**Director-General's Requirements
Integra Underground Coal Project

The Department has received your application for the Integra Underground Coal Project.

I have attached a copy of the Director-General's requirements for the project. These requirements have been prepared in consultation with the relevant agencies, and are based on the information you have provided to date. I have also attached a copy of the agencies' comments for your information.

Please note that the Director-General may alter these requirements at any time.

As you are aware, the Department prefers mines such as the Integra underground mining operations to operate under a single, modern planning approval. Consequently, you are encouraged to incorporate your approved mining operations into the project, and in time surrender the various planning approvals for these mining operations.

If your proposal is likely to have a significant impact on matters of National Environmental Significance, it will require an approval under the Commonwealth *Environment Protection Biodiversity Conservation Act 1999* (EPBC Act). This approval is in addition to any approvals required under NSW legislation. It is your responsibility to contact the Department of Environment, Water, Heritage and the Arts in Canberra (6274 1111 or <http://www.environment.gov.au>) to determine if the proposal requires an approval under the EPBC Act. The Commonwealth Government has accredited the NSW environmental assessment process, so if it is determined that an approval is required under the EPBC Act, please contact me immediately as supplementary Director-General's requirements may need to be issued.

I would appreciate it if you would contact the Department at least two weeks before you propose to submit your Environmental Assessment for the project. This will enable the Department to determine the:

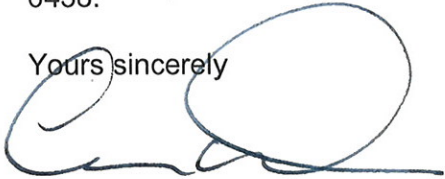
- applicable fee (see Division 1A, Part 15 of the Environmental Planning and Assessment Regulation 2000);
- consultation and public exhibition arrangements; and
- number of copies (hard-copy and CD-ROM) of the Environmental Assessment that will be required for exhibition purposes.

Once it receives the Environmental Assessment, the Department will review it in consultation with the relevant agencies to determine if it adequately addresses the Director-General's requirements, and may require you to revise it prior to public exhibition.

The Department is required to make all the relevant information associated with the project publicly available on its website. Consequently, I would appreciate it if you would ensure that all the documents you subsequently submit to the Department are in a suitable format for the web, and arrange for an electronic version of the Environmental Assessment to be hosted on a suitable website.

Project	The Integra Underground Coal Project, which includes: • extracting up to 70 million tonnes of run-of-mine coal from the Barret and Hebden coal seams using longwall mining methods at a rate of up to 4.5 million tonnes of coal a year; • carrying out cut and flit mining operations within the Middle Liddle, Hebden and Barrett seams; • upgrading and using the existing infrastructure at the mine to process, handle, and store this coal; • transporting product coal to domestic and export markets by rail; • disposing of coal rejects on site; and • rehabilitating the site.

General Requirements	The Environmental Assessment of the project must include: • an executive summary; • a detailed description of the following within the Integra mining complex and any associated reject disposal areas: - historical mining operations; - existing and approved mining operations/facilities, including any statutory approvals that apply to these operations/facilities; and - the existing environmental management and monitoring regime; • a detailed description of the project, including the: - need for the project; - alternatives considered, including a justification for the proposed mine plan and coal rejects disposal strategy; - likely staging of the project; - likely interactions between the proposed open cut and underground mining operations on site; and - plans of any proposed building works; • a risk assessment of the potential environmental impacts of the project, identifying the key issues for further assessment; • a detailed assessment of the key issues specified below, and any other significant issues identified in the risk assessment (see above), which includes: - a description of the existing environment, using sufficient baseline data; - an assessment of the potential impacts of all stages of the project, including any cumulative impacts that may arise from the combined operation of the project with any other existing, approved, or proposed mining operations in the region, taking into consideration any relevant statutory provisions, and technical or policy guidelines (see below); - a description of the measures that would be implemented to avoid, minimise, mitigate, rehabilitate/remediate, monitor and/or offset the potential impacts of the project, including detailed contingency plans for managing any potentially significant risks to the environment; • a statement of commitments, outlining all the proposed environmental management and monitoring measures; • a conclusion justifying the project on economic, social and environmental grounds, taking into consideration whether the project is consistent with the objects of the <i>Environmental Planning & Assessment Act 1979</i>; • a signed statement from the author of the Environmental Assessment,

	certifying that the information contained within the document is neither false nor misleading.
Key Issues	• Subsidence – including: - accurate predictions of the potential subsidence effects of the proposed mine plan, and detailed sensitivity analysis of these predictions; and - a detailed assessment of the potential impacts of these subsidence effects on both the natural and built environment, paying particular attention to significant features of this environment; • Soil & Water – including: - a detailed assessment of the potential impacts of the project on the quantity, quality and long-term integrity of the surface and ground water resources in the project area, paying particular attention to all significant watercourses and their associated tributaries; - site water balance, a detailed description of the measures that would be implemented on site to minimise the project's water use; • Biodiversity – including: - accurate estimates of any vegetation clearing associated with the project; - a detailed assessment of the potential impacts of the project on any terrestrial and aquatic threatened species, populations, ecological communities or their habitats; and - a detailed description of the measures that would be implemented to maintain or improve the biodiversity values of the project area and surrounding region in the medium to long term; • Heritage – including the potential Aboriginal and non-Aboriginal heritage impacts of the project; • Noise – including the potential construction, operational and on-site and off-site road and rail noise and vibration impacts; • Air Quality; • Traffic – including a detailed assessment of the potential impacts of the project on the safety and performance of the road and rail network; • Greenhouse Gas – including: - a quantitative assessment of the potential scope 1, 2 and 3 greenhouse gas emissions of the project, and qualitative assessment of the potential impacts of these emissions on the environment; - consideration of the feasibility of options to minimise greenhouse gas emissions through the capture and reuse of coal seam gas; and - a detailed description of the measures that would be implemented on site to ensure that the project is energy efficient; • Waste – including: - accurate estimates of the quantity and nature of the potential waste streams of the project; - a detailed description of the measures that would be implemented to minimise, reuse, recycle and dispose of any waste produced on site, including the proposed coal reject disposal strategy; • Hazards – paying particular attention to public safety; • Visual; • Rehabilitation – including a detailed description of the proposed rehabilitation strategy, taking into consideration the proposed rehabilitation strategies of adjoining mines, the potential to integrate the rehabilitation of the mine with any biodiversity offset areas in the region, and any relevant strategic land use planning or resource management plans or policies; and • Social & Economic.
