Introduction

Report Overview

This Consultation Outcomes Report has been prepared to document community consultation undertaken to inform the State Significant Development (SSD) application for the proposed extension to the existing Northside Group Wentworthville Clinic.

Consultation outcomes have been used in the preparation of an environment assessment that responds to the Secretary's Environmental Assessment Requirements (SEARs), issued by the NSW Department of Planning, Industry and Environment (DPIE).

This report summarises the community engagement undertaken for this stage of the proposal by outlining:

- The planning requirements for consultation.
- The consultation process undertaken with the local community and stakeholders.
- A summary of feedback received, and issues raised.
- How feedback has been considered in the development of the SSD application.

Proposal Summary

An extension to the existing Northside Group Wentworthville Clinic is being planned to support the mental health and wellbeing of young people in the local community.

Plans are for a dedicated Adolescent and Young Adult Mental Health Service to provide inpatient care and day programs to young people aged 14 to 25 years old.

This would build on the Clinic's adult programs, extending the services it has been offering to the people of Western Sydney since 2002.

Community and Stakeholder Engagement

Purpose

The purpose of the community and stakeholder engagement approach adopted for this proposal is to support a positive planning outcome for the community and stakeholders from the development.

Engagement Objectives

- Identify community and stakeholders with an interest in the proposal or who may be impacted by the proposal.
- Inform the community and stakeholders of the proposal to raise awareness and understanding.
- Create opportunities for community and stakeholders to engage with the project team, ask questions and provide feedback.
- Capture feedback and share community and stakeholder insights with the project team to help them better understand potential impacts and mitigate them wherever possible, and identify opportunities for better planning outcomes.
- Report back to the community about how their feedback has been used to inform the proposal.
- Satisfy all statutory and regulatory community consultation requirements.

Secretary's Environmental Assessment Requirements (SEARs)

The SSD application for this proposal will adhere to the SEARs, which states the following requirements in relation to consultation:

"During the preparation of the EIS, you must consult with the relevant local, State or Commonwealth Government authorities, service providers, community groups, relevant special interest groups, including local Aboriginal land councils and registered Aboriginal stakeholders and affected landowners. In particular, you must consult with:

- *the relevant Council.*
- *Government Architect NSW (through the NSW SDRP process)*
- *Transport for NSW.*

Consultation should commence as soon as practicable to inform the scope of investigation and progression of the proposed development.

The EIS must describe and include evidence of the consultation process and the issues raised and identify where the design of the development has been amended in response to these issues. Where amendments have not been made to address an issue, a short explanation should be provided.

Targeted consultation in accordance with the draft Social Impact Assessment Guideline 2020 (Department of Planning, Industry and Environment) must also occur where there is a requirement to prepare and submit a Social Impact Assessment."

Stakeholders

Stakeholders engaged for the purposes of this Consultation Outcomes Report were the local community, including residential and commercial neighbours.

Communication and Engagement Activities

The following range of communication and engagement activities have been implemented to ensure stakeholders are made aware of the proposal and have an opportunity to participate in the planning process:

- Information about the proposal and an invitation to the virtual community sessions was shared with the community through flyers that were letterbox dropped to 2,156 residential dwellings and 73 commercial premises surrounding the site.
- In addition to the letterbox dropped flyer, letters were delivered to adjacent neighbours offering them a one-on-one briefing by phone or videoconference.
- Media coverage in The Daily Telegraph.
- Virtual community sessions, in line with health advice relating to COVID-19, were delivered to:
 - + Provide information about the proposal, the planning process and feedback opportunities.
 - + Provide opportunity for community and stakeholders to meet the project team, discuss the proposal, share feedback, and ask questions.
 - + Invite follow-up feedback through feedback forms.
- A dedicated project email for the community and stakeholders to ask questions and provide feedback was available throughout the consultation phase.
- Opportunity to contact the project team via the Wentworthville Clinic phone number.
- Stakeholder meetings and briefings including telephone or videoconferencing discussions with individual and groups were offered.
- Stakeholder correspondence by email to individuals and groups, including provision of an information sheet.
- Updates to the community and stakeholders as the proposal progresses through the planning process, including reporting back to the community and stakeholders on issues raised and how the project team has responded.



Engagement Outcomes

Three local residents responded to the invitation to participate in the virtual community sessions, with two residents participating in online sessions and the third resident participating in a phone conference as per their preference.

Engagement identified key issues of community interest to inform the State Significant Development (SSD) application.

Key issues that emerged from the feedback and the project response are described below.



Teens thrown a lifeline

WESTERN Sydney will get its own teen mental health clinic under a \$31 million plan developed to address growing psychological distress among young people in the region.

The new inpatient facility, devised by private healthcare provider Northside, is slated for Wentworthville and will provide care for 41 young people aged 14 to 25.

It will offer programs for those suffering major depressive episodes and other diseases including anorexia.

Northside group child psychiatrist Dr John Kasinathan said teenagers today were facing a unique set of pressures.

And while public hospitals could deal with the most extreme and life threatening psychiatric illnesses, Dr Kasinathan said services were lacking in the middle ground.

"We have seen a rise in the last decade in eating disorders particularly affecting adolescents, and the age of onset of eating disorders appears to be getting lower and that's probably due to the influence of media and things like TikTok," he said.

"Boys tend to become more oppositional at school, they tend to cause more problems in terms of disruptive behaviours and get into substance abuse."

Northside Group CEO Anne Mortimer said unfortunately demand for teenage mental health treatment programs was very strong.

"When we opened the new adolescent program (in St Leonards) in July it was full almost within two days, we knew it was not good but we were quite surprised at the huge demand," she said.

High school students aged 12 to 17 in the southwest and western Sydney local health districts are the most depressed in the state according to the latest NSW Health data from 2017.

The clinic is expected to open in 2023 and Ms Mortimer unfortunately expects the mental health situation for young people to worsen before it gets better due to lockdowns and school closures.

A design that will maintain local amenity

The proposed design considers the need for additional mental health services in the community alongside the importance of maintaining amenity for surrounding properties and the local neighbourhood.

The three-storey extension would be a seamless addition to the existing building.

The extension is positioned mostly above the existing car parking area, with the building footprint extending slightly to the south and west.


The extension has been carefully designed to mitigate visual and solar impacts to surrounding properties and the adjacent park.

From Lytton Street, there would be minimal change to the appearance of the existing building. The extension will be visible from the reserve along Finlaysons Creek and Ernest Quinn Village Green, though it will be largely screened with semi-mature trees and high quality landscaping.


New lighting will be added to improve surrounding amenity.

To make way for the extension, a small number of trees will need to be removed, though each of these (and more) will be replaced in key locations around the new extension to maintain privacy for neighbours and improve amenity of the area.

There will be no change to the amount of sunlight reaching the reserve along Finlaysons Creek.

Low traffic impact and extra parking

A comprehensive planning process

This proposal is being assessed as a State Significant Development. This means a development application will be lodged with the Department of Planning, Industry and Environment. Cumberland Council is a key stakeholder in the process.

The next step in the planning process involves submitting a State Significant Development (SSD) application to the Department.

The application will contain contains specialist studies, which are an important part of the planning process and provide information to decision makers about the economic, environmental and social impacts of the project.

The specialist studies consider matters such as traffic, noise, operations, and construction management. They help the community, government agencies and the consent authority to make informed submissions or decisions on the merits of the project.

Community engagement is a valued part of the process and we welcome your comments.
