I suppose the thing in the article that really resonated with the situation the residents are confronting at Hill Top, due to the rifle range, is that, and I quote from page 3 of the article: 'More significantly, it emerged that he, (the mass murderer), is a member of the Oslo pistol club and has three weapons registered in his name: a Glock pistol, a rifle and a shotgun'.
