Dear Sir,

I am writing about the modifications to the M4-M5 link at Johnston Street, North Ryde and changes affecting pedestrians.

My husband and I regularly walk along the Bicentennial Park foreshore, often with our pre-schooler granddaughter. We get onto the foreshore park via the pedestrian crossing at the northern end of Johnston St, where it intersects with the Crescent. We walk down Johnston St to this crossing - very straightforward, very safe. This is the main access route for people from Anandale, Leichhardt and the southern part of Lilyfield. Many, like us are elderly or have small children in strollers, some families with children (all on bikes) also cross here, as do adult cyclists.

The proposed changes will mean we will have to traverse 4 or 5 traffic light-controlled crossings, taking much more time and involving greater risk, no I do mention having to endure breathing 160

exhaust fumes of many vehicles whilst waiting to cross and crossing. I believe our walk down Duxton Street to the crossing points will also entail more danger to health and safety because of the increased traffic volumes (and their fumes)

The former Leckhardt Council went to great expense and trouble to restore the waterfront industrial area to foreshore parkland to create Blackwattle Park. Ease of access and the connection of quite heavily populated residential areas has greatly improved amenity and physical and psychological health for residents. Being able to see the waterways coming down Duxton Street also gives a lift - our community extends into this open space. These benefits will all be lost if the proposed upgrade proceeds. I therefore beseech you to reconsider this chaotic change to what was approved.

At the very least please consult with the local community about alternative means of access, such as a pedestrian tunnel across to the park.
