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1. Introduction

1.1 Project description

Extent Heritage Pty Ltd (Extent Heritage) has been commissioned by John Holland CPB Joint Venture to prepare a Photographic Archival Recording and Salvage Report for 78 Lilyfield Road, Rozelle. The purpose of this report is to photographically record the current state of the site prior to its demolition, and to prepare a catalogue of historic building fabric for the purposes of salvage prior to the demolition of the building. This report serves as a permanent record of the place prior to that work being undertaken.

1.2 Approach and methodology

The methodology used in the preparation of this Photographic Archival Recording and Salvage Report is in accordance with the principles and definitions as set out in *The Burra Charter: The Australia ICOMOS Charter for Places of Cultural Significance*, 2013 (Burra Charter) (Australia ICOMOS 2013) and the latest version of the NSW Heritage Branch's Photographic Archival Recording guidelines.

This report has been prepared in accordance with the NSW Heritage Office How to Prepare Archival Records of Heritage Items (1998) and Photographic Recording of Heritage Items Using Film or Digital Capture (2006).



1.3 Limitations

The surrounding site, the building and the interior of the subject property were inspected and photographed by Corinne Softley, Gabrielle Harrington and Louise Radclyffe on the 17th and 24th April 2019. The inspection was undertaken as a visual study only.

The historical overview provides sufficient historical background to provide an understanding of the place in order to assess the significance and provide relevant recommendations, however, it is not intended as an exhaustive history of the site.

2. Site

2.1 Location

The subject property is located at 78 Lilyfield Road, Rozelle and is known as Lot 1 in DP 86948. 78 Lilyfield Road is located on the southwestern corner of Lilyfield Road at the intersection of Gordon Street in Rozelle. Rozelle is located between the suburbs of Lilyfield to the east and Balmain to the west and is crossed by Victoria Road.




Figure 3. Map showing 78 Lilyfield Road (Item No. 2 outlined in red) marked as on the SREP 26 Heritage Register (Source: RMS EIS 2018, p.32).



3. Historic context

78 Lilyfield Road, Rozelle is the site of a former Hotel that lies on part of 500 acres granted to William Balmain in 1800.¹ The Hotel was first established in 1876 as 'Flood's Hotel'. The first licensee was William Wilkinson who moved to Balmain after marrying the youngest daughter of James Flood, a dray proprietor and carpenter in the area. It appears the hotel was named after his father-in-law (*The Catholic Press* 24 December 1908, p.19). Wilkinson was born in Blackwell, London, and trained as a ship's engineer. He arrived in Sydney in 1866, after joining the Panama, New Zealand and Australian Royal Mail Company's steamer *Kia Kora* which carried the first mail from Sydney via Panama. Wilkinson owned the hotel until 1905 when William Joseph Hollin's took over the licence and the premises became known as 'Hollins Hotel'. Hollins had managed the premises next door, Alston Soap and Candle Co., for 12 years prior (*Balmain Observer and Western Suburbs Advertiser*, 10 June 1905, p. 4).

In 1919 the lease transferred to Annie Muller and in 1920 Hollins' Hotel became the Easton Park Hotel after a local alderman. From 1926, Toohey had freehold tenure over the building. There were many licensees from this period onwards. Those with an extended licensee to the property included Mary Ann Robinson (1926-1934), Henry T Hooworth (1934- c.1942). The hotel closed on 29 November 1957 when the licence was removed to "Liberty Plains" Hotel, Yagoona. The final licensee was Maurice Jerome Stevens. The property has not had a license since 1957 and therefore ceased business upon this time. Since this time, the building was split up as several apartments. More recently, squatters have taken up residence in the building.

Over its lifespan, the hotel has had a notable history of violence. In April 1915, Percy William McLeod was allegedly killed out the front of Hollin's Park Hotel after an apparent dispute over dominoes (*The Sun*, April 30 1915, p. 6). In 1884, a five-month-old child Mabel Murphy died in the Flood Hotel aged 5 months old. Her parents Peter and Kate Murphy lived at the Hotel at this time (*The Sydney Morning Herald* 1884, p.1).




Figure 4. Rozelle Street layout c. 1890 showing the intersection at Burt, Abattoir and Gordon Street with the subject site outlined in red (Source: Higinbotham and Robinson, Call No. SP/B2).




Figure 5. Subdivision plan showing the Flood's Hotel, date unknown (Source: State Library of New South Wales, call no. SP/B2).

4. Physical description

4.1 Exterior

78 Lilyfield Road is two-storey Victorian style pub, built in 1876. The building is constructed of brick with a smooth rendered finish and was built to address the corner of Lilyfield Road. The roof is flat, constructed of corrugated iron and has a corbelled parapet with decorative arched sections and spherical parapet urns. There is one chimney on the rear south-facing side. Decorative mouldings and corbelled label mouldings sit along the second storey of the building and the word 'Hotel' remains moulded into the northern and eastern elevations.

The building has both small and large timber double hung sash windows, with rendered brick sills. The exterior timber panelled door on the eastern façade is a later addition with timber frame and multi-paned coloured transom light, as well as a sidelight with letterbox. The door is covered by a corrugated iron door awning with timber supports. Decorative wall vents are visible on both storeys.

To the rear of the property is a concrete backyard with a single storey brick outbuilding that has three separate rooms entered by timber doors. The rear of the building contains a single double hung sash window with decorative grates.

The building has been significantly modified on the exterior, with any pre-existing timber elements related to the verandahs removed. The original door has been sealed by brick and the former trap door in the footpath on the corner of the building has been sealed over by a modern concrete footpath.

4.2 Interior

The interior of 78 Lilyfield Road retains some of its layout as a former hotel, though there are several new facilities such as bathrooms and kitchens, as well as non-structural walls, which were added over time. The original bar and bar entrance have been removed, and the area converted into three bedrooms.

Both the ground and first floors have long hallways running down the length of the building, which lead off to bedrooms. There are two kitchens, one on each floor and three bathrooms, two being located on the ground floor and the other on the first floor. There is a substantial timber staircase and balustrade between the ground and first floors. The staircase has a small timber panelled door that leads to a storage room underneath.

The building has timber floorboards which have been covered with carpet throughout, except in the ground floor kitchen. The rear entrance hallway has synthetic flooring with a parquetry pattern. The interior doors are timber framed and several are louvered or have a transom lights. Some doors on the first floor also have a locking mechanism and operating handle. The original ceiling is largely constructed of decorative pressed metal, though some rooms have plaster decorative ceilings as evidenced by the repair work. The majority of the building has its original skirting boards and some rooms still retain a picture rail. There are two cast iron fireplaces, located on the ground and first floors, with decorative tiling and mirrors. The ground floor



fireplace has a mantle constructed of marble inlay. There are also remnants of gas lighting fixtures to walls in some rooms.

Beneath the building is a cellar that has been constructed using undressed sandstone footings. The cellar is accessed through a timber cellar door located on the western side of the building, next to the kitchen on the ground floor.







6.4 Re-use of salvaged material

The below section has been prepared in fulfillment of Condition E165 which states:

Following archival recording as required by Condition E163, and prior to demolition, the Proponent must assess options for sympathetic reuse (including integrated heritage displays and interpretation) on the Project or other options for conservation, including architectural salvage for re-use in comparable buildings and displays.

Specifically, this section includes the following items:

- Identification of options and processes for dissemination of salvaged items to owners, community groups and interested parties; and
- Provision of sympathetic reuse options for heritage fabric, either within the WestConnex project or within the wider community.

6.4.1 Options for dissemination of salvaged fabric

There are numerous benefits with respect to disseminating salvaged items to owners, community groups and interested parties, including:

- Environmental Impacts associated with utilising reclaimed heritage building fabric is less than that of producing new building materials. This helps to retain the fabrics 'embodied energy', that is, the energy consumed by all the processes associated with the production of a building or particular building fabric (CSIRO 1997).
- Social Maintaining built fabric of architectural and historical value within the Rozelle and/or Inner West area helps to preserve the heritage character of these locations. Communities benefit from the protection of fabric, including the preservation of this fabric for future generations (Australian Government Department of Environment and Heritage 2004:4).
- Economic There are economic benefits from the salvage of heritage building fabric, including a reduced cost for owners of other listed heritage properties when given the opportunity to re-use salvaged items.

The building fabric catalogue (Section 6.2) provides a list of items considered to be salvageable. Post-salvage, there are several organisations that may be contacted to understand their interest in taking the elements for restoration and repair of similar buildings and/or for distribution to landowners. These can be found in the below table.

Where possible, salvaged building fabric should first be offered to members of the local community and/or considered for re-use within the project area prior to other interested parties (i.e. organisations dealing in the sale of salvaged material) being contacted.

6.4.2 Options for re-use of fabric

In addition to the dissemination of salvaged items to owners, community groups and interested parties, additional options include the sympathetic re-use of built heritage fabric within the project area for future heritage interpretation.

Utilising salvaged fabric from heritage buildings is an increasingly popular method of heritage interpretation for community sites. Re-use of heritage fabric in this way conveys a sense of dignity and respect for heritage places within the local community, and can help support in creating a 'sense of place'.

Interpretive elements may include:

- Original building fabric installed as-is, with accompanying signage providing contextual information about the fabric.
- Original building fabric re-used for functional purposes such as seating or retaining walls, or
- Original building fabric elements utilised as part of public community art projects.

The below table identifies elements from the building fabric catalogue in Section 6.2 that may be re-used for interpretation, and examples of how similar re-use opportunities have been undertaken in other areas.

It is understood that a Heritage Interpretation Strategy is being prepared for the Rozelle Interchange project (*WestConnex Stage 3 Rozelle Interchange Interpretation Strategy* in preparation by Extent Heritage). A catalogue of extant building fabric, which is not already disseminated to owners or community groups, should be included within the interpretation strategy to ensure that interpretation options are adequately addressed.

As the subject site will be demolished as part of the new Rozelle Interchange, the salvaged fabric will need to be moved to a new location, such as a park or community facility. It is recommended that re-use of building fabric for heritage interpretation be limited to the Rozelle and wider Inner West area.

6.5 Recommendations

6.5.1 Prior to Work

Contractors should be briefed about the Heritage Condition of Consent regarding the requirement to salvage materials. The elements that have been identified for salvage, and how these materials should be managed, should be listed in a catalogue of materials for salvage should be kept on site for reference at all times.

6.5.2 During Work

Hazardous Materials

- Any salvage material found to contain hazardous material (e.g. lead paint), should be managed in accordance with current hazardous materials legislation.
- Where reasonable and feasible, remediation of hazardous materials from significant salvage items should be undertaken in consultation with a Heritage Advisor.

Removal of Material

- All fabric should be removed carefully to ensure its condition is not compromised.
 - Extra care should be taken in the removal and storage of the fireplaces and associated tessellated tiles identified in this report to ensure that the condition of the fabric is not compromised.
 - Extra care should be taken in the removal and storage of pressed tin ceilings to ensure that the condition of the fabric is not compromised.
 - Extra care should be taken in the removal of window and door elements.
 Windows/doors and associated components (sleeves, sashes, architraves, etc) and hardware (locks, handles, stays, etc) should be removed as one piece, or labelled as part of a group/assemblage. All grouped elements should be kept together.
- Timber floorboards should be grouped by species, if relevant.
- Any non-decorative ceiling plaster (not including mouldings, cornices, ceiling roses, etc.)
 does not require salvage. This should be documented in photographs and a record of it
 provided to the Heritage Advisor.
- Should any timber flooring found to be of poor quality, the fabric does not require salvage. Where there is less than 50% of salvageable timber flooring material remaining (per room), it can be disposed. This should be documented in photographs and a record of it provided to the Heritage Advisor.



- The material associated with the staircase (stairs, balusters, balustrade, newell posts, and panelled timber around based of stairs) should be kept intact, or labelled and stored together.
- A Heritage Advisor should be notified if other potential original (and salvageable) building fabric, which has not been identified in the salvage report, is identified during works. A photograph of this item should be emailed to the Heritage Advisor for assessment of its salvage potential prior to disposal.
- If highly significant material will need to be physically impacted i.e. cut or damaged, in order to be salvaged, seek the advice of a heritage consultant on the most appropriate methodology to minimise the impact.

6.5.3 Storage

- All salvaged fabric should be stored in a dry, secure place after removal.
- Any corrosion on pressed metal ceiling tiles should be treated prior to storage.
- All items should be clearly labelled for storage with building, room, and element number (as applicable). It should also be labelled with the date of removal, and date of storage.
- Any material that is wet or mouldy should not be stored in a sealed wrapping. Only store completely dry materials as mould spores can transfer to other materials.
- Do not store any materials that appears to have evidence of pest infestation (such as borer holes, termite frass, etc) should be disposed unless highly significant. Highly significant material suffering insect infestation should be treated prior to storage.
- The condition of the material should be inspected for mould, insect activity or other damage every 3 month.

6.5.4 Dissemination and reuse of salvaged material

- The recommendations outlined in Section 6.4 of this report and presented in the figure below should be followed.
- A list of salvaged fabric should be included within the Heritage Interpretation Strategy (in.
 preparation by Extent Heritage) to ensure that interpretation options are adequately
 addressed as part of the Rozelle Interchange project.

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




Figure 20. Ground Floor Plan 78 Lilyfield Road Rozelle, (architectural drawings by the Archivist).

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
Drawing: Upper Floor Plan 78 Lilyfield Road



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
