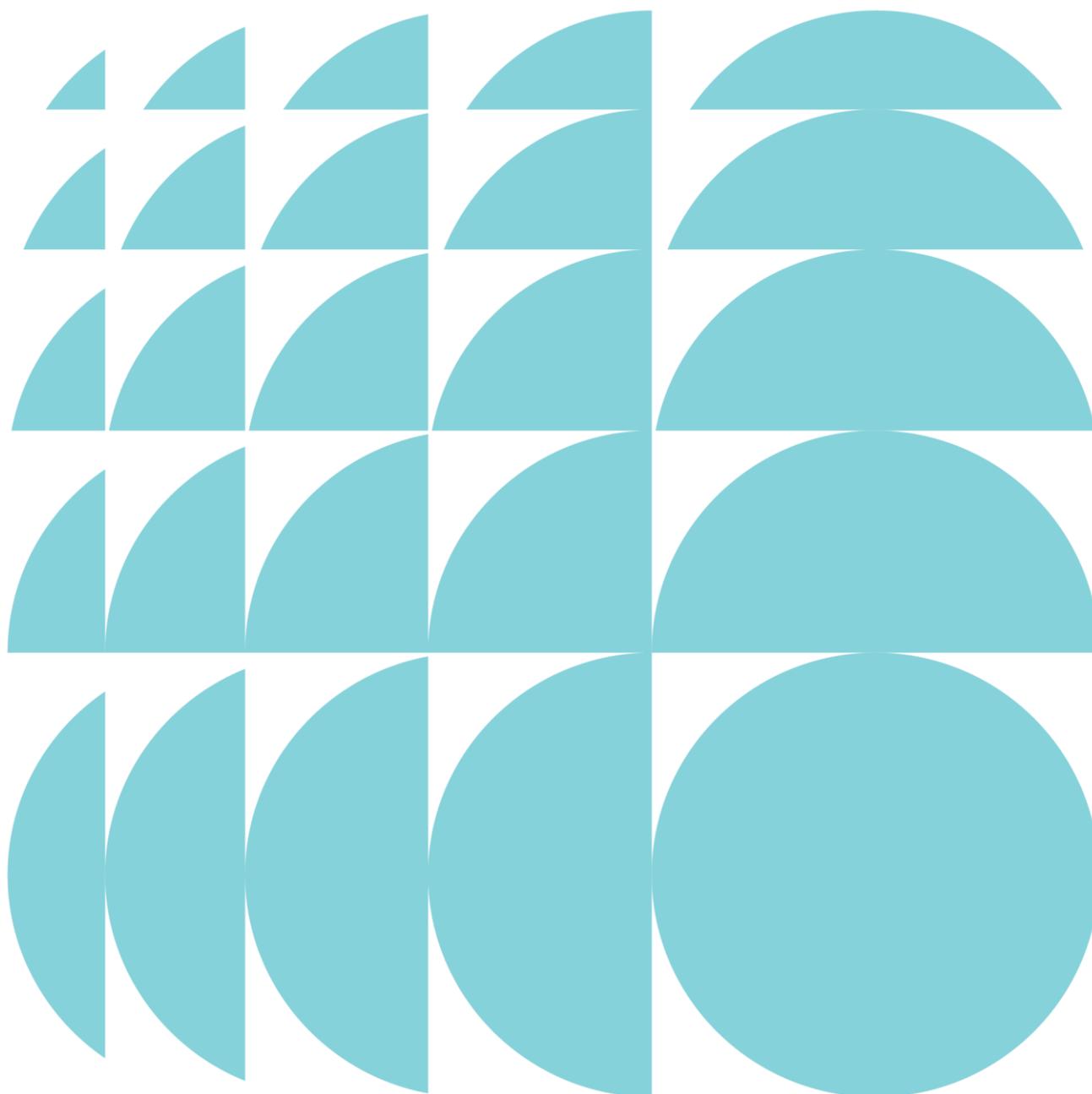

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1.0 Executive Summary

This Consultation Outcomes Report has been prepared by Ethos Urban on behalf of Cricket NSW to outline the communication and stakeholder engagement undertaken and present feedback received during the preparation of the State Significant Development Application for the Cricket NSW Cricket Centre (CNSWCC). In undertaking this consultation, full consideration has been given to the NSW Department of Planning and Environment's Secretary's Environmental Assessment Requirements (SEARs).

This report supports a State Significant Development (SSD) Development Application (DA) for the redevelopment of the Wilson Park, Sydney Olympic Park for the purpose of a Cricket Centre, which is submitted to the Minister for Planning pursuant to Part 4 of the *Environmental Planning and Assessment Act 1979* (EP&A Act).

of the NSW Department of Planning, Industry and Environment's SEARs request that a communication and stakeholder engagement program is undertaken to ensure close communication with key stakeholders who may be affected by the project.

The purpose of this consultation process was to ensure that all stakeholders were informed about the proposed development and had an opportunity to provide feedback prior to the lodgement of the SSD DA.

A proactive and strategic approach to the communications and stakeholder engagement was undertaken. In delivering this approach, the engagement was designed to be:

- Accessible;
- Timely;
- Respectful, genuine and constructive;
- Inclusive; and
- Informative.

A community information session was held at Wilson Park on Saturday, 28 September 2019. The majority of the feedback received was positive in nature with a small number of concerns relating to:

- Design and operations of the new facility; and
- Traffic and parking.

Throughout this process, Cricket NSW has worked closely with all stakeholders to ensure everyone has been provided with ample opportunity to participate prior to lodgement of the SSDA.

2.0 Introduction

This consultation summary report has been prepared by Ethos Urban on behalf of Cricket NSW, to outline the key issues raised by the local community and stakeholders during the preparation of the Cricket NSW Cricket Centre (CNSWCC).

As the proposal is for the purposes of development within Sydney Olympic Park that is an identified site under Schedule 2 of *State Environmental Planning Policy (State and Regional Development) 2011* and has a capital investment value (CIV) in excess of \$10 million, it is State Significant Development (SSD) pursuant to the EP&A Act.

A request for the Secretary's Environmental Assessment Requirements (SEARs) was made on 24 June 2019 and the SEARs were issued on 23 July 2019 and amended SEARs were issued on 20 September 2019. This submission has been prepared in accordance with the Department's guidelines for SSD applications lodged under Part 4 of the EP&A Act and addresses the matters identified in the SEARs.

Cricket NSW is the proponent of the Stage 2 SSD DA.

2.1 Background

The site is located at Wilson Park, in the suburb of Sydney Olympic Park, within the Parramatta Local Government Area (LGA) and is situated at the north western corner of the Sydney Olympic Park (SOP) precinct.

The site is located in proximity to a number of regionally significant facilities and amenities including the Olympic Park Railway Station, ANZ Stadium, Qudos Bank Arena and Sydney Showground, which are all approximately 2.5km south east of the site. Further to this, the site is located approximately 2km west of Wentworth Point. An aerial image of the site is shown in **Figure 1**.

2.2 Overview of Proposed Development

Given the redevelopment and concomitant closure of Sydney Football Stadium and its associated cricket training facilities, Cricket NSW (CNSW) decided to relocate its facilities to Sydney Olympic Park. This State Significant Development Application (SSDA) seeks consent for the detailed design, construction and operation of a new Cricket NSW Cricket Centre (CNSWCC) in Sydney Olympic Park.

The SSDA includes:

- A two storey cricket centre, including an internal atrium, gymnasium, community facilities, sports science and sports medicine facilities and business offices;
- An International Cricket Council compliant oval 136m long x 144m wide (16,040m²)(Oval 1) and associated seating;
- A second oval (Oval 2) that complies with the Cricket Australia community guidelines for community club cricket (with a minimum diameter of 100m (6365m²);
- Outdoor practice nets, 71 wickets with a minimum of 30m run ups;
- A double height (10.7m) indoor training facility with 15 wickets;
- A single storey shed for machinery and storage;
- Associated car parking, landscaping and public domain works; and
- Extension and augmentation of services and infrastructure as required.

The Cricket NSW Centre of Excellence will comprise a state-of-the-art, dedicated, year-round cricket, training and administration facility that services both regional and metropolitan cricketers, as well as providing facilities for community use to support sport, social, health and educational programs. The overall project timeframe is centred on the delivery of a completed project and the opening of the facility by 2022.

3.0 Consultation Overview

3.1 Consultation Approach

Ethos Urban's approach was based on extensive experience designing and delivering strategic communication and consultation processes for a variety of similar projects across Sydney.

The consultation program was designed to be practical and effective in capturing valuable feedback, mitigating risks, and highlighting key benefits of the project. The transparent and comprehensive engagement process was:

- **Accessible** –consultation sessions were held on the site as it is a central location to local interested stakeholders;
- **Timely** – occurred throughout the planning process to provide the community and stakeholders with the opportunity to provide important feedback at key milestones.
- **Respectful, genuine and constructive** – Cricket NSW is committed to contributing positively to the local community and working closely with all stakeholders to ensure the best outcomes for everyone; and
- **Inclusive** – groups such as nearby businesses, neighbours and the local community were strategically targeted.
- **Informative** – educated the community about the background to the project and benefits of the project, as clearly demonstrating when and how they can have a say on the proposal.

3.2 Letterbox Drop

A flyer was delivered to surrounding residents and landowners on Tuesday, 17 September to provide local stakeholders with information about the proposed development. The postcard also invited those interested to attend a community information session where they would be able to meet the project team and ask questions about the proposed development. A copy of the flyer can be found in **Appendix A** and a map of the distribution range can be found in **Appendix B**.

3.3 Community Information Session

The community information session was held on Saturday, 28 September at Wilson Park from 9am – 12pm. The project team included representatives from Ethos Urban (Planning), COX (Architecture), and Waypoint and MostynCopper (proponent) spoke with 18 interested stakeholders who attended the information session. A copy of the display boards can be found in **Appendix C**.

3.4 Agency Feedback

The following stakeholders were invited to provide comment on the proposal and attend a meeting with the project team. The letter was issued on Monday, 16 September 2019 and a copy of this letter can be found in **Appendix D**. Letters were sent to the following agencies:

3.5 Primary existing users of Wilson Park

Wilson Park is the home ground to the Newington Gunners Football Club, used for training and game-day operations. The Sydney Olympic Park Authority and City of Paramatta Council being the landowners and primary government authority over the land use, have led consultation with the football club to come to an agreement that will accommodate their future needs and operations.

It has been agreed that Paramatta City FC have agreed to share Eric Primrose Reserve with the Newington Gunners for the 2020 Winter season. Council are currently investigating the redevelopment of Newington Reserve, which is expected to be complete in time for the 2021 Winter Season. The redeveloped reserve would then be made available as the home ground of the Newington Gunners Football Club. The Sydney Olympic Park Authority and Council will continue to work in consultation with the Newington Gunners to continue to accommodate their needs, including finding new parks in the area should their operations overspill from Eric Primrose Reserve.



Community Information Session

4.0 Summary of feedback received

The section below provides a summary of the feedback received to date as a result of community and stakeholder consultation activity.

4.1 Community Feedback

Feedback was received at the information session for the development of the CNSWCC.

Community sentiment was largely supportive as people were impressed by the design and excited to have a cricket facility at Wilson Park. Most members of the community were regular users of the bike path and were pleased to hear it will not be impacted by the proposal.

Issues related mostly to traffic and parking impacts and how it can be used by the wider community.

The table below details the discussions held at the information session.
