

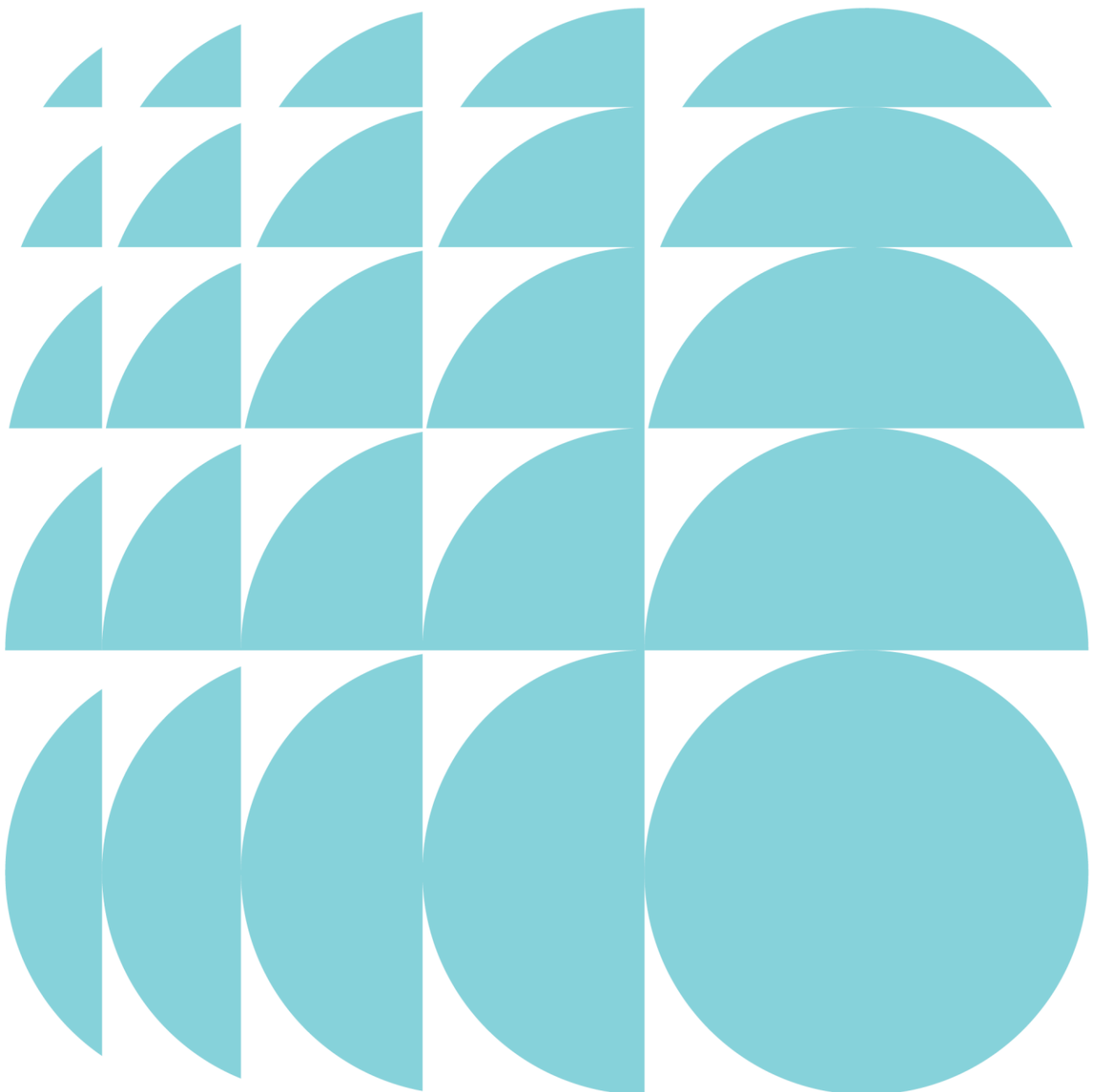

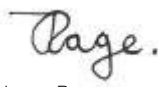

1.0 Executive Summary

This consultation outcomes report has been prepared by Ethos Urban on behalf of the University of Newcastle (UoN) to outline the key issues raised by the local community and key stakeholders during the preparation of the Concept Proposal for the Honeysuckle City Campus.

211 people participated in the consultation process including Newcastle City Council, government agencies, staff and students, local interest groups, local businesses, residents, property owners and the broader community. The feedback received has been considered during the preparation of the State Significant Development Application, which will be lodged with the Department of Planning and Environment.

The purpose of the consultation was to ensure that all stakeholders were informed about the proposal and had an opportunity to provide feedback prior to lodgement of the SSDA.

Activities included:

- Establishment of project email address;
- Letterbox drop to surrounding neighbours;
- Letters to all stakeholders;
- Advertisement in the Newcastle Herald;
- Newcastle City Council, state agency and stakeholders meetings;
- Three staff and student information sessions (one at each UoN Campus)
- A stakeholder information session;
- A Registered Aboriginal Parties information session and
- Two Community information sessions.

Consultation outcomes overview:

The majority of stakeholders and community members gave positive feedback about the Concept Plan. This included:

- Support for the Concept Design including:
 - General support for the height of buildings. A few local residents expressed some concern about the 'closeness' of some of the buildings to their building but this was not a significant theme;
 - Support for the inclusion of mix use development and student accommodation, alongside the proposed academic buildings;
 - General comments about the importance of open space and compliments about the amount of open space included in the Concept Plan;
- Excitement about the increased UoN presence in the CBD; and
- Request for more detailed information about transport integration and future public and active transport strategies.

In addition, several comments were received about public transport and parking across the CBD more broadly.

Due to the significant stakeholder and community support, no changes to the Concept Plan were made prior to the submission of the SSDA. There will be additional engagement prior to the submission of SSDAs for each of the development sites.

2.0 Introduction

This consultation outcomes report has been prepared by Ethos Urban on behalf of the University of Newcastle (UoN) to outline the key issues raised by the local community and key stakeholders during the preparation of the Concept Proposal for the Honeysuckle City Campus.

This report includes information on the project context, the stakeholder and community engagement approach undertaken and the consultation findings. The report will be submitted alongside the State Significant Development Application, which will be lodged with the Department of Planning and Environment.

2.1 Project Context

The Honeysuckle City Campus is located on a series of connected lots between Honeysuckle Drive and Civic Lane. The development of the Honeysuckle City Campus in the heart of Newcastle forms part of the UoN's NeW Futures Strategic Plan (2016-2025), which promotes a long-term vision of delivering new modes of education focused around a compact campus setting in a central location.

The proposed development would be the next step in achieving this vision and will build on the UoN's historical presence (University House, Northumberland House, and Conservatorium of Music) and the more recent development of NeW Space in the CBD.

The proposed development is an important part of achieving this vision and will enable the UoN to create an integrated urban education environment that builds on the amenity offered by a CBD location, the proximity to world class beaches and a rapidly developing waterfront.

2.2 Objectives of the Development

The University of Newcastle's objectives include:

- Provide a world class educational precinct that attracts the best students and academic staff and promotes UoN's national and global presence in education, research and innovation;
- Create building envelopes capable of achieving design excellence with minimal impact on adjoining land uses;
- Contribute to the revitalisation and activation of the Newcastle CBD, promoting investment in the CBD and the growth of complementary land uses; and
- Establish an urban campus that is integrated with the surrounding context and provides a high level of pedestrian amenity and permeability at ground level with high quality public domain and landscaping treatments.

2.3 Concept Proposal

A Concept Proposal has been prepared to guide the future redevelopment of the Honeysuckle City Campus. The Concept Proposal seeks approval for the staged expansion of the Honeysuckle City Campus and will provide a statutory framework for the long-term development of the site.

The proposal seeks consent for the establishment of building envelopes for seven new buildings across the site. Future buildings will be subject to subsequent detailed development applications or other approval pathways, and will be generally consistent with the Staged SSD consent.

Indicatively, the Concept Proposal will be delivered over at least four stages. Future stages will be subject to subsequent detailed development applications. The proposed scope of the Concept Proposal includes:

- The establishment of building envelopes for seven (7) new buildings across the site, to be used for academic and ancillary uses, and student accommodation;
- Potential maximum Gross Floor Area (GFA) of 62,573m², representing a FSR of 3.07:1;
- Maximum building heights ranging between (between 4-9 storeys);
- Design Excellence Strategy outlining the process through which design excellence will be achieved and Design Guidelines to inform the future design of the built form, including:
 - Pedestrian and vehicle access arrangements;
 - Parking and loading;
 - Preliminary landscape design; and
 - Proposed staging of the delivery of the campus.

3.0 Consultation

3.1 Consultation Approach

Ethos Urban's approach was based on extensive experience designing and delivering strategic communication and consultation processes for a variety of projects.

The consultation program was designed to be practical and effective in capturing valuable feedback, mitigating risks, and highlighting key benefits of the project.

The transparent and comprehensive engagement process was:

- *Accessible* – a number of consultation sessions and opportunities were provided to interested stakeholders;
- *Engaging* – it motivated participation, particularly for time poor people;
- *Respectful, genuine and constructive* – the University of Newcastle is committed to contributing positively to the Newcastle CBD and working closely with all stakeholders to ensure the best outcomes for everyone;
- *Inclusive* – groups were strategically targeted; and
- *Tailored* – communications were tailored for each audience.

3.2 Consultation Overview

The public consultation process commenced on Wednesday 9 May 2017 with the issue of letters to key stakeholder, postcard to the local area, and the placement of an advertisement in the Newcastle Herald. This was followed by a series of briefings, presentations and information sessions to present and gain feedback on the Concept Plan. More information on each activity follows.

3.2.6 Feedback mechanisms

Information session attendees were encouraged to complete a feedback form. 54 feedback forms were received during the consultation.

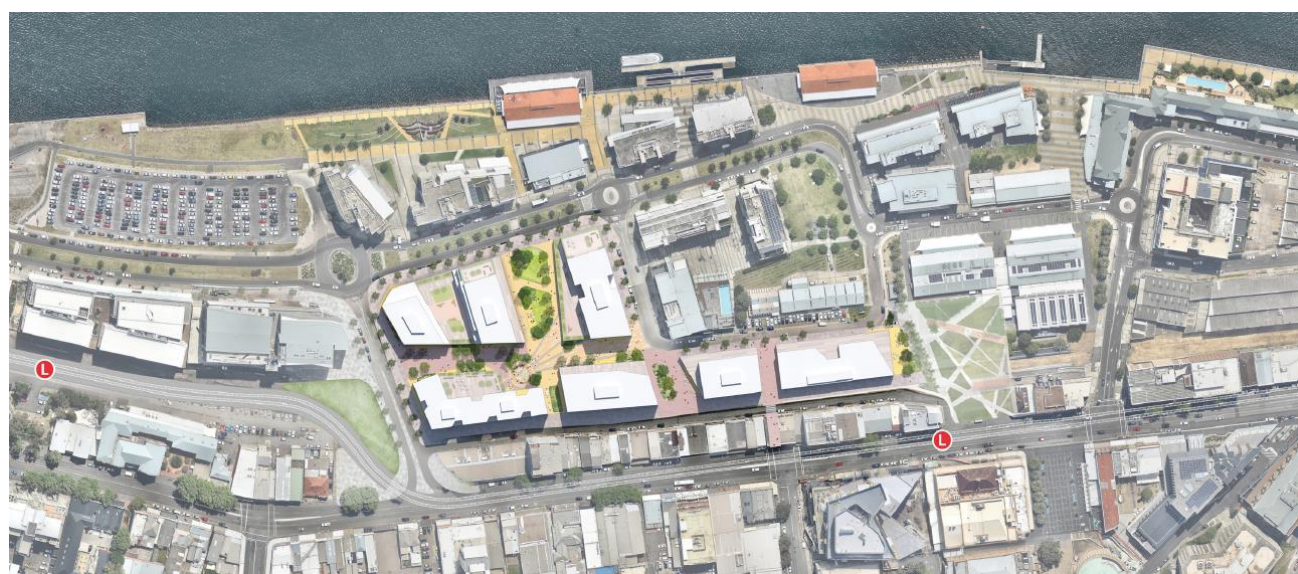

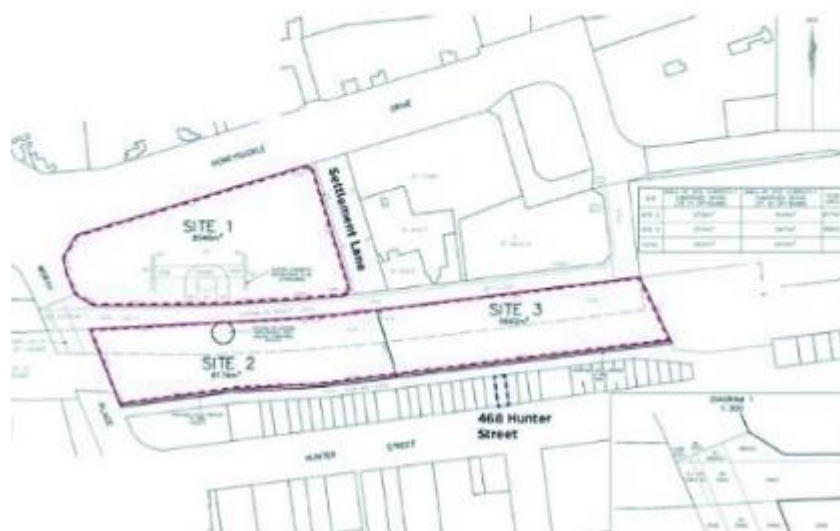

CITY CONTEXT



Site Location

The site is located close to the Hunter River waterfront and will link to the Civic Centre. The emerging urban education precinct will be further enhanced by the development of this new campus.

The Honeysuckle site is well positioned to support easy, walking access across and between the entire University of Newcastle education precinct, the wider CBD, and the Honeysuckle and Civic light rail stations.

The site's north facing aspect and close proximity to the waterfront will create a great environment for students, staff and visitors to enjoy.



PROJECT OVERVIEW

The University of Newcastle is in the process of progressing the Honeysuckle City Campus Development. This initiative is part of the University's long-term vision to grow, develop knowledge and be a driver of our innovative regional economy. It is an integral part of the University's NeW Futures Strategic Plan 2016 – 2025.

The first stage (Stage 1A) of the project includes the Hunter Innovation Hub which will form part of the University's Integrated Innovation Network (I2N).

This is a joint initiative of:

- NSW Government
- Newcastle City Council
- Newcastle Now
- Hunter DIGIT

The development will build on the University's historical presence (University House, Northumberland House and Conservatorium of Music) and the most recent strategic development of NeW Space.

INNOVATION HUB AND SCHOOL OF CREATIVE INDUSTRIES

The first stage of the project includes the Hunter Innovation Project's Innovation Hub, a joint initiative with the NSW Government, Newcastle City Council, Newcastle NOW and Hunter DIGIT, plus additional new facilities for the University's School of Creative Industries.



Hunter Innovation Project (HIP)

This is a jointly-funded initiative with the NSW Government and the University Partners that make up the Integrated Innovation Network (I2N):

- Newcastle City Council
- Newcastle NOW
- Hunter DIGIT.

This Hub will be an important piece of infrastructure that will enable strong contributions to the transition of our regional economy while providing spaces for the University's students, staff and collaborators to generate ideas and products.

School of Creative Industries

The **UON School of Creative Industries** was formed in 2017 and is housed in the NeW Space building. It has positioned UON as the education provider of choice for creative enterprises and artistic endeavours. As our leadership in innovation and entrepreneurship has developed, the need for further physical assets to support our creative output was identified. The Honeysuckle City Campus will be an ideal fit to foster continued growth in this field.



ACCESS AND TRANSPORT

Access to the area will be significantly improved through the opening of new streets, new light rail stops and the new open space upgrades throughout the CBD.

While the main street address is likely to be on Honeysuckle Drive, the primary pedestrian movement will be to the east, west and south.

The site is half way between the Honeysuckle and Civic Light Rail stops.

Vehicle access will be improved by a new link across the rail corridor at Worth Place, delivering a left in/left out at Hunter Street with the potential to add a new right turn out of Worth Place into Hunter Street in the future.

Transport strategy

The Honeysuckle City Campus Development team will work with authorities to develop an overall Transport Strategy which is subject to approval by the Department of Planning and Environment and presented to the community and stakeholders during public exhibition of the project.

At this stage, it is not anticipated that the Stage 1A works will impact CBD transport services.

As a member of the Newcastle community, the University is committed to minimising the impacts on existing traffic and parking conditions.

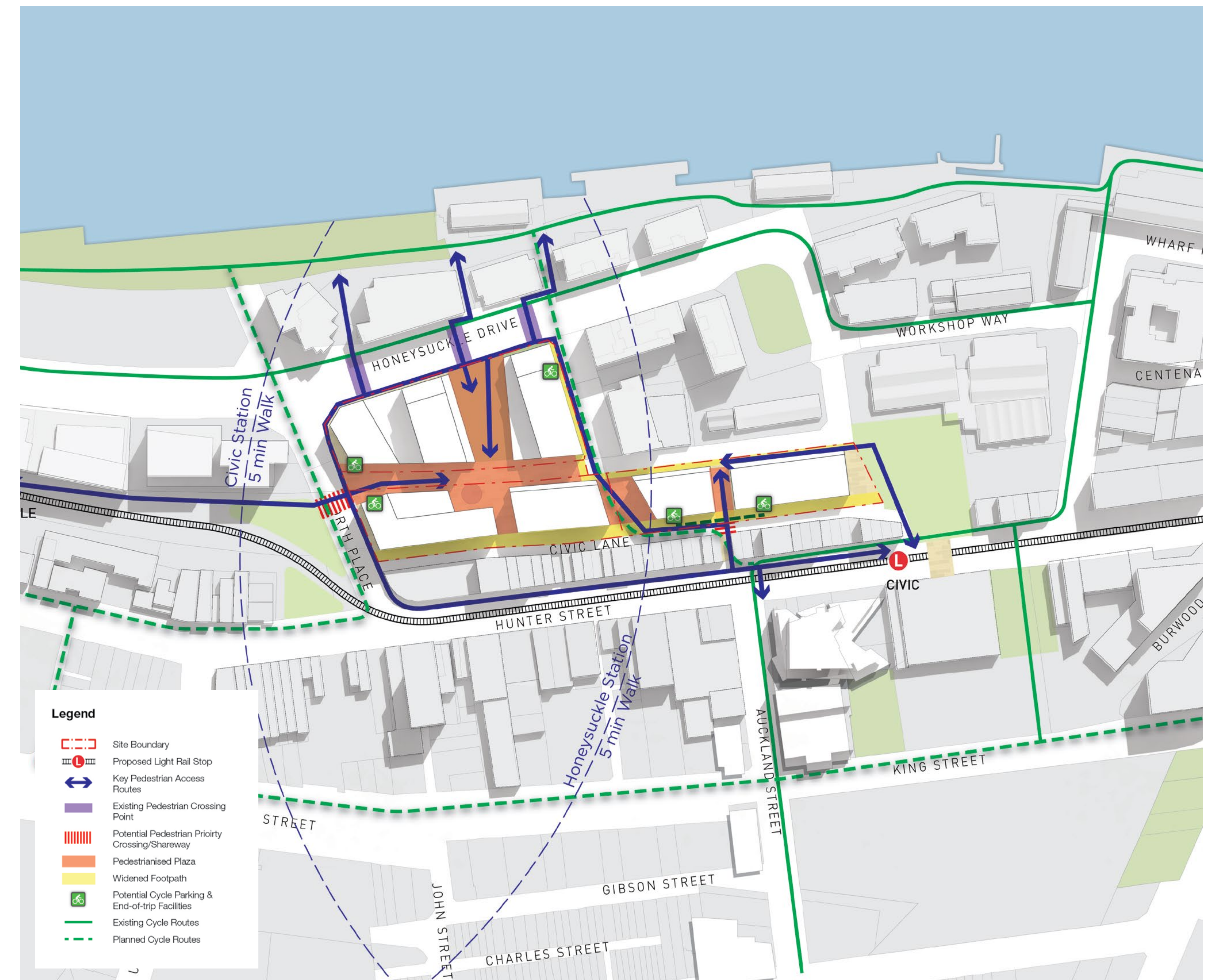
The University aims to:

- Help ease congestion and reduce the amount of cars in the Newcastle CBD
- Support the city's growth into the future
- Embrace the adoption of a range of sustainable transport options.

If planning approval for Stage 1A is granted, works will be scheduled in early 2019.

University of Newcastle will work closely with Council and the community to inform of any changes to:

- Access
- Road closures
- Parking
- Construction activities.

PLANNING OVERVIEW

The University of Newcastle must obtain planning approval from the NSW Department of Planning and Environment (DPE) before Stage 1A works can commence on the Honeysuckle site.

The project is being assessed as a State Significant Development (SSD) under the Environmental Planning and Assessment Act 1979 and the provisions of the State Environmental Planning Policy (State and Regional Development) 2011.

The SSD application for Stage 1A will seek approval for the development of a new building on Site 1 at the Honeysuckle City Campus that will accommodate the University's School of Creative Industries (SOCl) and an 'Innovation Hub'. The Stage 1A proposal includes:

- Design and construction of a single standing, multi-storey building on the corner of Worth Place and Honeysuckle Drive;
- Space to be occupied by the HIP Innovation Hub and the School of Creative Industries.
- Building fit out to make these spaces fit for purpose.
- Associated landscaping and infrastructure works.

Site Boundary Diagram

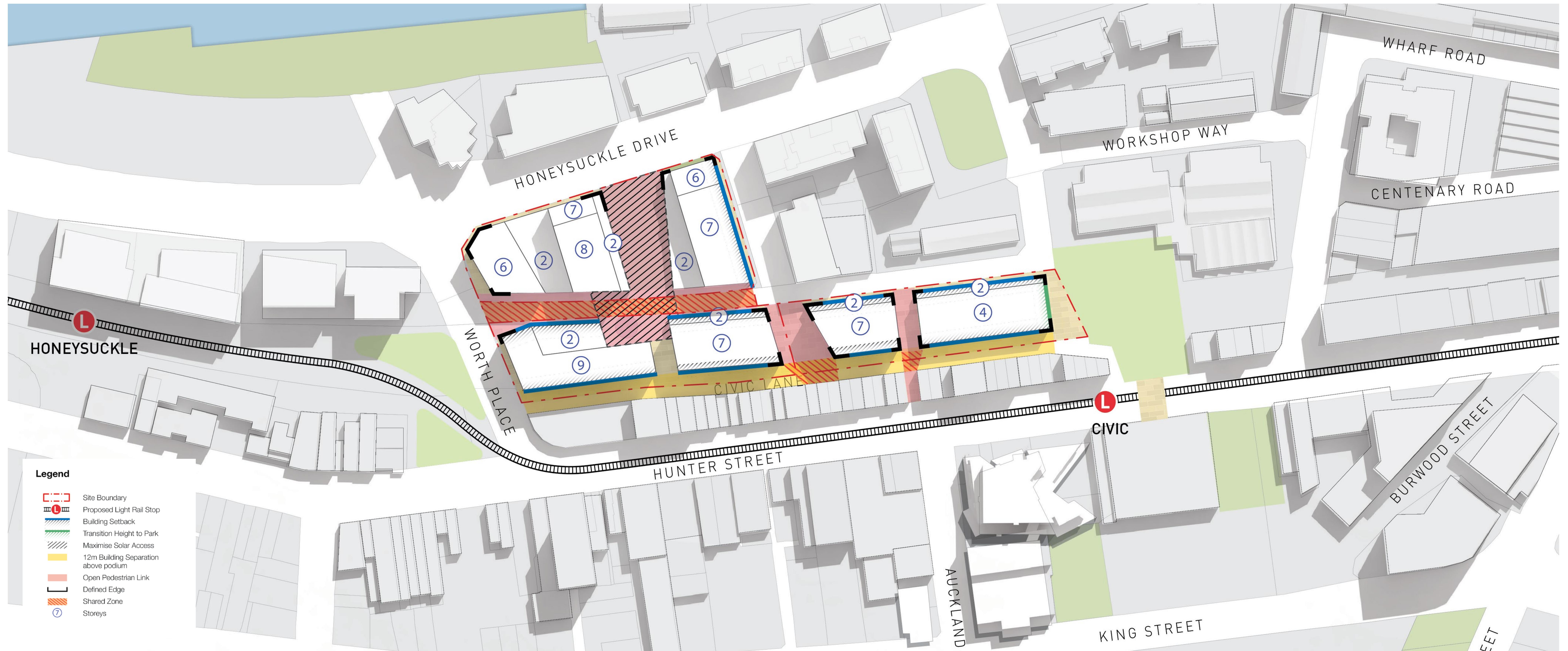

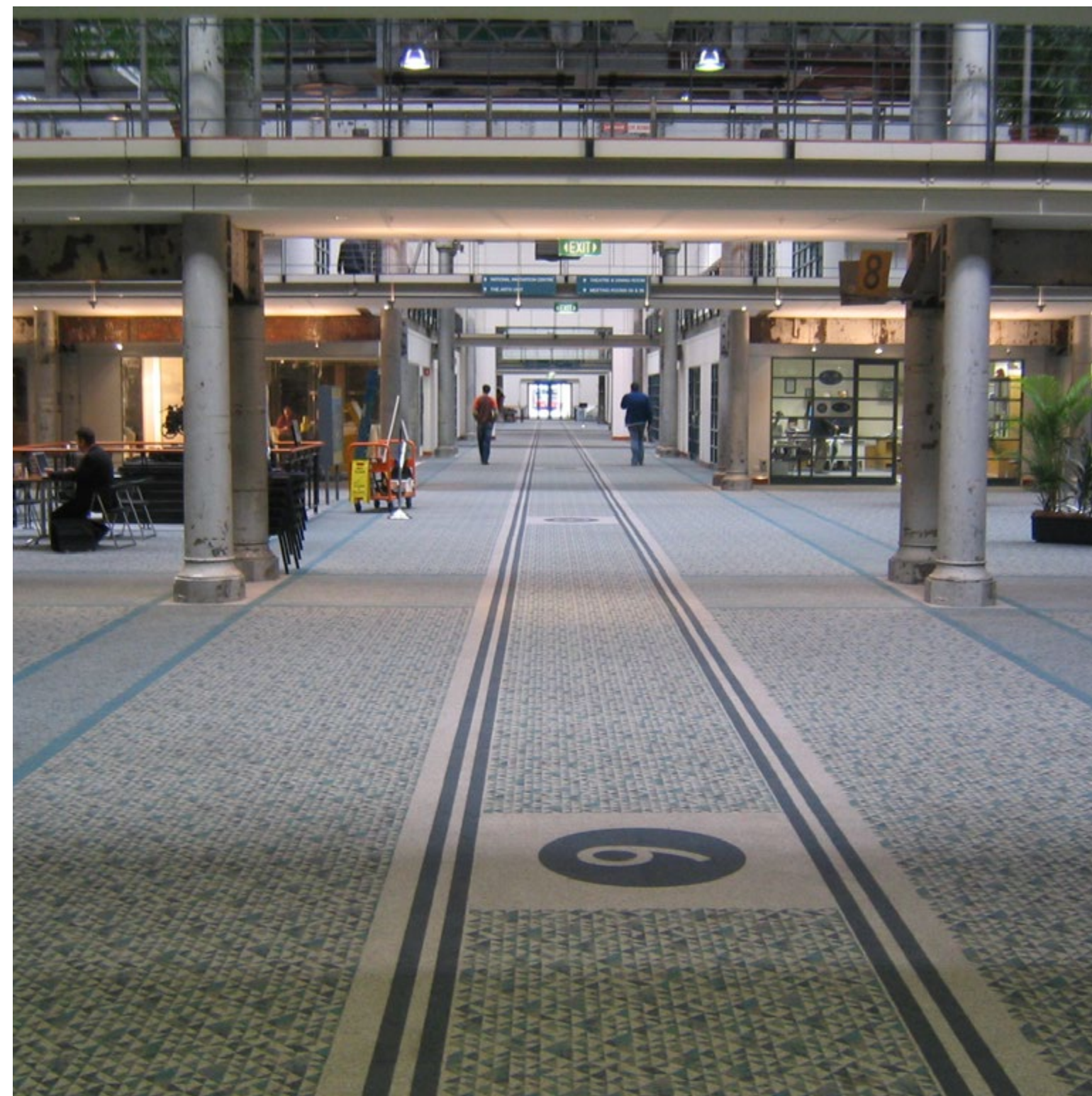
HERITAGE INTERPRETATION

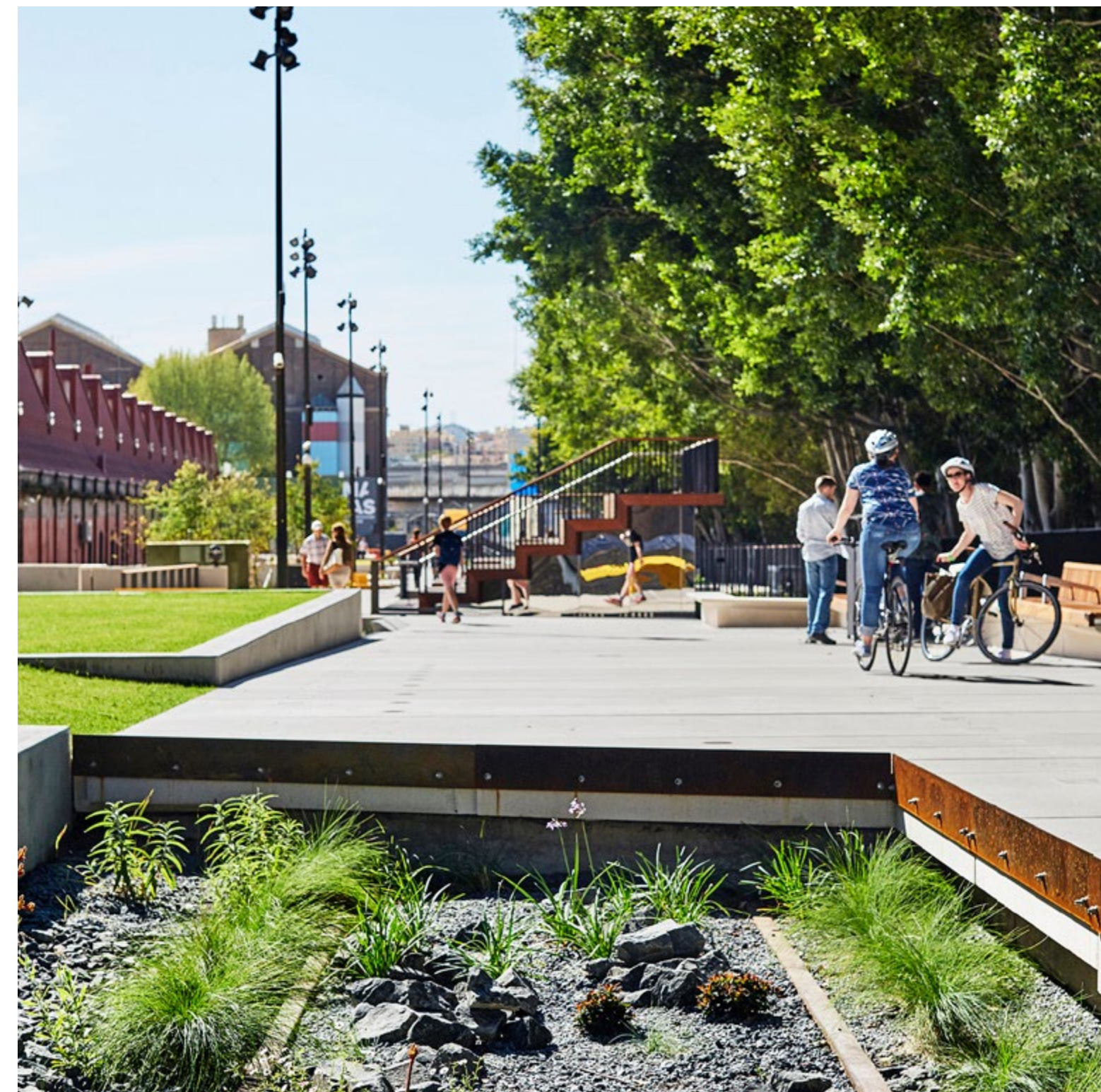
Specialist cultural and heritage assessment will consider:

- Newcastle Harbour

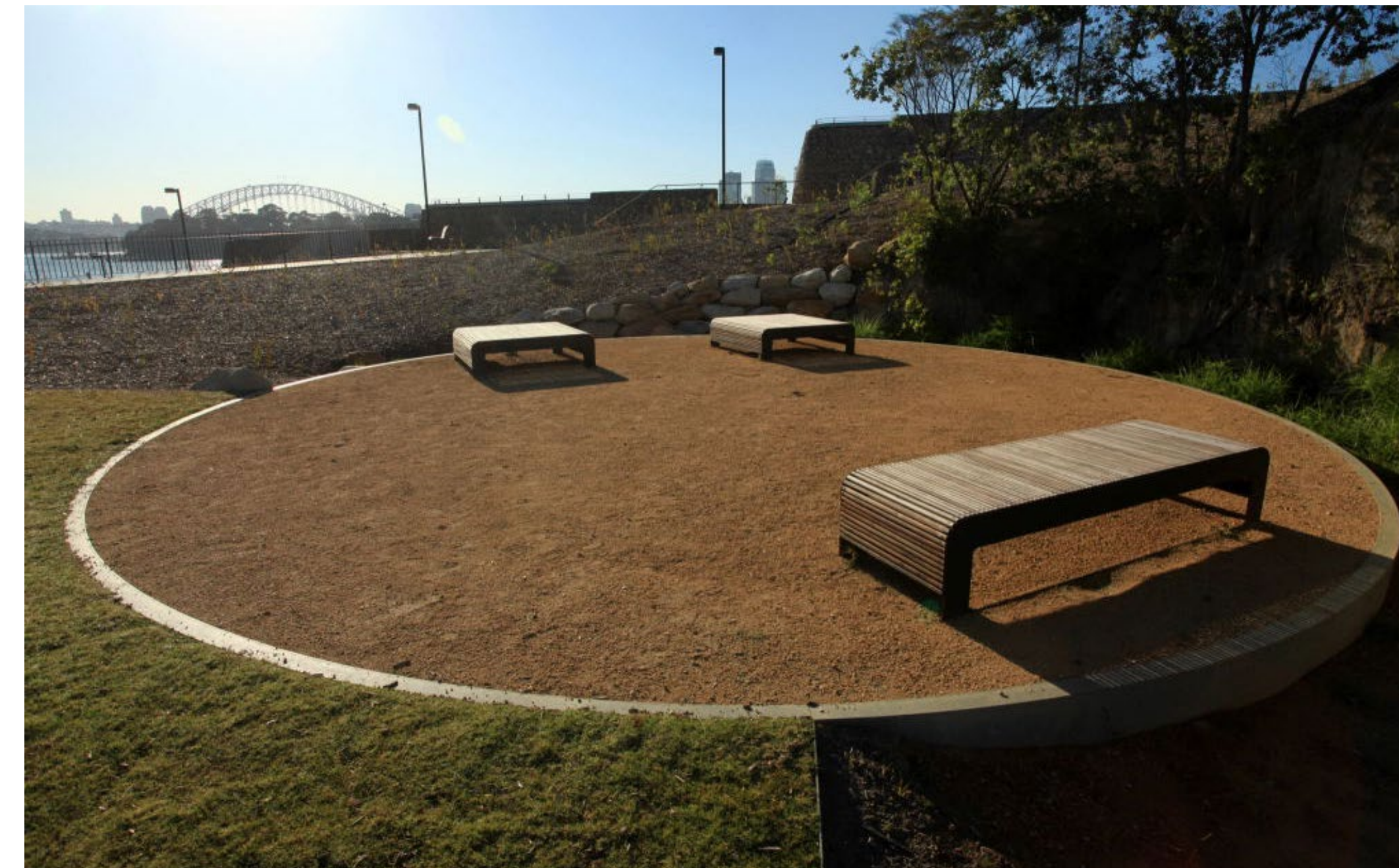

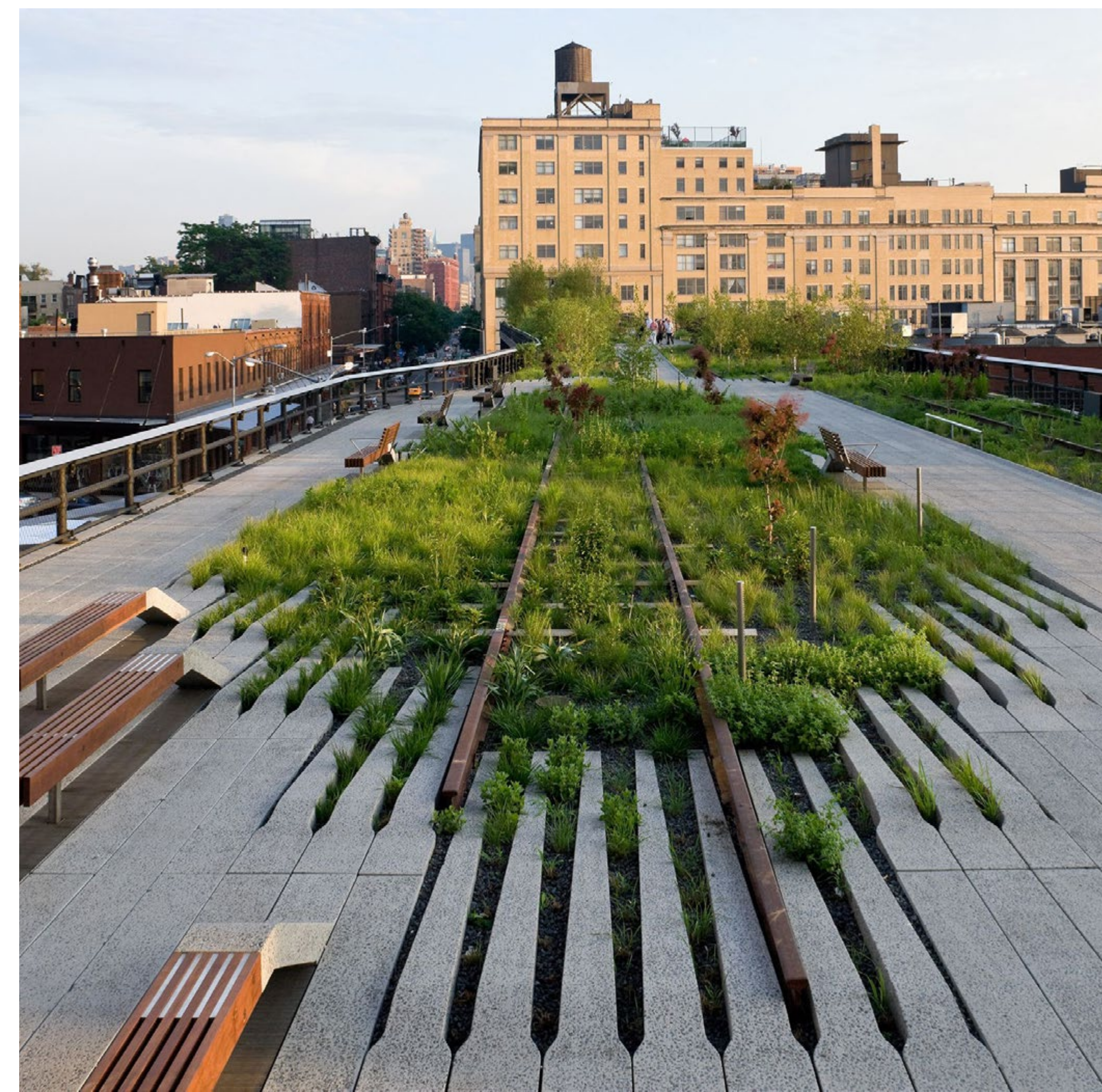
Heritage interpretation, Australian Technology Park

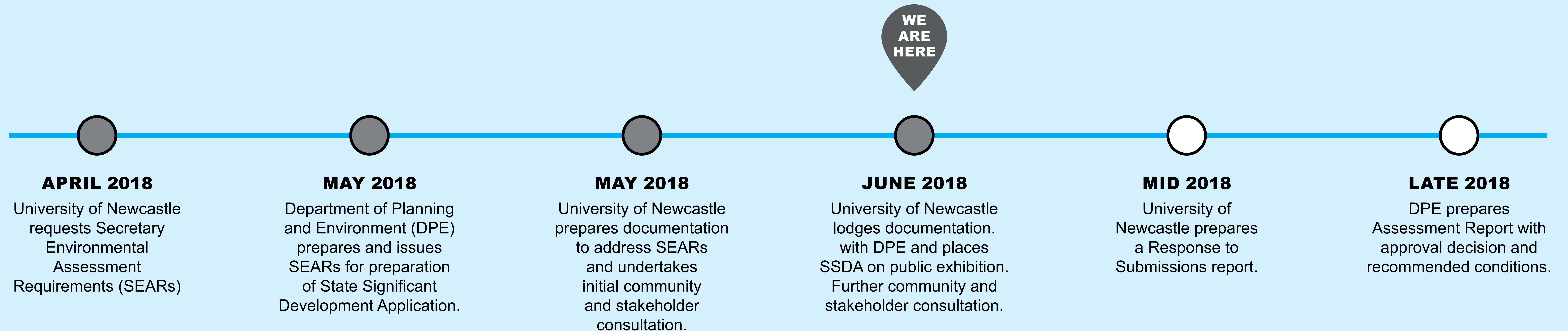
