The tank has been empty since before Easter, and the reality of what it is like to live with little or no drinkable water is a new reality for me - one that I would struggle to explain and certainly had no idea when I lived in a city.

SALT

This project will produce tons of salt
tons and tonnes, for which there is not a

Social Capital

This is so hard to define, but I can see
divisions in the community already, I have
been verbally abused in the main street of
Narrabri for holding up a banner in a
peaceful protest.

The sense of cohesion of a community of
diverse people is such a precious asset,
and one in which I have been proud of. Listening
to speakers from Miles in Queensland, who
gave account of how their town changed
was sad but enlightening in many
unexpected ways. Land values skyrocketed
the older generation (volunteers who ran the
sports clubs, rotary, etc) all sold and left
the community is still struggling to replace
them.

I see nothing positive about this project, see no money
has been allocated for possible remedial work.
See great harm potentially to local farms, and
farming families, such a short sighted approach
to a wonderful forest.
