I object to this proposal.

I live directly opposite 180 Clarke Street (the site). For many years I have been closely associated with marine activities along our East Coast. I am a Marine Contractor and yachtsman of wide experience.

Port Stephens has complex tidal patterns; it's extensive shallow areas, interspersed with very deep areas (over 30 metres in depth), coupled with being the confluence of two rivers (Myall and Karuah), making the Port one of the largest areas of water on the East Coast of Australia. It bears the Aboriginal name of the Bay of Shifting Sands and is often described as a "clean" port with little commercial shipping. It is a tourism "jewel".

My objection continues on these grounds.

I am convinced that a powerful pump lifting estuarine water from our Port adjacent to a dedicated Marine Park would draw in bi-catch regardless of any filtering process. This entrainment would negate any precautionary duty of care and would be abhorrent to this objector.

The proposal is planned to be sited over <u>9kms</u> upstream from the ocean headlands. (By comparison Sydney Harbour Bridge is sited 7kms upstream from Sydney Heads).

There has recently been a widespread accretion of sand ranging from 10 to 30 cm in depth in the site area. Why? So much is unknown.

Normally abalone thrive along the coast in cold ocean water. To attempt farming abalone in this estuary 9kms from the open sea is bound to cause grave problems similar to those experienced in South East Australia. Any fouling of the Port from waste pipes may wash around for weeks on end before being flushed out to sea. Any waste discharge into the Port would be abhorrent to this writer and a complete absence of Duty of Care by this Government.

Should those of us who live in and love Port Stephens be asked to share in the risk of fouling the Port?

I would also raise a concern regarding recently discovered aspects of the mining industry in the Hunter Valley that show a profound impact on people's health from ILFN – Infrasound Low Frequency Noise – *source "Rich Land Waste Land" (2012) Sharyn Munro (Page 126) Pan MacMillan Australia.* This proposed "farm" would have electrical machinery going 24 hours a day. Such machinery will clearly generate some form of noise.

Once again it begs the question. Should the people of this area be exposed to such a risk?

YOUR SUPPORT IS NEEDED URGENTLY - this proposal is NOT like an oyster lease. This land based factory will:

- Suck 50 mega Litres (20 Olympic sized swimming pools) per day, (24/7) of our Port's water in and out of our beautiful, pristine Port Stephens to grow abalone in large tanks in a factory shed
- Circulate sea water and waste/effluent discharged by 4 x 650mm diameter pipes that will extend into the Port by half a kilometre
- Discharge 1000 kg of nitrogen and other waste per year into the Port through pipes 9km inside the port from the open ocean
- Discharge the waste into the estuary, which can take in excess of 12-14 days to flush, potentially causing unimaginable damage to the underwater environment

All other Abalone Farms are in coastal areas, not in estuaries! This is a dangerous, unwelcome "precedent".

The potential risk of **mollusc disease (Ganglioneuritis, Perkinsus and other diseases)** has already happened in Victoria (over 1,200 km on Victorian coast, destroying 90% of wild abalone). This environmental disaster has now spread to Tasmania despite Government agencies efforts to contain it. Mollusc disease has been, and still is killing native marine life. If you care about the condition of our Port and the future of our region...
