To have the noise from the shooting range increase will ruin the lovely environment that we live in. The native wildlife will not want to stay and who knows what damage it will do to the domestic animals that cannot get away from the noise. I have a neighbour trying to sell her house and has been told that people are put off by the shooting range. Imagine trying to sell when the noise sounds like World War 3 is happening in your backyard.

Homes within 2000 metres and at the site itself, which is within 5 metres of Blue Mountain World Heritage, Nattai National Park, Bargo State Conservation Area and Bargo River State Conservation Area not only residents but bushwalkers, horse riders, birdwatchers and nature lovers will be severely disturbed, distressed and impacted by the gunshot noise levels seek to say will be acceptable.. Even the SSAA consultant has measured the gun noise at the NPWS lands at 110dbl already with just one gun firing! This is dangerous to human hearing - image that coming from 200 guns every weekend. Also has a fauna survey been done to establish the effect of 200 guns at 110dbl on the 106 protected species of native wildlife living on and around the range
