
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- Santos claims the project will create only small jobs losses in agriculture. Yet in QLD the CSIRO found 1.8 agricultural jobs were lost for every new CSG job. If this occurred in Narrabri, the 127 new CSG jobs Santos claims it will create would result in 229 local agricultural job losses.
- It is not justified: Santos' own CSG exports in QLD have caused gas prices to rise and supply to become unpredictable. NSW should respond to this by investing in renewable energy plus storage, not by letting Santos inflict more environmental, social and economic harm.
- CSG is harmful to health. Neither the NSW Government nor Santos have investigated or dealt with the serious health effects of CSG shown in peer-reviewed research in the United States.
- The risks to our water are too great. It will extract over 35 billion litres of toxic groundwater and create tens of thousands of tonnes of salt waste. It would divert water from the recharge aquifer of the Great Artesian Basin and risk the pressure head of this critical water resource.
- It will clear 1,000 ha of the Pilliga forest, fragmenting the largest temperate woodland in New South Wales, home to endangered wildlife.
- It will cause trauma to the regional Aboriginal community because the area of impact is important to the spiritual and cultural life of Gamilaraay people.
