Re: Objection to Drayton South Coal Project Application Number SSD 6875

I write as a concerned landholder and business owner to object to the second application by Anglo American for the Drayton South open coal mine project.

I have been a landholder and vineyard owner in the Denman area since 1996. Our business consists of the production of high quality wine grapes which are supplied to a variety of other wine companies. We are one of the largest grape producers in the Upper Hunter Valley.

In the years following our establishment of the Pyramid Hill vineyard, we have seen many rural business purchased and then closed down by mining operations. We consider that the critical mass of other rural industries has been very severely impacted by mining operations, and further large mining projects in the area encompassing Jerrys Plains, Denman and Muswellbrook will significantly negatively impact the remaining rural industries.

In particular, the viticulture industry requires a positive environmental image in order to thrive. The environmental reputation of the Hunter Valley is critical if Hunter wines are to maintain a viable position in a marketplace that is ever more conscious of environmental factors. In recent years, the industry has invested heavily in making sure its practices are environmentally sustainable and further large coal mine developments threaten the 'clean' credentials that we have developed.

The Drayton South project directly threatens large rural businesses in its vicinity, specifically two of the largest thoroughbred horse studs in the country, as well as the Hollydene winery and restaurant. The horse studs are key employers in the region and bring positive international attention to the Upper Hunter.

We believe that the cumulative impact of this development, with its negative health and environmental impacts, will make the continued diversity of rural businesses untenable. There is a grave risk that approval of this project will push the Upper Hunter down a 'one industry' track that will result in the closure of many the rural industries. This is a track from which there will be no return.

The Planning Assessment Commission refused a mine development on this site in 2014 because of the threat the project posed to other rural industries and to the environment of the Upper Hunter. We submit that these factors remain the same today, and a slightly smaller development proposal should not be viewed as no longer posing a threat to the area.

In 2014 the PAC determined that this project was not in the public interest. We can see no reason why that view should have changed, and the project continues to not be in the national interest in 2015. Consequently the application should be refused.
