Reasons for decision

The following matters were taken into consideration in making this decision:

- the relevant matters listed in section 4.15 of the Act and the additional matters listed in the statutory context section of the Department's Assessment Report.
- the prescribed matters under the Environmental Planning and Assessment Regulation 2000.
- the objects of the Act.
- the considerations under s 7.14(2) and 7.16(3) of the Biodiversity Conservation Act 2016.
- all information submitted to the Department during the assessment of the development application.
- the findings and recommendations in the Department's Assessment Report.
- the views of the community about the project (see Attachment 1).

The findings and recommendations set out in the Department's Assessment Report were accepted and adopted as the reasons for making this decision.

The key reasons for granting consent to the development application are as follows:

- the project would provide a range of benefits for the region and the State as a whole, including capital
 investment in public health infrastructure, creation of 232 construction jobs and 418 new operational jobs,
 providing modern facilities that meet current standards for healthcare for the State and expansion of
 Liverpool Hospital in line with the vision for the precinct.
- the project is permissible with development consent, and is consistent with NSW Government policies, including Greater Sydney Commission's Greater Sydney Regional Plan 'A Metropolis of Three Cities', Transport for NSW's Future Transport Strategy 2056, Greater Sydney Commission's Western City District Plan, NSW's State Infrastructure Strategy 2018 – 2038 Building the Momentum and Greater Sydney Commission's Liverpool Area Place Strategy.
- the impacts on the community and the environment can be appropriately minimised, managed or offset to an acceptable level, in accordance with applicable NSW Government policies and standards in the Department's Assessment Report. The consent authority has included conditions to ensure: that Campbell Street shared zone is not approved; landscaping works, including canopy recovery are delivered in a timely manner; the Green Travel Plan is delivered to achieve a gradual modal shift away from private vehicle travel; associated car parking is completed before the hospital expansion is operational; noise mitigation is developed through design development to ensure noise targets are complied with; a historical archaeological program is prepared and implemented to manage the potential for resources on the site; and construction impacts are appropriately managed, including an out-of-hours protocol for the works to be undertaken outside standard construction hours.
- the community views have been considered and adequately addressed through the recommended conditions of consent.
- weighing all relevant considerations, the project is in the public interest.

Attachment 1 – Consideration of Community Views

The Department exhibited the Environmental Impact Statement for the project from 28 May 2020 until 24 June 2020 (28 days) and received nine submissions providing comments on the project.

The key issues raised by the community and considered in the Department's Assessment Report and by the decision maker include public domain and landscaping works, bicycle parking, construction impacts, car parking costs, local jobs and wayfinding. Other issues are addressed in detail in the Department's Assessment Report.
