RE: The Narrabri Gas Project EIS.

I submit this document to you in order to state my strong objections to the above-named project, which I believe should be rejected for a variety of reasons.

The project will see over 35 billion litres of salt laden groundwater extracted from the land, much of which will be released within the first 5 years of its operation. This water will be treated and will generate almost 500,000 tonnes of salt waste, for which there is currently no safe disposal plan in place. In addition, it will necessitate drilling through a recharge aquifer of the Great Artesian Basin and drawing water from a naturally available resource relied upon by rural communities across western NSW. This drilling will result in methane gas being emitted in large quantities from related mining activities including venting and leakage, significantly increasing the already devastating impact of climate change throughout the state. It will place the region's agricultural industries at risk and cause airborne pollution that will make if difficult if not impossible for the internationally renowned Siding Spring Observatory to continue its current operations due to decreased visibility. The impact it will have on the nearby community of Narrabri will also be economically and socially devastating.

Nearly 1000 hectares of the Pilliga Forest will be affected by this project, fragmenting the largest temperate woodland in NSW which is currently home to some of its most unique native flora and wildlife. The region's indigenous community — particularly this land's traditional owners the Gamilaraay people — will also be significantly affected as the project threatens to destroy most if not all of its remaining spiritual and cultural heritage.

The project is not justifiable on economic grounds, given that Santos' coal seam gas exportation activities in Queensland have seen gas prices rise while overall supply levels continue to fluctuate, making the supply of gas itself highly unpredictable. Independently conducted American research has shown that coal seam gas is detrimental to human health, particularly to that of children, the elderly and those suffering from chronic respiratory conditions. Neither the NSW Government nor Santos have bothered to investigate or properly address the serious long-term health effects of this project or the impacts it will have upon these high-risk groups and the general population.

The NSW Government should respond to our state's energy crisis by investing in cheaper, more reliable, non-polluting forms of renewable energy, not by allowing Santos to inflict more environmental and social damage on our already overmined, ecologically compromised natural environment.

I join the people of Narrabri in urging the NSW Government to reject this project and make the Great Artesian Basin recharge off-limits to gas mining to protect the future of agriculture and human health in our state.

My name is Peter Wills. I am a Breeza (NSW) resident, living in the village itself. I work in Gunnedah, and my immediate family has farming (cropping and grazing) operations based in Quirindi NSW.

I strongly object to this project, and strongly believe it should be rejected.

As a resident of the Gunnedah shire, I am gravely concerned by Santos own statement in referral to the Federal Governments Environment Protection Biodiversity Conservation Act, page 65 "the duration and... extent of depressurisation of groundwater head within the coal seams and adjacent strata will cause significant impact to the groundwater resources of the Gunnedah – Oxley Basin"

Does this clear admission here, admonish the Company of future responsibility?

This project will extract over 35 billion litres of toxic groundwater, creating as a by-product, tens of thousands of tonnes of salt, with no disposal plan detailed. My fear is when this water is extracted from lower deep aquifers, that higher, cleaner aquifers could drain lower into the voids created by this extraction of water. Can the project guarantee that there is no connectivity between aquifers, and what would stop wells themselves deteriorating over time, and water naturally finding its way lower via this man made instrument, that amongst its primary functions is to extract water from deep aquifers. What is stopping the reverse flow from higher intercepted flowing aquifers?

Santos has already contaminated an aquifer in the Pilliga, with heavy metals and uranium 20 times the safe drinking water standards. The company has been fined for wastewater discharge into a local creek, and been prosecuted for environmental harm as a result of major spills and wastewater leaks.

I think this proposal should be tested and processed, in alignment and environmental consideration, with the future stages of this project. The Narrabri project in the Pilliga is only stage 1 of 7 planned gas fields. We need to understand as a community what the full rollout looks like, and understand the ramifications of them all as a whole. And would suggest only 1 project wouldn't be financially profitable and prudent, (as confirmed by Santos in their 2015 Full year report) and they require a full rollout as broad as possible for the economics to add up.

In addition, I am of the belief that once the CSG has flowed from the wells 'naturally' under existing pressure, that 'Fracking' of these wells would then be desirable in the future to maintain supply and flow of product. Chemically Fracking these installed wells would maintain the project and its infrastructure and lifespan, well beyond CSG production. This option must be ruled out now as a future allowable condition of this project, so the company is aware of this condition/position going forward.

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I am extremely concerned and aggrieved that Australia's largest intact temperate eucalyptus woodland, the Pilliga State forest, is to be changed and 'soiled' forever more, by this relatively short term project. This woodland has stood untouched for millennia, and is relatively as intact as possible considering areas that have been turned over to farming/grazing opportunity's over the last 200 years. This project will decimate the forest as a whole, clearing aspects of the forest for tracks and well pads. And beyond the life of the project, it will be soiled by the remnant industrialisation of this project. The Pilliga will be forever more unrecognisable, and its integrity decimated for future generations. This will cause recreational use of the forest to be severely compromised, with local businesses who rely on tourism trade and travellers such as grey nomads, deterred from travelling thru this unique region.

I strongly doubt and question the actual job numbers that will be created, and fear they are over inflated, and that many will be fly in, fly out, based workforce, detrimental to the local community.

We have seen time after time these stated job numbers grossly over inflated, and when tested by independent analysts these numbers have been refuted, I sight for example, Adani coal mine in Queensland, who stated 10,000 jobs, but when tested, it was revealed the actual amount was 1,464 jobs. These statistics put out by these proponents must be tested individually, and independently.

The data that these project owners present will always be, in my opinion, flawed and preferenced/preferential to their position and case. And community groups can't possibly dispute the company findings in an equal way, considering the money these large propositions spend on creating their EIS documentation.

I fear this project wouldn't be able to cope with extreme weather events that are subject to occur, and seem to be with more regular occurrence. Recently (22-23 March 2017) in the Spring Ridge location, one particular farmer had 200mm of rain on his property over a 8 hour period. This event caused extreme damage to farm contour banks, and left some large paddocks inundated/under 30cm of water. These events can occur anywhere during storm seasons. What sort of damage could this do, should this type of event occur, to the Pilliga, Narrabri Santos project. How would project dams/ponds react and cope in this type of an rainfall event? How would cleared forest with hard wet weather tracks cope in such an event?

This invasive industry, that has taken hold predominantly in Queensland, is causing much angst and community disharmony within new and potential areas for this industry.

There have been many communities across the state, and country wide, that have declared themselves 'Gas field Free' and would like to keep this community proclaimed status. Many regions and even states across Australia have had Gas Bans invoked via their state parliaments. Why are these locality's in a broad stoke ban, more important than the Pilliga region, or the surrounding community that are opposed to this project.

Politically there is significant objection to this industry, strongly led by the Greens, followed with NSW Labor, who have a state-wide CSG moratorium as policy; and even somewhere in the cold dead beating heart of The National party, under extreme political pressure (ie: electoral wipe-out) eventually worked to enable a CSG ban in the Northern Rivers of NSW. With this political & strong community social movement only building and growing, I think it would be futile for the proponent – on these mere points alone – to consider progressing with this ill thought out, out of date project.

I strongly feel this project should be refused.

This is a submission to the Narrabri Gas Project EIS.

I object to this project and believe it should be rejected.

The EIS for the project does not appear to have addressed 'fugitive' emissions of methane from production wells. While some argue that such emissions are likely to be relatively small, the actual levels of emissions have not been studied in sufficient detail to rule out significant impacts. The levels detected in studies in the USA suggest that 'fugitive' emissions could represent 2-17% of the total gas output. These levels are sufficient to nullify the claim that gas has less overall greenhouse emissions than coal (http://www.abc.net.au/news/2017-02-28/methane-emissions-from-coal-seam-gas-climate-change/8310932).

The proposal addresses wildfires in that "a Bushfire Management Plan would be prepared in conjunction with landholders and the NSW Rural Fire Service, with components under the proponents control implemented for the project to mitigate this risk. This document would include:-identification of specific asset protection zones and strategic fire advantage zones around assets where vegetation management is required." However, serious wildfires are a regular occurrence in the Pilliga and tend to occur during El Nino events (https://en.wikipedia.org/wiki/Pilliga_forest). Protecting the project infrastructure from large, intense fires will require large areas of "vegetation management". These have not been considered in the environmental impacts on flora and fauna. Given that the whole gas field will be a grid of wells, the potential impacts may be significant, both for loss of habitat for threatened species and for fragmentation of existing habitat.

The EIS does not appear to have adequately addressed the potential for the project to assist pests and weeds to access the area. These can arrive via vehicles, machinery and along the network of access tracks that will be created. The proposed measures to deal with well-known pests (such as cats and foxes) and weeds are positive, but lesser-known pests will need to be included. An example is the Big-headed Brown Ant (Pheidole megacephala) which has potential to be inadvertently introduced and can seriously disrupt invertebrate communities.

In general, the impacts of the project on flora and fauna can not be assessed with confidence as the actual locations of the wells have not yet been determined. Although the locations will be made available "at least" 30 days in advance of installation this period is insufficient for a suitable assessment of the suitability of the locations.

The EIS considers the implications should the project not proceed, but does not address the implications if the project fails to be completed. In the current volatile economic environment even large companies such as Santos may not survive the duration of a project such as this. There is no provision for such eventuality, leaving the option that taxpayers could be required to pay for the decommissioning of the project. It would seem reasonable that the proponent should provide an appropriate bond to cover this possibility.

Similarly, it is not clear that the conditions of consent can be enforced. The EIS suggests that monitoring of progress will identify problems and that we can trust Santos to make relevant adjustments, but there appears to be no effective motivation for them to do so. Given the complexity of the environmental issues and the monitoring process it seems likely that failure to meet the consent conditions will not be taken seriously.

There is no economic justification for the project. The gas produced at Narrabri might be as little as 4.9% of the volume contracted for sale out of Gladstone. this is unlikely to bring down prices. In fact, it is more likely to force prices up, because unconventional gas like CSG is relatively expensive to produce and yields are relatively low. Research undertaken

by gas company AGL shows that gas from the Pilliga would be the most expensive gas anywhere in the current east coast gas market. The number of jobs the project will support once the construction is over is just 145.

I urge the Government to reject this project and make the Great Artesian Basin recharge off-limits to gas mining.

This project, if approved, would:

- 1. Extract over 35 billion litres of salt laden groundwater, much of it in the first five years. This water will be treated and will generate almost 500,000 tonnes of salt waste, for which there is no safe disposal plan.
- It will also change the underground structure of the region in ways that we do not begin to comprehend which will have consequences for other farmers and industries that rely on ground water in the area. There will be dry wells, there will be contamination, there will be contamination and both short term and long term consequences. Based on the Queensland examples, I am confident that neither the company concerned nor the government fully understands the risks here and is not applying the precautionary principal.
- 2. Clear close to 1,000 hectares of the Pilliga Forest, fragmenting the largest temperate woodland in New South Wales, home to unique wildlife.
- It is not enough to move threatened species, or segregate 'corridors', there is a huge amount of natural complexity to the species within these lands that we barely understand. Our removal and segregation of our own aboriginal people was similarly disastrous and that was only one species and their lives have been permanently changed for ever. We need to protect our remaining forests, there are no second chances with such developments.
- 3. Drill through a recharge aquifer of the Great Artesian Basin and draw water down from a water resource relied upon by rural communities across western NSW.
- Our understanding of recharge in the GAB is still in its infancy. Somehow, arrogantly it is believed by government and gas companies that you do understand the complexity of the GAB. The Rural communities are not so sure and have heard such certainty before. It is extraordinary that those in government do not listen to their people and, instead, find more and more ways to dismiss their concerns and undermine the last vestiges of objective science that does surface, most of it highly critical of large scale water extraction for gas and coal based businesses.

Since the politicians are so sure these developments are in the public interest - despite having very limited understanding of the complexity of the projects they are reviewing and happy to over-ride scientific advice if there are consultancies and jobs in the offing after their parliamentary careers are over, perhaps we the public could sequester their political pension funds in a fund that will be used first if the companies do not live up to their environmental responsibilities? After all, you are all so sure this is good for the area, the people etc so please put your money and future on the line as you are so ready to ask current land owners and rural businesses to do!

- 4. Lead to large deliberate and emissions of methane from venting and leakage, adding to climate change.
- Not to mention the disruption as industrialisation of the landscape occurs light pollution, noise pollution, dust pollution, radioactive discharges (and neither the companies nor the government understand THAT risk, that much is VERY clear) and other harmful and carcinogenic material that currently is just 'vented'. No benchmarking of the community health, the current air quality etc., because you don't look at what you don't want to find.

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- This really is a woefully short sighted project by a bunch of profiteers who are teetering on the brink of financial ruin themselves.

When the collapse comes, who will make sure the EIS conditions are met? Ah yes, that is when the politicians' pension pot will come in very handy.

I urge the Government to reject this project and make the Great Artesian Basin recharge off-limits to gas mining.



I have lived in North West NSW all my life, on a farm at Bingara and then near Tamworth. I am a Graduate nurse with an OAM for my work in mental health and counselling in this region. I have seen the effect of mining on rural communities. It is an industry that does NOT enhance family life, nor enrich business in the community (personal observation). That is no compensation for the downside - high risk of irreversible harm to the eco systems, farm lands, our climate, our water.

Fire Risk:

Santos' risk assessment claims "risk of uncontrolled loss of gas leading to a fire is low to very low". Do you have the history of fire outbreaks in the Pilliga? Consisting of much Cyprus Pine and Eucalyptus species, it is very prone to fire caused by lightning strikes. Add 850 wells of highly combustible gas, over 95,000 hectares which have been fragmented by clearing for pipes and roads, and that has to be a risk which Santos has totally ignored. Their responsibility is to "protect their workers." Recipe for disaster for beautiful country.

Also this project, if approved, would:

1. Extract over 35 billion litres of salt laden groundwater, much of it in the first five years. This water will be treated and will generate almost 500,000 tonnes of salt waste, for which there is no safe disposal plan. Treated water being discharged into Bohena Creek risks survival of fish and aquatic life still being discovered. Hydrologists are unable to predict with 100% accuracy what happens when aquifers and huge resources like the Great Artesian Basin are impacted as in this case. The long term risk is nor worth giving Santos access to this project on the basis of gas which could most likely be sold overseas for the company's profits. This country can reduce its demands eg how many businesses, homes and shops are overheated in July, with staff in summer clothes..

- 2. Clear close to 1,000 hectares of the Pilliga Forest, fragmenting the largest temperate woodland in New South Wales, home to unique wildlife. Koala populations are at risk throughout Australia. This would disrupt another breeding area with no idea of consequences due to the lack of detail provided. This project is four times the size of the other CSG projects approved in NSW. Our flora and fauna cannot speak up but many of us will insist that reason be used, that sustainable energy be fast tracked instead of this risky project -and our land protected.

Close to 1000 hectares of the Pilliga Forest need to be cleared for this project meaning that the largest temperate woodland in NSW would be fragmented. This fragmentation and loss of habitat will undoubtedly threaten unique wildlife.

Drilling through a recharge aquifer of the Great Artesian Basin threatens the water resource relied upon by rural communities in Western NSW. Further to this, the extraction of over 35 billion litres of salt laden groundwater will generate almost 500,000 tonnes of salt waste. That is a lot of salt to dispose of risking issues with salinity in the surrounding environment.

Emissions of methane, that would be generated knowingly and irresponsibly, from venting and leakage from the wells of this proposed project, will only add to the atmospheric burden of gases that cause climate change.

This land is far too important for Santos to drill 850 gas wells. It is precious to the local Aboriginal people, the Gamilaraay people, for spiritual, cultural and social reasons. I doubt they want hundreds of these wells degrading their land! This land is important too to the rural communities of NSW, around Narrabri, who farm it for food and fibre. This project threatens their livelihoods.

Further to these concerning impacts is the fact that there are potential shortages of supply of gas; that prices have risen in part due to the export of gas rather than it being available to the domestic market. 2. States shall consult and cooperate in good faith with the indigenous peoples concerned through their own representative institutions in order to obtain their free and informed consent prior to the approval of any project affecting their lands or territories and other resources, particularly in connection with the development, utilization or exploitation of mineral, water or other resources.

QUESTION: Provide me with the proof of this consent and surrounding information supplied to the indigenous people including time for consideration and dates of such agreements.

3. States shall provide effective mechanisms for just and fair redress for any such activities, and appropriate measures shall be taken to mitigate adverse environmental, economic, social, cultural or spiritual impact.

QUESTION: Under my rights as a As a Gamilaraay descendant I invoke the right to

As a descendant of Gamilaraay people I ask for the record:

QUESTION: Are you adhering to the UNDRIP and the Biodiversity Convention in relation to Indigenous rights? If not why not?

The UNDRIP was endorsed by the Australian Government in 2009. It is 'the most comprehensive and advanced international instrument dealing with Indigenous peoples' rights. A tool that can facilitate addressing the contemporary effects of oppression and colonisation.'

Article 32 provides for rights regarding development and use of lands, territories or resources, including specific reference to water resources.

As a Gamilaraay descendant I invoke the right to recognition and protection of my people's rights to 'lands, territories and resources.'

Article 26 of UNDRIP refers to indigenous peoples' rights to, and States obligations to give legal recognition and protection of rights to, 'lands, territories and resources.'

As a Gamilaraay descendant I invoke the right to recognition and protection of my people's rights to 'lands, territories and resources.'

Under the Biodiversity Convention, respect for and preservation of indigenous cultures is seen as important, if ancillary, to the main subject-matter of the Convention.

Other agreements regarding cultural recognition, such as the UNESCO Convention on the Protection and Promotion of the Diversity of Cultural Expressions40, requires the integration of culture into sustainable development.

QUESTION: Has there been integration of Indigenous culture and is this development sustainable?

The principal constitutional foundations for proposed amendment to the Water Act, so as to advance Aboriginal rights and interests, have been identified above as the Parliament's power to legislate with respect to external affairs.

QUESTION: Have the constitutional foundations for advancing Aboriginal rights and interests been expressed and represented in the Water Act with consultation with Indigenous peoples? If not why not?

References to constitutional heads of legislative power are not applicable due to the force and authority of international instruments, such as the UNDRIP and Biodiversity Convention, and their guidance to beneficial legislation in this regard.

The Commonwealth has the constitutional capacity to legislate 'for the people of any race for whom it is deemed necessary to make special laws',41 the so-called 'race power.'

The principal constitutional foundations for proposed amendment to the Water Act, so as to advance Aboriginal rights and interests, have been identified above as the Parliament's power to legislate with respect to external affairs.

QUESTION: Has the 'cultural flows' concept of water allocations been implemented under this power - for example obliging water resource plans to include Aboriginal cultural allocation provisions. I have serious objections to the proposal of Santos to construct and operate over 800 coal seam gas (CSG) wells in the northern section of the Pilliga Forest.

- 1. Santos claims that the longer-term legacy of CSG activities here will be minimal. This is manifestly absurd and misleading as exemplified by the social, environmental and economic impacts on rural populations of the CSG experience in SE QLD.
- 2. Santos has already breached environmental guidelines during its testing phase, including a groundwater pollution event. It cannot be trusted with a massively scaled-up project.
- 3. Santos has not revealed any effective disposal plan for the projected 0.5M tones of salt generated from the expected 35B L of extracted groundwater. There are already bushland areas in the Pilliga lain waste by salinity from Santos operations. Again the QLD experience shows that evaporation pans associated with CSG occupy large surface areas and that salt is not adequately contained therein, let alone permanently removed.
- 4. The area is a significant recharge zone for the Great Artesian Basin. CSG drilling will puncture this zone and cause groundwater draw-down affecting water resource access to rural communities and their economic well-being.
- 5. Fugitive emissions of methane from 850 CSG wells will be large. Recent studies comparing fugitive emissions from CSG as opposed to conventional gas extraction suggest that their contribution to greenhouse effects on climate change can easily exceed the greenhouse effects from coal (methane is 84 times more potent than CO2 as a greenhouse gas), in proportion to the energy generated from these fuels. Recent research at Southern Cross University, Lismore, reveals significant elevated levels of methane in the atmosphere around Chinchilla in QLD. Reports on methane emissions from U.S. and Canadian natural gas systems reveal them to be larger than official estimates (Brandt et al.2014, Methane leaks from North American Natural Gas Systems, Science, 343 (2014), pp. 733–735). The Energy Institute has warned that unmeasured methane leaks from unconventional gas fields could cause Australia to fail its Paris climate commitments.
- 6. The health effects of coal seam gas on local populations in the vicinity of extractions have not been comprehensively studied.
- 7. CSG extraction depends on drilling wells close together and connected by a network of pipelines. Whilst the immediate clearing of bushland may only be in the order of thousands of hectares, the resulting fragmentation of the largest temperate woodland in NSW will seriously affect the unique flora and fauna of the Pilliga area.
- 8. The farming community of Narrabri is overwhelmingly opposed to CSG in its vicinity, on both environmental and economic grounds, and increasingly on medical grounds.
- 9. Santos' CSG export activity in QLD has contributed to distortion of the gas market in NSW to the extent that the Federal Government has now been forced to allow regulatory intervention to secure domestic gas supply. Domestic gas prices are now determined by the high prices gas companies are receiving from their international buyers.
- 10. The Pilliga has had important unbroken cultural and spiritual significance for the Kamilaroi people for thousands of years. A destructive CGS project would once again break their hearts.
- 11. There are fears the project will destroy the unique dark night sky needed for astronomical observations at the internationally renowned Siding Spring Observatory.

This combined with the net loss in conditions to the broader Australian interests, through the degradation of the vitally important recharge aquifer to the Great Artesian Basin, damage to the ecological balance in the Pilliga Forest, reduction of the viability of agricultural output and desecration of a land for which Gamilaraay people have maintained a bond and reliance over thousands of years, make the Gas Project a very bad idea, worthy only of outright rejection by your department.

I see little value in providing meticulous detail to the range of adverse consequences which shall be visited upon those in the Narrabri district if the project were to proceed. I would rather prefer to avoid generating more of the 'same' in the way of data.

I am only too aware of these issues, as I know you will be, as a consequence of a more than sound account of them in the multitude of objections supported by anecdotal and scientific data. I am confident these shall be adequately covered in thousands of submissions forwarded to you with relevant supporting data from the history of the unconventional gas industry and its impacts in Australia and elsewhere, as well as ever increasing peer reviewed scientific reports and studies from the U.S. documenting the numerous ill effects of the industry.

There is, however, one point for which I struggle to forego mentioning, as it is such a' basic nuts and bolts issue' in Santos's EIR and displays breathtaking contempt in the exercise of satisfactorily addressing the fundamentals, through lack of

In Paris in December 2015, the world, Australia included, agreed to hold global average temperature to "well below 2 degrees above pre-industrial levels and to pursue efforts to limit the increase to 1.5 degrees", albeit the emission reduction commitments Australia tabled were laughable in comparison with our peers and with the size of the challenge.

Dangerous climate change, which the Paris agreement and its forerunners seek to avoid, is happening at the 1.2-degree increase already experienced as extreme weather events, and their economic costs, escalate. A 1.6-degree increase is already locked in as the full effect of our historic emissions unfolds.

Our current path commits us to a 4 to 5-degree temperature increase. This would create a totally disorganised world with a substantial reduction in population, possibly to less than one billion people from 7.5 billion today.

The voluntary emission reduction commitments made in Paris, if implemented, would still result in a 3-degree increase, accelerating social chaos in many parts of the world with rising levels of deprivation, displacement and conflict.

It is already impossible to stay below the 1.5-degree Paris aspiration. To have a realistic chance of staying below even 2 degrees means that no new fossil-fuel projects can be built globally – coal, oil or gas – and that existing operations, particularly coal and gas, must be rapidly replaced with low-carbon alternatives.

The North West Plains Sustainability Group (NWPSG) objects to this project and believes it should be rejected.

(NWPSG) objects to the Narrabri Gas Project on the grounds that this project risks:

- Contaminating a recharge area of the Great Artesian Basin (GAB)
- Lowering the water pressure in the Great Artesian Basin (GAB)
- Contaminating overland water flows that are part of the Murray Darling Basin (MDB)
- Contaminating fragile ephemeral wetlands.

Alternative energy sources are available eg solar that are renewable and do not pose the above listed risks.

The Precautionary Principle was applied when invoking the 2003 NSW Native Vegetation Act to mitigate any adverse unknown effects of vegetation clearing. Why isn't this same principle being applied to the Narrabri Gas Project and other gas projects to assist in protecting the integrity of GAB and MDB and its associated wetlands.

Background

Since 2005 NWPSG has supported landholders in the Walgett Shire (NW NSW) to take up sustainable farming practices and natural resource management and consequently facilitate resilient businesses and communities. NWPSG has 60 members who are involved in enterprises including extensive sheep and cattle grazing, broadacre dryland cropping and/or irrigated crops such as cotton.

Agriculture has been the predominant economic driver in this Shire since the early 1800s and in 2012 Walgett Shire was the third most productive Shire in NSW after Moree Plains and Griffith Shires.

Water

The supply of good quality, fresh water is fundamental and critical to operating any profitable farming business.

Sub artesian water supply

In the drought of the early 1900s local properties that were not located near rivers were abandoned due to the lack of a reliable water supply. It was not until Sub Artesian bores were sunk which accessed a reliable water source that these properties were resumed and became viable propositions. Since then sub-artesian water has been a significant driver of profitability and an important factor in preparing for drought.

The GAB extends over 22% of the Australian continent where it is the only reliable groundwater or surface water source – especially important for the world's driest continent. It is unique in the world and a national icon similar to the Great Barrier Reef and Uluru. The Pilliga Sandstone, the location of the Narrabri Gas Project, is a recharge area for the GAB and its integrity is critical to ensure the GAB is fed with fresh, non-contaminated water.

A media release (12/5/17) from the Federal Minister of Agriculture states, "It's estimated that water from the Basin underpins at least \$12.8B in economic activity annually..." and "The Great Artesian Basin directly supports more than 180 000 people in more than 120 towns and 7600 businesses in regional and remote Australia...".

Approximately 20 years ago both landholders and government recognised the importance of minimising the wastage of this precious resource and invested in capping and piping bore schemes. This has resulted in a reduction in evaporation water loss of 95% and increases in bore pressures. To date government has invested \$115M and landholders have invested at least the equivalent amount in cash and time. This program is so successful that the Minister of Agriculture announced further funding of \$8M on 12/5/17.

The Narrabri Gas project risks these benefits. What will it cost if GAB is damaged? Can any damaged be repaired? Who will pay for repairing the damage?

Murray Darling Basin and associated ephemeral wetlands

The Walgett Shire adjoins Narrabri Shire and the proposed gas pipeline affects some ratepayers. The eastern part of the Shire is predominantly a floodplain for the Namoi, Barwon, Macquarie and Castlereagh Rivers and their tributaries. These rivers are part of the Murray Darling Basin. There are 200 listed, fragile ephemeral wetlands associated with these rivers. There is also a significant irrigated cotton industry associated with these rivers.

The pilot Narrabri Gas Project has produced concerning downstream water pollution. Especially worrying is the discharge of desalinated yet still contaminated waste water into the Bohena Creek, a tributary of the Namoi River. According to the EIS and Department of Planning & Environment, millions of litres of water that has been removed from the coal seam and processed via a Reverse Osmosis system, will be pumped directly into the creek. Whilst Reverse Osmosis is an effective purification process, it is not capable of removing ALL the various heavy metals and radioactive elements present in the coal seam water.

Monitoring of water quality will be conducted "in house" and down stream, rather than at point of injection, and whilst it can measure water quality against its specifically set contamination levels, it can do nothing if they are exceeded.

At peak production the Project will produce 115t of contaminated salt that, according to the EIS, is to be disposed of in landfill sites locally. This is 40,000t of salt a year, and all with the potential to be flushed into the Namoi river system in the occasion of a significant flood event.

The presence of either pollutants or salt in the Namoi River, in the quantity that the Project has the potential to produce, will not only affect local irrigators, but all townships and landholders reliant on the Namoi River for hundreds of kilometres downstream.

The Narrabri Gas project risks the Murray Darling Basin and associated wetlands. What will it cost if the Murray Darling Basin is damaged? Can any damaged be repaired? Who will pay for repairing the damage?

I urge the Government to reject this project and make the Great Artesian Basin recharge and Murray Darling Basin off-limits to gas mining.



This is a submission in which I set out my objections to Ssntos' Narrabri Gas Project EIS.

I do not believe the Santos' EIS for the development should be approved for the following reasons:

1:

The extraction of vast quantities of precious groundwater from the Great Artesian Basin poses a risk to the the future of agricultural and pastoral activities in eastern Australia. It is a simple madness to risk a resource that is irreplaceable. Australia is by and large a dry landmass with critical underground water which, if contaminated, will be catastrophic.

2:

There is no certainty in relation to the future integrity of the pipes and bores and vents that will be necessary for CSG extraction. I have no confidence that anyone will maintain this infrastructure in perpetuity. This proposal by Santos will reap short term multinational profits and leave Australia with probable damage and the costs of remediation, if remediation will be even possible.

3:

I am further concerned by the failure of the EIS to address the issue of dark skies so critical to the future of the internationally significant facility at Siding Springs. Massive flares during the night will irreparably damage the work of scientists. Such damage would be a loss to the nation and indeed the globe.

4:

I am aware that the vast quantities of wastewater extracted from the fracking will be highly contaminated with salt and other undesirable elements. Stabilised in the soil and rock strata these these salts pose no risk. Brought to the surface there will be an ongoing containment problem. Santos have already shown they are incapable of managing wastewater. There have been a number of 'spills' and I have personally seen the damage to the vegetation and soil that resulted from this mismanagement. In an era of changing climate there is every risk that millions of litres of contaminated water will be released either deliberately or inadvertently. This risk alone is sufficient to warrant disapproval of the projects EIS.

5:

The Pilliga is a unique environment that has supported the physical, cultural and spiritual welfare of countless generations of aboriginal people. The fragmentation of this forrest with roads and flares and extraction sites would forever damage the futures of the Gamilaraay people. Such pillage of the environment will wreck havoc on threatened and endangered species which continue to be vital to the welfare of the Gamilaraay. It is simply unconscionable to treat our indigenous people with such contempt.

6:

In addition I lodge this objection to the project on the grounds that it is utterly irresponsible to approve a project that will release to the atmosphere unquantified tonnes of methane. In an era of rapid global warming that threatens glacial loss, ice cap melting and tundra defreezing it is not appropriate to add methane to the mix of greenhouse gases. We are a global







This is a submission to the Narrabri Gas Project EIS.

I am the daughter of 6 generations who have been farmers and graziers in my family property for over 130 years. CSG was first introduced to me when I was finishing primary school when the gas pipeline was proposed to pass through my uncle's (neighbouring) property. In the following years the gas project was being developed. As a 14 year old I was more informed on this issue than most children my age. I along with various members of my extended family have actively protested these developments which are occurring less than 10km from my childhood home. For years my father and uncle have voiced their opposition to this project. At 20 years of age, as an educated young woman whose family history and livelihood can and will be impacted by the proposed project, I believe my voice – the voice of the next generation – should be heard too. My opinion is informed by my rural upbringing, my connection to our land and wide reading and analysis of information/news published about this project over the past 8 years or so.

For the following reasons I oppose the project:

- 1. I do not believe the EIS is reliable science. As a (veterinary) science student I am aware of the scientific method. For the study to be undertaken and compiled by Santos is poor science as it carries extraordinary BIAS. Even an 'independent' investigation agency contracted would be insufficient to rule out bias as they are employed under the interest of the gas company. This paper, no matter how long and 'comprehensive', has been developed by the company whose intention is to proceed with the project. Therefore, their objective in designing and presenting this study is to 'prove' or providing findings that demonstrate that it is safe to proceed. This is poor science. An independent panel is not sufficient for analysing the integrity of the report. An independent study conducted by an impartial party should be conducted and the findings compared. If I could trust the science and its findings, this project would not concern me anywhere near as much. However, I do not have confidence that our government and industry bodies are capable of such.
- 2. Without solid, unbiased science I cannot be assured that our WATER is safe. Yes, Santos clearly describes they are drilling through the aquifers and Great Artesian Basin to coal seam deep underground. But you are passing through the aquifers. Accidents happen. Structures are sometimes imperfect irrespective of how thick the concrete and metal reinforcements are. It only takes one leak to contaminate water sources. We rely on deep bores in our property, without them our beef enterprise would become unviable.
- 3. I believe the EIS needs to take its health impacts more seriously. Abnormal illness in gas areas in QLD and the USA have been recorded. There are PEER-REVIEWED articles on this health research emerging from the US this is higher order scientific research compared to anything produced in Australia on the issue. If pursued on QLD cases I'm sure some correlations could be found. Again, I think good science is being neglected. As the voice of the next generation I do not want to live or potentially raise a family in a region that could potentially harm our health.

- 4. Whilst the Pilliga is not deemed an 'invaluable' source of agricultural land, it is an area of great biodiversity and aboriginal heritage. However, our land bordering the eastern edge of the Pilliga is quite productive agricultural land. Whilst it is not the Liverpool plains, it feeds many Australian mouths (and mouths around the world) every day. I am also concerned that this project is simply a platform from which Santos seeks to extend into prime agricultural land. There are few regions in Australia as productive as those in NW NSW. It would be a crime against humanity to potentially destroy it. The human body cannot sustain itself from eating coal and drinking gas.
- 5. For years my father has worked with the Namoi CMA and other industry bodies to counteract soil salinity in our region. This is ongoing and has taken many years to improve. To pump salty water to the surface has a very large potential to undo this. Whilst Santos outlines a detailed desalination plan and a complex network of evaporating ponds, I do not trust their word. Their toxic spill a few years ago is an example of what could occur if this waste water is insufficiently handled.
- 6. This summer was one of the hottest I can remember. Weeks on end exceeding 35 degrees. On February 12 2017, Boggabri recorded temperatures exceeding 50 degrees and many locals battled fires on opposite side of town. There was a total fire ban in place for many weeks, yet Santos was still permitted to have naked flares on their wells in the scrub. I appreciate that these wells cannot be capped, and they will always leak some gas. It is also my understanding that gas in contact with a spark has the potential to cause a great explosion. Bushfires are common through the Pilliga. The last big one within the gasfield region (and near us) was in 2006 when I was 9 years old. I clearly remember the roar of the fire from the house, some 8-10km from the fire front. It is scary. These fires are unpredictable, hot and they are fast. That fire burnt about 16,000 ha within 3 hours. To have workers in the scrub in fire conditions is unthinkable. There is no way of escaping it. No firebreak, especially not a 100m radius one, will protect the wells. I would hate to think of the damage caused by a bushfire passing through a gas field. We're probably due for another big fire soon and it was a blessing it didn't happen last February.
- 7. Santos claims that the project will employ 1200 people during the construction phase and 200 people throughout the lifetime of the project. After observing the development of the mines over my childhood I ask the question how many of these will be local jobs? Apart from buying their way into local communities, are they going to benefit us by providing new jobs to locals or will they be flown in as many are for the coal mines.

Whilst I appreciate that the combustion of methane gas extracted from the coal seam is a "cleaner" form of energy, I encourage you to consider: Is it really a cleaner energy? If it has the potential to contaminate water, cause salinity issues, leak gas into the atmosphere (the same terrible gas cows regurgitate), create biodiversity wastelands, impact health, destroy farming communities and divide towns — is it a clean energy? Is it renewable? No. It takes millions of years of biological processes to create the gas in the coal seam. This gas is no more sustainable than coal. The government is merely tapping into this resource to fill their pockets.



With salinity already a major problem in Australia's rivers and landscapes I find this lack of planning intolerable.

Abut fifteen years ago I saw how an exploratory gas well in the Pilliga had polluted the landscape with salt after an overflow of the holding dam. There was this huge swathe of dead trees, grass trees and all vegetation for 50 metres across. I had no idea how far this damage occurred, but it was well over a kilometre. I shudder to think how landscapes would be following a huge overflow.

I object to this project and believe it should be rejected.

I have personal experience of the Pilliga forests, having lived nearby, worked and camped extensively in the area.

Ecological Values Degraded.

During the several decades, I have observed substantial degradation of the natural environment due to the 'exploratory' work already conducted. This work has caused disturbance and fragmentation to the natural environment, the continuous discharge of waters into the ephemeral Bibblewindi Creek has enabled the spread of weeds along the edges of the watercourse, and into the surrounding forests. These effects will irreversibly degrade the environmental qualities of the Pilliga.

Methane Leakage Not Quantified.

In spite of the long period of exploration, no comprehensive survey of the background levels of Methane leakage have been conducted. In consequence of this failure, there is no baseline to compare post-development levels, so no objective assessment of the climate change, or other consequences, of the inevitably increased leakage will be available. This in spite of well-known technology used elsewhere to conduct such baseline surveys (e.g. Picarro CRDS)

Deleterious Effects on Groundwater already occurred.

A nearby landholder, near the eastern boundary of the development area, personally known to me and well known to the proponent, has relied for decades on potable water from a bore on his property. Following the exploratory activities, minor in scale compared to the proposed works, this bore became foul, smelling of gas and sulphides, was rejected by his cattle, and the proponent Santos has trucked water to this property since. No formal recognition, nor arrangement for permanent relief has been made by the proponent. The fact of this contradicts the assurances by the proponent that negative effects are very unlikely.

The very large quantities of water required to be extracted, to cause the methane to be released from the coal matrix, will inevitably cause negative effects on those reliant,.

The quality of the contaminated water returned to the environment (Bibblewindi Creek) during the exploratory phase was ameliorated by reverse osmosis treatment. This was relatively expensive, and it is not clear from the proposal that the proponent will be required to continue this level of treatment for the duration of the project.

The concentrated brine generated by the reverse osmosis process has already caused pollution incidents, even at the small scale of the exploration. Management of the vastly greater quantities of brine to be generated by this proposal will be many fold more likely to result in pollution incidents.

For the above reasons, I am firmly opposed to the project receiving approval.

The importance of rejecting the proposed Narrabri Gas Project

As a concerned member of the public, I am making a submission on the Narrabri Gas Project and I wish to state that I totally OBJECT to it.

My reasons to the objection include the following:

- 1.The EIS appears to be quite flawed in that it is not providing enough detail that I regard as important. There are no maps to indicate where the proposed 850 well and the lines and infrastructures needed around and between the wells are to be located. It seems lack of forward planning that Santos is asking for a blank cheque consent for the whole development promising only that it will decide where the 850 wells will go AFTERWARD using a "Field Development Protocol." What is meant by this waffly word is anyone's guess. No other project has been assessed in NSW on this basis. There needs to be a far greater set of details on the placement of the well, the pipelines' position and the placement of the huge number of infrastructures that support the wells and pipelines. It is up to the Government to insist that Santos release details pertaining to all aspects of the proposed siting of wells, pipelines and infrastructures to the public at large.
- 2.What is the justification for this proposed large scale development? Cheaper gas, more gas for the people of eastern Australia? That is a joke. Unconventional gas such as CSG is expensive to produce and the amount produced is not great. Furthermore, there is a history of Santos's involvement in driving up prices of gas because by being part of a number of large gas companies who were over-committing themselves to sell more gas to overseas customers than those massive Queensland fields could provide, thereby helping to squeeze the supply of gas to Australian businesses and homes of the east coast of Australia and subsequently increasing the price of gas supply here. Even if the proposed development goes ahead, it may supply as little as under 5% of the volume of gas that has been contracted to be sold to overseas interests. That does not make economic sense. As for the growth of jobs, once the construction phase passes the temporary jobs will disappear and only a handful will remain.
- 3.Besides the inaccuracy of maintaining the fallacy that the development will provide tremendous economic bounty to Australia, there is the vexed question of the groundwater of the Great Artesian Basin. This is a lifeline to our agriculture ventures in this dry continent. To tamper with its sustainability is a crime to present and future use of the land for the benefit of all. We cannot afford to risk tampering with this crucial resource and already Santos has admitted that there will be loss of water from the recharge aquifer that lies beneath the Pilliga sandstone where the proposed development is being planned. There have already been significant water losses from the Great Artesian Basin areas in Queensland so it is a very valid concern.
- 4.Extracting ground water for this project will result in an enormous load of salt which needs to be removed. It is proposed that once peak production comes into play, there will be around 115 tonnes of salt produced per day and Santos plans for this to be placed in landfill. This is not an acceptable option.
- 5.To ignore and to tamper with or destroy the cultural heritage of the Gamilaraay people of the Pilliga is to deny their rights to their heritage and connection to country. This proposed development will fragment, industrial and destroy this connection.
- 6.The Pilliga is an area of enormous biodiversity within the largest temperate woodland in NSW. With Santos proposing to clear nearly 1000ha of land fragmentation of the land will impact heavily on the endangered species within the cleared area that will be the gas fields. Because there is no clear indication where the wells, pipelines and infrastructures will go,

any proper ecological impact assessment cannot be made. Besides this the whole of the Pilliga is a unique, natural and cultural icon that should be protected for all, and for generations to come, not be turned into an industrial wasteland that will never recover from the impact it makes.

7.The impact of the gasfields will affect air quality for those living within the vicinity, there will be social and health impacts with no modelling undertaken for effect on cost of living, the impact on health of diesel generators on well pads, at water treatment and gas compression plants. There is also no assessment undertaken for fugitive methane emissions.

8. The internationally significant Siding Spring Observatory will certainly be impacted on through the light pollution from flares, compressor stations and the water treatment plant thereby virtually ruining the dark sky needed for its work.

*Finally, a recent research by the Melbourne Energy Institute shows that we are probably dramatically under-estimating the fugitive methane emissions from unconventional gas -this includes coal seam gas. It is an energy source that is ultimately not a useful source of energy and we have the technology to replace gas with more renewable forms of energy. It is time we moved on!

I ask the NSW government to consider my submission on Santos' EIS for the Narrabri Gas Project.

The following issues concern me deeply and I regard each of them as having risks that cannot be managed with any guarantee.

- 1: Drilling through the Great Artesian Basin aquifer to reach the coal seam presents a threat to Australia's greatest underground water resource. This water is critical to the nation and is irreplaceable. It supports inland towns in NSW and Queensland, their agriculture and pastoral activities. As it is well understood that bore casings fail over time, to allow the proposed 850 bores to be sunk is irresponsible in the extreme. The Great Artesian Basin is a national resource not just a NSW resource. Santos have failed to demonstrate in their EIS that the engineering of these bores will retain their integrity in perpetuity.
- 2: CSG extraction has proved to be dangerous and destructive elsewhere in Australia. The Condamine River in Queensland bubbles with fugitive methane emissions released as a result of fracturing the substrata. The land too has been contaminated and gas escapes from the soil. Given this potent evidence of the outcome of CSG mining in Queensland it would be a folly to permit Santos to proceed in the Pilliga Forest. I do not believe that Santos have demonstrated in their EIS that there will be no fugitive emissions of methane.
- 3: The Narrabri Gas Project covers a vast area of land that is of immense significance to the Gamilaraay people. I strongly object to this project. I believe the case against unconventional gas development is now so well documented that any proposed development approvals should, and will be viewed as negligence.

The section relating to the Pilliga Forest can be seen at the 28 minute mark but I ask all concerned to view this short documentary in it's entirety.

If further information is required please consider the following:

1. The SANTOS EIS claims that they will not interfere with the GAB recharge zone.

The project plans to extract over 35 billion litres of water much in the first five years. Government hydrogeological mapping of the GAB shows the project will straddle the most important inflow zone into the GAB in NSW (Hydrogeological Atlas of the Great Artesian Basin (2016) Department of Water Resources (NSW) Hydrogeological Series Sheet SH 55-12; NSW Department of Water & Energy April 2009 PN00799 WR2008-089).

2. Coal seam gas (CSG) production can have an impact on groundwater quality and quantity in adjacent or overlying aquifers.

The EIS provides no evidence that shows there is no connectivity between aquifer strata. Recent studies document migration of coal bed methane to the surface (https://www.nature.com/articles/srep15996).

3. All well casings will fail eventually.

There is no comprehensive strategy to ensure long-term well integrity. We will have 850 leakage time-bombs through the GAB

(http://www.pnas.org/content/111/30/10955.full).

4. Santos want to release treated water into Bohena Creek during high and moderate flows.

The EIS ignores that Bohena Creek is a recognised surface groundwater ecosystem (Australian GDE Atlas). Treated water must not be released into Bohena Creek.

- 9. The project will clear close to 1 000 hectares of the Pilliga Forest fragmenting the largest temperate woodland in New South Wales. The Pilliga Forest is a remnant forest a significant genetic repository with a complex interrelationship with recharge and inflow of ground water to the Great Artesian Basin and other acquirers closer to the surface. More research is needed.
- 10. The proposal fails to adequately address concerns by the Gamilaraay people about further destruction of significant social cultural and spiritual sites.

This project should not proceed. Construction and exploration already undertaken has had a significant impact on the communities and the environment. The proposal to massively elevate drilling has a residual catastrophic risk to the immediate environment the integrity of the Great Artesian Basin and other aquifers and the communities dependant on them.

In conclusion I wish to state that it should be abundantly clear to all our political leaders that we need all available resources to be committed to developing a clean energy future. We are rapidly running out of time some researchers say its already too late. But heaven help us all if we continue down the disastrous path we are heading. I urge all concerned to act now and be on the right side of history

- 1. Extract over 35 billion litres of salt laden groundwater, much of it in the first five years. This water will be treated and will generate almost 500,000 tonnes of salt waste, for which there is no safe disposal plan.
- 2. Clear close to 1,000 hectares of the Pilliga Forest, fragmenting the largest temperate woodland in New South Wales, home to unique wildlife an valuable Koala habitat.
- 3. Drill through a recharge aquifer of the Great Artesian Basin and draw water down from a water resource relied upon by rural communities across western NSW as well as central QLD, SA and NT!
- 4. Lead to large deliberate emissions of methane from venting and leakage, adding to climate change. There is no data on escaping gas from the whole process well to consumption (commonly referred to as fugitive emissions) and the impacts on the local environment and broader climate (as Methane is four (4) times more harmful than Carbon Dioxide.
- 5. As there is no legislated Domestic Gas Reserve policy, all the gas will be transferred to Gladstone to fill export contracts and therefore Australian Manufacturing businesses will continue to struggle to compete and consumers will be impacted by higher prices. Australia has plenty of Gas for Domestic supply, but instead it's being diverted to fill export orders. The Gas majors (Santos, AGL, Origin) cannot supply the Gas they've contracted and therefore are ripping Australia off.

One of my major objections is to the impact of the well sites. In the EIS the location of well sites is unknown. Well sites & associated infrastructure have some of the greatest environmental impacts, so how can the impact be known if the sites are not defined. Many hectares of forest will be damaged with the one hectare of pad boundary, plus land for equipment & the many traversing access roads.

If this project goes ahead it will extract thirty five billion litres of toxic groundwater. To date, as far as I am aware, there is no safe method to disperse of this water or the salt residue. As water is such a precious commodity in this dry continent, diverting water from one of the recharge aquifers for the GAB seems an unwise decision. This water is essential to maintain the farming communities in western NSW & the agricultural industries around Narrabri.

There are 807 flora species & 289 animals that call the Pilliga forest home. Among these some are listed under State & Federal legislation as endangered or threatened, Appendix J 1, indicates 'a significant residual impact' will occur to threatened species. It has been proposed that this will be offset as part of the biodiversity offset strategy. Biodiversity offsets have a lag time & will not help animals which are impacted at the time. I believe it is unlikely to mitigate the significant projected impacts.
