Noise

Dr Mariana Alves-Pereira from Lisbon's Lusofona University specialises in studying the effects of Low Frequency Sound on human beings. She says that people who live near open cut mines are exposed all day every day. Workers go home and their bodies get a rest away from it. Before they return to work again.

She says that governments should base their measurements of LFN on linear decibels and not weighted decibels that screen out noise frequency. This material was in the Newcastle Herald on 9/10/2016. Has this been taken into account for the properties affected by the mine?

Air quality

I believe that if this project gets the go ahead, those who love Gloucester will fight it with civil disobedience. In the light of Climate Change and the dropping price of coal, it is ridiculous to hand this coal which is the property of the citizens of NSW to a company for perpetuity. It is well documented when coal mines open in a district in Australia there's some new jobs at first. Mostly for outsiders. Inflation soon follows in particular with house prices and rentals.
