- § details the proposed site planting, including location, number and species of plantings, heights of trees at maturity and proposed canopy coverage
- § considers equity and amenity of outdoor play spaces, and integration with built form, security, shade, topography and existing vegetation
- § demonstrates how the proposed development would:
- contribute to long term landscape setting in respect of the site and the streetscape
- mitigate the urban heat island effect and ensure appropriate comfort levels on-site
- contribute to objectives to increase urban tree canopy cover.
 - o a detailed landscape plan prepared by a suitably qualified person, including appropriate landscape buffers to adjoining rural properties.

25. Agricultural Impacts

Include a Land Use Conflict Risk Assessment (LUCRA) to identify potential land use conflicts with surrounding agricultural land uses and the proposed mitigation measures in relation to the specific Stage 1 works.

26. Environmental Amenity

- Assess amenity impacts on the surrounding locality, including solar access, visual privacy, visual amenity, overshadowing, wind impacts and acoustic impacts. A high level of environmental amenity for any surrounding residential land uses must be demonstrated
- Provide:
 - o shadow diagrams
 - a view analysis of the site from key vantage points, streetscape locations and surrounding rural areas and public domain including photomontages or perspectives showing the proposed and likely future development
 - o an analysis of proposed lighting that identifies measures to reduce impacts of light spill into the surrounding sensitive receivers and rural properties.

27. Transport and Accessibility

Include a transport and accessibility impact assessment, which includes, but is not limited to the following:

- analysis of the existing transport network, including:
 - o road hierarchy
 - o pedestrian, cycle and public transport infrastructure
 - o details of current daily and peak hour vehicle movements based on traffic surveys and / or existing traffic studies relevant to the locality
 - o existing performance levels of nearby intersections utilising appropriate traffic

details of the proposed development, including:

- o a map of the proposed access which identifies public roads, bus routes, footpaths and cycleways
- vehicular access arrangements and sight lines, including for service and emergency vehicles and loading/unloading, including swept path analysis demonstrating the largest design vehicle entering and leaving the site and moving in each direction through intersections along the proposed transport routes
- o car parking, bicycle parking and end-of-trip facilities
- o drop-off / pick-zone(s) and bus bay(s)
- o pedestrian or road infrastructure improvements or safety measures.
- analysis of the impacts due to the operation of the proposed development, including:
 - o proposed modal split for all users of the development including vehicle, pedestrian, cyclist, public transport and other sustainable travel modes
 - o estimated total daily and peak hour vehicular trip generation
 - o a clear explanation and justification of the:
- § assumed growth rate applied
- § volume and distribution of proposed trips to be generated
- § type and frequency of design vehicles accessing the site
 - details of performance of nearby intersections with the additional traffic generated by the development both at the commencement of operation and in a 10-year time period (using SIDRA network modelling)
 - o cumulative traffic impacts from any surrounding approved development(s)
 - o adequacy of pedestrian, bicycle and public transport infrastructure to accommodate the development
 - o adequacy of car parking and bicycle parking provisions when assessed against the relevant car / bicycle parking codes and standards
 - adequacy of the drop-off / pick-up zone(s) and bus bay(s), including assessment of any related queuing during peak-hour access
 - o adequacy of the existing / proposed pedestrian infrastructure to enable convenient and safe access to and from the site for all users.
 - measures to ameliorate any adverse traffic and transport impacts due to the development based on the above analysis, including:
 - o travel demand management measures to encourage sustainable transport (such as a Green Travel Plan and / or specific Workplace Travel Plan)
 - o infrastructure improvements, including details of timing and method of delivery.
 - a preliminary operational traffic and access management plan for the site, the drop-off / pick-up zone(s) and bus bay(s)
 - analysis of the impacts of the traffic generated during construction of the proposed development, including:

- o construction vehicle routes, types and volumes
- o construction program (duration and milestones)
- o on-site car parking and access arrangements for construction, emergency and construction worker vehicles
- o cumulative impacts associated with other construction activities in the locality (if any)
- o road safety at identified intersections near the site due to conflicts between construction vehicles and existing traffic in the locality
- o measures to mitigate impacts, including to ensure the safety of pedestrian and cyclists during construction.
- a preliminary Construction Traffic and Pedestrian Management Plan.

28. Road infrastructure

- Address impacts of road widening of Old Pitt Town Road (under contributions plan 15 of Hills Shire Council) on the proposed development, including any requirement for land dedication.
- Include details of the proposed boundary levels at the Old Pitt Town Road frontage to ensure consistency with the road design as undertaken by Council.
- · Provide details of the road levels through to the internal road transition..

29. Ecologically Sustainable Development (ESD)

- Detail:
 - how ESD principles (as defined in clause 7(4) of Schedule 2 of the Regulation) would be incorporated in the design and ongoing operation phases of the development
 - o proposed measures to minimise consumption of resources, water (including water sensitive urban design) and energy
 - how the future development would be designed to consider and reflect national best practice sustainable building principles to improve environmental performance and reduce ecological impact. This should be based on a materiality assessment and include waste reduction design measures, future proofing, use of sustainable and low-carbon materials, energy and water efficient design (including water sensitive urban design) and technology and use of renewable energy

 how environmental design will be achieved in accordance with the GANSW Environmental Design in Schools Manual (GANSW, 2018).

Include:

- an assessment against an accredited ESD rating system or an equivalent program of ESD performance. This should include a minimum rating scheme target level
- o a statement regarding how the design of the future development is responsive to the CSIRO projected impacts of climate change
- o an Integrated Water Management Plan detailing any proposed alternative water supplies, proposed end uses of potable and non-potable water, and water sensitive urban design.

30. Heritage

- Provide a statement of significance and an assessment of the impact on the heritage significance of the heritage items on and adjacent to the site in accordance with the guidelines in the NSW Heritage Manual (Heritage Office and DUAP, 1996) and Assessing Heritage Significance (OEH, 2015)
- Address any archaeological potential and significance on the site and the impacts the development may have on this significance.
- Address the impacts of the development on the adjoining local heritage archaeological site (A3) known as 'bypassed section of Old Pitt Town Road'. Note: This section is the only part of the listed site bypassed by a bitumen surface.

31. Aboriginal Cultural Heritage

- Provide an Aboriginal Cultural Heritage Assessment Report (ACHAR) specifically for the Stage 1 works, consistent with the Concept Proposal ACHAR which:
 - o includes all the details of the Concept Proposal ACHAR.
 - demonstrates attempts to avoid any impact upon cultural heritage values and identify any conservation outcomes. Where impacts are unavoidable, the ACHAR and EIS must outline measures proposed to mitigate impacts. Any objects recorded as part of the assessment must be documented and notified to the relevant authority within the Heritage NSW.

32. Social Impacts

- Prepare a social impact assessment, which:
 - identifies and analyses the potential social impacts of the development, from the points of view of the affected community(s) and other relevant stakeholders, i.e. how they expect to experience the project
 - considers how potential environmental changes in the locality may affect people's way of life; community; access to and use of infrastructure, services, and facilities; culture; health and wellbeing; surroundings; personal and property rights; decision-making systems; and fears and aspirations, as

relevant and considering how different groups may be disproportionately affected

- assesses the significance of positive, negative, and cumulative social impacts considering likelihood, extent, duration, severity/scale, sensitivity/importance, and level of concern/interest
- o includes mitigation measures for likely negative social impacts, and any proposed enhancement measures
- o details how social impacts will be adaptively monitored and managed over time.

33. Noise and Vibration

- Provide a noise and vibration impact assessment that:
 - o includes a quantitative assessment of the main noise and vibration generating sources during demolition, site preparation, bulk excavation and construction
 - details the proposed construction hours and provide details of, and justification for, instances where it is expected that works would be carried out outside standard construction hours
 - includes a quantitative assessment of the main sources of operational noise, including consideration of any public-address system, school bell, mechanical services (e.g. air conditioning plant), use of any school hall for concerts etc. (both during and outside school hours) and any out of hours community use of school facilities, including outdoor sports facilities
 - o outlines measures to minimise and mitigate the potential noise impacts on nearby sensitive receivers
 - considers sources of external noise intrusion in proximity to the site (including, road rail and aviation operations) and identifies building performance requirements for the proposed development to achieve appropriate internal amenity standards
 - demonstrates that the assessment has been prepared in accordance with polices and guidelines relevant to the context of the site and the nature of the proposed development.

Provide:

a Biodiversity Development Assessment Report (BDAR), that assesses the

biodiversity impacts of the proposed development in accordance with the requirements of the *Biodiversity Conservation Act 2016*, *Biodiversity Conservation Regulation 2017* and Biodiversity Assessment Method, except where a BDAR waiver has been issued in relation to the development or the development is located on biodiversity certified land.

Where a BDAR is not required, because a BDAR waiver has been issued, in relation to the development, provide:

- a copy of the BDAR waiver and demonstrate that the proposed development is consistent with that covered in BDAR waiver
- an assessment of flora and fauna impacts where significant vegetation or flora and fauna values would be affected by the proposed development.

Where a BDAR is not required because the proposed development is located on biodiversity certified land:

- demonstrate that the proposed Stage 1 works are located on biodiversity certified land and provide details of relevant order(s) conferring biodiversity certification to the land and any associated maps
- identify if the site is affected by, or the proposed development impacts upon, any relevant biodiversity measures set out in an order conferring biodiversity certification to the land and provide details of any relevant consistency reviews considered in the preparation of planning controls affecting the site
- o identify if the site contains mapped existing or protected native vegetation and demonstrate that the proposed development is consistent with the provisions that apply to the mapped areas
- o an assessment of flora and fauna impacts where significant vegetation or flora and fauna values would be affected by the proposed development.
- o a biosecurity risk assessment outlining likely plant, animal and community risks in relation to the Stage 1 works.

Note: Further guidance is provided in the Biodiversity and Conservation Division Standard Environmental Assessment Requirements attached to the SEARs.

35. Contributions

- Identify:
 - any Section 7.11/7.12 Contribution Plans, Voluntary Planning Agreements or Special Infrastructure Contribution Plans that affect land to which the application relates or the proposed development type
 - any contributions applicable to the proposed development under the identified plans and/or agreements. Justification is to be provided where it is considered that the proposed development is exempt from making a contribution
 - any actions required by a Voluntary Planning Agreement or draft Voluntary Planning Agreement affecting the site or amendments required to a Voluntary Planning Agreement affected by the proposed development.

36. Staging

Assess impacts of construction staging (if any) and detail how construction works, and operations would be managed to ensure public safety and amenity on and surrounding the site.

37. Utilities

In consultation with relevant service providers:

- o assess of the impacts of the development on existing utility infrastructure and service provider assets surrounding the site
- o identify any infrastructure upgrades required off-site to facilitate the development and any arrangements to ensure that the upgrades will be implemented on time and be maintained
- o provide an infrastructure delivery and staging plan, including a description of how infrastructure requirements would be co-ordinated, funded and delivered to facilitate the development.

38. Stormwater Drainage

- Provide:
 - o a preliminary stormwater management plan for the development that:
- § is prepared by a suitably qualified person in consultation with Council and any other relevant drainage authority
- § details the proposed drainage design for the site including on-site detention facilities, water quality measures and the nominated discharge point
- § demonstrates compliance with Council or other drainage authority requirements.
- § demonstrates that stormwater discharge to the north-east corner of the site is attenuated to ensure post development flows do not exceed pre-development flows, and that concentrated flows directed to the downstream properties are minimised.
- § Where the means of disposal via an downstream easement is not available, details of an onsite absorption system must be provided.
- § The on-site absorption system must be designed by a suitably experienced and qualified civil engineer who must demonstrate that the on-site absorption system will not have an adverse impact upon adjoining and/or downstream properties by the direction or concentration of stormwater on those properties.
- § An analysis of soil absorption characteristics and other physical constraints must be submitted providing evidence that the on-site absorption system is appropriate for the property.
- § Evidence of consultation with the adjoining downstream property owners, providing clear details in relation to the proposed disposal of stormwater over their property.
 - Where drainage infrastructure works are required that would be handed over to Council, provide full hydraulic details and detailed plans and specifications of proposed works that have been prepared in consultation with Council and demonstrate compliance with Council's relevant standards.
