned by static security guards.
- 8) Alcohol may be purchased from the bar for consumption within the licensed area but will not be permitted to be removed into the general public area.
- 9) Patrons who wish to purchase alcohol will, if required, need to show proper ‘Proof of Age’ identification to security at the entrance to the licensed area. If satisfied that the patron meets the age test, security will then issue a colour coded wristband which will permit entry to the bar area.
- 10) Patrons who appear to be under the age of 23 and who do not have acceptable proof-of-age may be refused entry to the bar area.
- 11) There will be clear and visible signage at the entrance to the venue indicating that alcohol may only be consumed in the licensed area. This signage will also inform the public that the provision of alcohol to a minor is an offence and people caught engaging in such behaviour may be subject to police action and that they may also be evicted from the event.
- 12) The signage will also indicate that any minor found consuming alcohol may also be evicted from the event.
- 13) Persons entering the venue will be checked by licensed security personnel to ensure that no alcohol, illegal objects or substances are brought into the venue.
- 14) Security personnel will be stationed at the bar for the duration of the event. Security will adhere to the R.S.A. guidelines and will ensure the good order of the bar area.
- 15) Any patron wishing to purchase alcoholic beverages will enter the bars via a raceway queuing system. Security staff will be stationed at the entry to the races to enable proper assessment of patrons prior to entering the bar service area.

- 16) All security staff positioned within the licensed areas will have undergone a module in Responsible Service of Alcohol.
- 17) Security personnel will also be required to patrol the general public areas to enforce RSA guidelines.
- 18) All bars will display the prescribed Harm Minimisation/R.S.A. signage. Signage will also be displayed at the entrance to the licensed premises/areas.
- 19) Products sold at the bar will include bottled wine and champagne. All bottles sold will include a \$10.00 refundable deposit to ensure that these containers are returned to the bar. Other products will include a range of mid-strength beers, pre-mixed mid-strength spirit cans and an assortment of spirits. Any spirit poured will be restricted to a maximum 30ml nip (1 standard drink) and served in either a 330ml or 425 ml cup. Mixers such as soft drink, juice, energy drink will be added and the drink topped with ice which will ensure that these products do not exceed 4% alcohol by volume.
- 20) The licensee will ensure that all serving bar staff will be R.S.A. trained.
- 21) Aside from bottled wine and champagne sold under the deposit system, there will be no other glass sold to the public.
- 22) A maximum of 4 alcoholic drinks (or 1 x bottle of wine) per person will be sold at any one time.
- 23) All beverages will be opened to avoid stockpiling.
- 24) Low alcoholic and non-alcoholic beverages will be available at bars.
- 25) High alcohol by volume pre-mixed drinks, doubles or shots will not be sold.
- 26) Free water will be available at all bars.
- 27) Water and soft drink will also be available from food catering outlets situated throughout the site.
- 28) If any patron is identified by bar staff as approaching an irresponsible level of intoxication, staff will firstly refuse service of alcohol and will then refer the person to the Bar Manager. Any person deemed by Bar Management or security to be unduly intoxicated or affected by other substances will, subject to Duty of Care responsibilities, be removed from the licensed premises.
- 29) The bars will close at least one half-hour prior to the close of the event in order to ensure the orderly departure of patrons. This time will be 12.00 midnight.
