We have been residents of McArthurs Crossing, between Berrima and Medway, for 25 years on our property *Billarimba*. We own land on both sides of the Wingecarribee River, west of Berrima — a property unique for its mix of native flora and fauna, including many endangered species. On Nov. 4th 2010, we signed a Conservation Agreement to share with the government the responsibility of protecting the land and its plants and animals.

We object to this proposal and believe it should be rejected for its impact on WATER and WILDLIFE.

Drinking Water and Ground Water Threatened

• We and others in the area rely on tank water for our drinking water, which we cannot guarantee will be safe from pollution from the washing, loading and unloading of the coal.

• 93 bores on 71 properties will be affected by water drawdown. The impact on bores will remain for 35 to 65 years after mining ceases. (ES4.1.2)

• The bore on our property provides water we use for firefighting and growing food.

• Water used to wash coal and residual "spoil", which will be pumped back underground into mine voids, has the potential to impact groundwater systems. (ES4.1.1)

• We have seen firsthand the impact on groundwater and the Wingecarribee River system of the existing Medway Colliery so we know this irreversible damage is likely.

• The water in this area is part of Sydney Water Catchment and flows into the Sydney Water supply. We gave observed several major flooding events in the last five years and during these events it is known there can be no guarantee of a safe drinking water supply.

Rare and Endangered Animals and Plants Threatened

• We are the guardians of an important corridor for animals and signed our agreement in 2010, which we expected you the government to uphold.

• We are Partners in Conservation and depend on the government to honour the Agreement, because it is a legal document.

 The dust and potential water pollution from the mine will gravely affect endangered birds and mammals — they will be wiped out. (Please see the attached list)
We included details of the endangered species in our

correspondence to Mark Speakman, MP (27th October 2015).
