- It will cause significant diversion of water from a recharge aquifer of the Great Artesian Basin, which is a water resource relied upon by rural communities across western NSW.
- It will lead to large deliberate and fugitive emissions of methane, adding to climate change.
- It will cause more trauma to the regional Aboriginal community because the area of impact is crucially important to the spiritual, cultural and social life of Gamilaraay people.
- It is not justified: Santos' own coal seam gas export activities in Queensland have caused gas prices to rise and supply to become unpredictable. NSW should respond to this by investing in more reliable and ultimately cheaper renewable energy, not by letting Santos inflict more environmental, social and economic harm.
- It will cause economic upheaval in Narrabri and put agricultural industries at risk, as well as causing light pollution that will ruin the dark night sky needed by the internationally renowned Siding Spring Observatory.
- Coal seam gas is harmful to health. Neither the NSW Government nor Santos have investigated or dealt with the serious health effects of coal seam gas now appearing in peer-reviewed research in the United States.

***I am writing to object to the Narrabri Gas Project.***

I have never written a submission to object to anything in my life. I'm actually finding it quite surreal that i am writing this. But the more i have investigated this project, and coal seam gas in general, i just cannot understand how anyone would think this a safe practice for anything or anyone, and to allow it to go ahead. There is just so much evidence that clearly states fracking is not safe for humans or the environment. And when Australia obviously has unlimited renewable resources, such as wind and sun, again, i just don't understand why our Government is not investing in these resources instead.

I could've easily just signed and sent in the previous page, as i'm sure many conscientious objectors have done. But i feel so strongly about this, that it has caused me to write this submission. My daughter passed away 11 years ago, and it was due to malpractice. There are many things that could've avoided her death, if only things were done to prevent it from happening in the first place. But being our first child, we trusted the team of doctors and hospital staff around us, to deliver our baby safely to us. Never did i foresee the events that would take her life. None of us did. But again, it could've been avoided. I liken this to what is happening with coal seam gas. We are trusting our Government and the people that head these departments. We are trusting you and have elected you to do the right thing by us. The people, including professionals such as environmental scientists, that oppose this practice, are so passionate in their fight against fracking, that it has caused me to sit up and take notice. Why are they so passionate? The videos i have seen of children with headaches and bleeding noses, should NOT be going unnoticed. Do you want a class action against you? Is this going to be another James Hardy/asbestos case? You have been given an opportunity to foresee the risks involved with fracking. If you continue to ignore the risks, and allow such projects as the Narrabri Gas Project to go ahead, i have no doubt that this will end lives. Is money more important than a child's life? I can assure you that no amount of money will ever replace a child's life. And the

He must've felt so robbed of all he had - that the gas companies could take what they wanted from him - and seemingly not care... how do the heads of these companies sleep at night?

I am not detracting from the issue here with my own 'sob story'. I understand it may appear that way. I am simply trying to explain my own experiences and why i feel so strongly about this. **I JUST CANNOT UNDERSTAND HOW ANYONE COULD ALLOW THIS TO GO ON - FRACKING - IT IS SO UNSAFE.** And to be poisoning our water supply, especially for those in north western NSW who rely so heavily on the Great Artesian Basin, is beyond me. I have read about the process of fracking, and the chemicals used for this. I have seen documentaries on it. I have read so much evidence proving that leaks are inevitable. How can any of this continue to be ignored? And let's mention deforestation - 1000 hectares of the Pilliga's forest cleared - what happens to the unique wildlife that calls this home? Not to mention the gas emissions that will be created. I have never seen myself as an environmentalist, but after doing my own research on fracking, i am now so much more aware of the damage this causes our magnificent planet. If we allow 850 gas wells to be drilled in the Pilliga/Narrabri region, then this gives the green light for other areas nationally, and also internationally, to go ahead. I bought my home, my own piece of land, some years ago. If i had known for one moment that i only own the top part of the soil my home sits on, then i would've fought this back then. How dare the Government and gas companies feel they can come onto my land and take what they think necessary, solely for monetary profit. How unbelievably greedy. This is my home. As far as i'm concerned, i pay for this and the soil it sits on.
