I am very concerned about the cumulative impacts of yet another mine on our quality of life —change in natural environment and health impacts — whilst there are many unknowns there are also the obvious. I recognise there is no definitive link as yet but it appears the younger children are impacted by their environment which is surrounded by open cut mines and coal trains.

The tourism of this valley relies on its brand of the Hunter Valley – viticulture, agriculture, national parks and rivers – ie the pristine environment and landscape. Further erosion of our surrounding environment is not sustainable.
