We are writing as concerned landowners and residents from the Jerry's Plains area to voice our objection to HVO South Modification 5 Project.

We are farmers and residents of Jerry's Plains, not anti-coal mining activists. We believe this country needs mining, however it should not be allowed to destroy and impact on high quality agricultural land, Rural Villages and our most precious resource of all, our water, without water this country will be doomed.

The visual impact, noise and dust that we already experience now is unbelievable. And now they want to increase the height of the overburden so we get more dust, noise and more rocky moonscape mountains to look at.

Where is the topsoil going to come from for rehabilitation – we all know the majority of the topsoil has already ended up on the bottom of the overburden piles.

With an increase in extraction rates, and a final void of 523 ha there will be adverse impacts on groundwater, the discharge into the Hunter River System will cause more pollution for the already struggling River System. The cumulative impacts are too great.

We believe that the future of the historic village of Jerry's Plains and surrounding agricultural area must be protected from the pollutions of dust and noise that will be greatly increased by this modification.
