re: Coalpac Mine Extensions - Development Applications 07_0127 MOD 4 and DA 200-5-2003 MOD 2

I am writing in regard to the development applications currently on public exhibition for the extension of the respective mining areas of the Invincible Colliery and Cullen Valley Mine, both owned by Coalpac Pty Ltd located on Castlereagh Highway, Cullen Bullen, NSW 2790. Officers from the Public Health Unit have reviewed the documents available on your website with regard to the development proposal and provide the following comments for your consideration.

These comments are contingent upon the measurements and modelling fulfilling the requirements of the approved methods and policies.

Air quality issues due to mining activities

The health effects of particulate matter are well established. Any increase in exposure is associated with some increase in health risk. I note that proposed project is expected to cause a small increase in particulate matter concentration at a number of sensitive receptors. To minimise any potential health impacts it is recommended that, should the project be approved, the proponent is required to do all that is reasonable and feasible to minimise particulate matter emissions.

I note that exceedences of the DECCW 24hr PM_{10} assessment criterion are predicted for three mine-owned residences. If there is any expectation that these residences will be occupied, it is recommended that additional consideration is given to reactive dust management systems that could reduce the probability of such exceedences. Noise and vibration

There is increasing evidence that exposure to noise is associated with health effects. I note that the EIS predicts noise impacts above the Industrial Noise Policy's intrusive criteria for a number of residences. However, there is no description of noise mitigation measures. We recommend that a noise management plan be required prior to any approval to ensure there are minimal impacts on the local community from noise.
