

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1. BACKGROUND



Cadia Valley Operations (Cadia) is one of Australia's largest gold mining operations and is 100 per cent owned by Newcrest Mining Ltd. It is located approximately 25 kilometers from the city of Orange in Central West New South Wales (see Figure 1).

Cadia comprises two mines - the Cadia East underground panel cave mine which commenced commercial production on 1 January 2013 and the Ridgeway underground mine (currently under care and maintenance). The previously mined Cadia Hill open pit is now utilised for tailings deposition and is referred to as the Pit Tailings Storage Facility (PTSF).



At Cadia, Newcrest produces gold doré from a gravity circuit and gold-rich copper concentrates from a flotation circuit. Gold doré from Cadia is refined in Australia and concentrates are piped to a dewatering plant at nearby Blayney and sent by rail to Port Kembla in New South Wales for export mainly to Eastern Asia.

2. CADIA COMMUNITY CONSULTATIVE COMMITTEE

The NSW Department of Planning, Industry and Environment (DPIE) is committed to ensuring project proponents and project owners engage with the community and stakeholder groups on State significant projects. It recognises that community stakeholders should have a say in matters that affect their lives, and that community engagement results in better planning outcomes. State significant projects are large, complex and can have major economic, social and environmental benefits and impacts over a long period. The Department encourages proponents to consult widely with the community and stakeholder groups at all stages of the project.

The purpose of a community consultative committee (CCC) is to provide a forum for discussion between the proponent and representatives of the community, stakeholder groups and the local councils on issues directly relating to a specific state significant project.

As a condition of the Cadia East Project development consent, Newcrest established the Cadia Community Consultative Committee (Cadia CCC) in 1998. The Cadia CCC is an advisory committee which is required to operate in general accordance with the Community Consultative Committee Guidelines for State Significant Projects (NSW Department of Planning, Industry and Environment, January 2019).

In accordance with the guideline, the Cadia CCC comprises an Independent Chair and appropriate representation from the community, Local Councils and Cadia.

3. MEMBERS OF THE CADIA CCC

The Cadia CCC is comprised of 12 members, namely:

- An Independent Chairperson, appointed by DPIE (1 Member);
- One Community Member from each of the Blayney, Cabonne and Orange Local Government Areas, and who permanently reside in those LGAs (3 Members);
- One Community Member from each of the Forest Reefs/Flyers Creek and Errowanbang/Burnt Yards districts, and who permanently reside in those areas (2 Members).
- One Member from each of the Local Councils, namely Cabonne Shire Council, Orange City Council and Blayney Shire Council (3 Members).
- Three Members from Cadia, including the person with direct managerial responsibility for environmental management, the person with direct managerial responsibility for community relations and the general manager (3 Members).

Members of relevant government agencies or other individuals, including community members, may be invited or request to attend meetings.

The 2020/21 Cadia CCC Members are listed in Table 1. Community Members are publicised in the Cadia District Community Newsletter (Newsletter) and on the Cadia Valley Operations website (cadiavalley.com.au).

7. LOCATION OF MEETINGS

8. CONDUCT OF MEMBERS

Cadia CCC Members have followed the code of conduct, submitted a declaration of pecuniary and non-pecuniary interests and adhered to the constitution. No breach of requirements has been identified or reported. The declaration of pecuniary and non-pecuniary interests is also a standing agenda item.

9. CADIA CCC TRAINING

Cadia CCC members may seek funding or other assistance from Cadia to develop the skills necessary to further develop their capacity as a CCC Member. Examples may include training or skills development in:

Facilitation or mediation;

- Communication and conflict resolution;
- Best practice environmental management and community relations.

Cadia CCC Members are invited to undertake a site tour upon their commencement to familiarise themselves with the operations and understand how Cadia operates. In addition, Cadia CCC Members can request an inspection or site tour at any time.

10. CADIA CCC FUNDING AND REMUNERATION

Community and Council Members on the Cadia CCC are not remunerated or receive any funding or payment.

The Independent Chair is remunerated in-line with DPIE's CCC Guidelines.

Cadia's Members and Non-committee Members that attend are remunerated under their individual standing employment contract.

11. RESPONSIBILITIES OF THE PROPONENT

Cadia provides the Cadia CCC with timely, accurate and comprehensive reports, including Newcrest and Cadia operational updates, status of projects, environmental performance, project approvals and community relations.

Cadia provides copies of approvals, reports and other relevant documents via the Cadia Valley Operations website and hardcopies of the Newcrest Sustainability Report and the Cadia Annual Environmental Management Report.

12. COMMUNICATION WITH THE COMMUNITY

The Cadia CCC discusses operational information and members are encouraged to share information with their local stakeholders. Cadia CCC members bring questions or concerns from their constituents to meetings to be addressed.

Since the 10th September 2020, Cadia has commenced sending community notifications prior to meetings to advise community members of upcoming meetings and to request that any issues or concerns be brought forward to Community Members for tabling at the meeting.

Cadia has also commenced sending community notifications after the meetings to advise members of the local community when the Draft Minutes are uploaded to the CVO website.

Additionally:

- Cadia publishes a regular newsletter which is distributed to residents who reside near the mining operations or who live further away but have expressed an interest in Cadia's operations and future developments. The newsletter is also published on the Cadia Valley Operations website for access by the public.
- Residents meetings are held approximately every 4-6 month to provide operational updates and open forums for questions, answers and discussions between representatives of Cadia' senior leadership team and the community.
- Project specific community consultation meetings are held regarding upcoming modifications, approvals and projects.



Aaron Brannigan provided an update on Production and Site.

Aaron Brannigan

March quarter results – as per slide information, highlighting the All In Sustaining Cost (AISC) is \$ - 160 / oz for Cadia.



Chris Baker

Are there any plans to use some rock from earlier workings in Cadia pit that is in the waste dumps, as it had a high copper grade?

Aaron Brannigan

Unsure, the gold and copper is associated in the ore, the rock in the waste dumps is still unlikely to be used. We look at the equivalent gold gradeof the copper as a whole package.

Bob Meyenn

If Cadia is producing large amounts of copper, where else is there more gold? Aaron Brannigan

Cadia produces gold, copper and silver and soon to be Molibdinum, this is how our AISC is so low.

Bob Meyenn

But do Newcrest's other mines have the same amount of copper? Meaning that they aren't able to offset their running costs.

Aaron Brannigan

Newcrest's operations are all gold producing, with a range of other metals depending on the mine. Cadia is a low-cost producer. If you look at Telfer for example, it is not as efficient as Cadia due to the way the ore is mined. We are 'operational expenditure' efficient due to the mining method, we do not need to blast to mine. Instead, we open up the mine, panel caves, and let gravity do its work, whereas most mines drill and blast.

CXP – Stage 1, have completed tie in / commissioning works this week.



The price of Moly, is it continuing to rise?

Currently, we produce over 100,000 tonnes of copper, we would be producing a couple thousand tonnes of Moly. Will be bagging it and selling from there.

Graham Brown

Current price of Moly \$11.59 per pound.

Kim Masters

Moly is of powder form?

Aaron Brannigan

Moly gets floated off and taken to its own dewatering facility. This will then be bagged and transported by truck.

Chris Baker

Will this go down to Blayney to be moved by rail?

Unsure at this stage, it depends on who we're selling the product to. Moly gets used in a large variety of products.

Will there be an access control point at the gate entry?

The road will be only used for the Moly Plant, it will not replace the current Ridgeway access road / access point.

Aaron Brannigan


The Moly Plant road is about 80 metres long, so there is enough space for an access control house if we need to turn this route into the new site access route, to ensure that traffic doesn't back up on the public road. The Moly plant will have gates.

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Vent Rise (VR) 14 Construction

Subsidence, is it progressing as predicted?

Aaron Brannigan

It is on track, Cadia re-runs the modelling each year and updates its plans. VR14 sits in just off Cadia Road, actual subsidence is North of where the vent rises are. This is why we have looped around.

Chris Baker

I can view the subsidence from my residence, it doesn't look like 2 years is enough?

Aaron Brannigan

PC2/3 panel cave is currently being built, the vent rise you can see on the surface area are not for PC2/3. PC2/3 won't break the surface, you won't see any vertical subsidence, it'll be horizontal delamination to VR14. The only cave that goes to surface is PC1 which is what can be seen now.

Work for VR14 has commenced, this VR is to be a fresh air intake only. Work is scheduled to be completed by end of FY22.

Graham Brown

Raised concern about the construction of raise bores on Tunbridge Wells [historical], it can be a noisy process, drill hole down, add in drill casings, then attach 6–8-foot diameter to draw rock up to surface. All engine noise / work is on the surface.

Aaron Brannigan

It was around this time, when Nick De Bruin passed away. Holes will be about 855 metres long.


Also have an array of air quality monitors on the surface as well.

Southern Tailings Storage Facility (STSF) is going well, having said that with rain in Feb / Mar it did cause significant damage to polymer dust suppressant. Dust suppressant products have since been reapplied.

EPA came to site. – they acknowledged and understood challenge of covering approximately 850 ha of area and rainfall events. Yet to receive written a response.

The pre-conditioning trial was successful, and the practice will be continued.


Construction of a Hydrosulphide Solutioning Plant is to support the Moly Plant.





What were the various cause for objectives?

Objections presented a variety of concerns including dust, ability to repair NTSF, stability of final landforms NAHS plant (odour), surface water use including Flyers Creek All concerns were reviewed in a presentation on 23/03/2021. Issues raised in the meeting on 23/03/2021 were responded to at another meeting on 27/03/2021.

Chris Baker

There's more concern around what an increase in process rate does to the current issues.

Kim Masters

Was there a breakdown of the locations of the stakeholders that made a submission?

Jane Chung

A lot of submissions came from Errowanbang area, a lot of anonymous responses, Goulburn, Northern Territory and Northern Sydney.

IPC (Independent Planning commissioning) – is not triggered anymore for modification processes.

Coming from communities' point of view, a lot of the community members in the district get a little bit jaded about writing a submission and don't bother. Resulting in not many people objecting, due to time constraints.

Aaron Brannigan

At end of the day, Cadia would prefer to over communicate than under communicate.

Chris Baker


Used to contact and complain, however calling doesn't seem to change anything.

Environment Update – Vicki Hood

Incidents



Vicki Hood

There was 1 reportable incident – a burst water pipe which released 4ML of water into Cadiangullong Creek over two days. As per slide 25.

The environment team ran testing right down to the Belubula River, results found no impact. EPA also visited site, but we are yet to receive a response. During the inspection, EPA appeared satisfied with the response from Cadia.

Is there any historical water testing on Belubula river that we can compare with to today?

Jane Chung

We would have completed background monitoring but will have to get back to Chris with an answer.

Action Vicki Hood: Investigate what historical water testing data Cadia has for the Belubula river.

Vicki Hood

The testing did go upstream to compare water quality both sides of where the creek meets the river, results showed no impact.

Kim Masters

Mike Retallack did mention there was cyanide or arsenic in the Belubula River?

Aaron Brannigan

We don't use cyanide on site, never have. Old mines in the catchment may be the contributing factor here.

Bob Meyenn

Why was the pipeline closed?

Vicki Hood

The pipeline wasn't in use.

Aaron Brannigan

It was a pipe we used in drought to get water to the fire tanks at Ridgeway. In hindsight, it could have been decommissioned completely but wasn't.

Noise Exceedances

Blasting

Blasting has not taken place.

Air Quality

No exceedances – the EPA did come out on 31st of March following dust complaints, but not for an air quality exceedance.

No exceedances.

This is regulated by Resource Regulator, so out of our control.

Kim Masters

What about the rehab at old mine site at Blayney?

Vicki Hood


Blayney is our legacy site; we will still be responsible for maintaining the area for fire hazard.

Jane Chung

We will need to refer back to the report, initially rehab would be for plants first and then look at longer term management plan which will include bushfire management.

Note Jane reviewed the DA whilst at the meeting and communicated to Graham Brown that there was a reference to fire management as part of the ongoing management to the old copper mine.

Tailings Dust Assessment

Matthew Armstrong

Key findings were all below guideline criteria. Cadia also tested 18-20 community water tanks, again the results were all within the Australian Drinking Guidelines. Testing also included e-coli readings, with 4 or 5 results coming back quite high. Community members were informed accordingly. E.coli is not related to mine site activities.

Also tested the dust suppressant solution, this also returned back as non-hazardous.

Yes, please raise this at the next CDEP AGM meeting.







In the past we have brought in a consultant to review the information and then make public at end of the year. Instead, we are going to start reporting on this quarterly.

Private bores (turquoise green) mean private bore – no change in level, shows how monitoring bores are travelling in relation to privately own bores on properties.







Farm stays – there's a lot of tour buses coming out from Sydney to the region, we're receiving problems due to traffic and access from this.

Tourism is currently having more of an impact on affordable housing than other industries.

New council will be elected in September with the next meeting to be held in November.





Question: Why does Cadia include a Disclaimer? (Chris Baker)

Answer: Newcrest is a publicly listed company and information presented in the presentation could be mistaken as advice or information relating to financial investment. SAFETY SHARE

<u>Kim Masters</u> advised that caution needed to be shown when driving through the roadworks at Forest Road. The surface condition of the temporary road can be quite dangerous, particularly when wet, and there is a 'bog hole'.



PRODUCTION AND SITE UPDATE



Aaron Brannigan provided an overview of the Newcrest and Cadia highlights for the previous quarter.

Production Highlights September Quarter Results: Newcrest Gold production of 503koz, on track for meeting FY21 guidance (1,950-2,150koz). Copper production of 34.8kt, on track for meeting FY21 guidance (135-155kt). Newcrest All-In Sustaining Cost - \$980 per ounce (gold). Cadia Gold production of 196.5koz, on track for meeting FY21 guidance (680-760koz). Cadia Gold production of 25.3kt, on track for meeting FY21 guidance (95-105kt). Cadia All-In Sustaining Cost - \$113 per ounce, was lowest on record, primarily driven by a higher realised copper price and timing of sustaining capital expenditure. These benefits were partially offset by lower gold production and an increase in operating costs associated with the planned shutdowns.

Question: For the benefit of the Committee can you explain why there is such a big difference between the All-In Sustaining Cost (AISC) figures between Newcrest and Cadia? *(Chris Baker)*

Answer: Newcrest's AISC is calculated based on all its operations. Cadia, in comparison to these other sites, is a low-cost operator. Cadia helps to bring Newcrest's overall AISC lower. Sometimes the higher AISC at a different site might reflect that that the operation is still incurring development costs. Cadia's AISC is also influenced by copper prices, which some other sites aren't.

Question: Have Cadia's prices been impacted by COVID-19? (David Johnson)

Answer: Gold is often seen as a safe haven, so gold prices have been relatively unimpacted. (**Aaron Brannigan**)

<u>Mark Dicker</u> commented that Cadia, as a mining operation had been deemed as an 'essential service' so the types of operating restriction seen in some sectors wouldn't have impacted Cadia in the same way.

<u>Aaron Brannigan</u> advised that that was correct. Cadia had been very fortunate and was glad to have been able to continue its operation and maintain employment.

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Happenings On Site



COVID 19 – Operational Response

- Cadia's operations continue to remain largely unimpacted by COVID 19.
- Additional measures were put in place in response to the Public Health Alert regarding wastewater sampling indicated a current (at the time) or a previous infection in Bathurst.
- Cadia has had nil positive cases.

COVID 19 Community Support Fund

• \$1.2M donated to date, with \$650,000 of that focussed on supporting local businesses.

Operations

- Moly Plant Construction on track for first Moly production in FY21.
- · 'Mega-shut' completed in October 2020.

Changes to Cadia's Departments

- Following a functional review a number of changes have been made to Cadia's departments, including:
 - Social Performance (aka Community Relations) moved under HR and Training to form People and Social Performance,
 - Creation of the Strategy, Planning and Performance department, incorporating Approvals.



Moly Plant: Construction progress in October 2020. 220.000

220,000 hours with no Lost Time Injuries.

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Aaron Brannigan provided an overview of current site activities, adding:

- Cadia has consistently taken an 'above average' approach to protect against COVID-19 and keep the community safe,
- The Mega-shut' saw an extra 900 people on site. During the shut Cadia focussed on very controlled people movements to reduce the risk of COVID-19,
- For the shut only 79 or 80 people came to site from out of the region (all specialists), and
- The Moly plant has an excellent 'No LTIS' record. There is a great initiative at the Moly plant construction site where the team makes financial donations to the Rural Fire Service for each 'safe hour'.


Question: Who conducted your Functional Review? (Bob Meyenn)

Answer: It was an internally led process, with external support from an 'organisation design' specialist who assisted with facilitating workshops on-site. There was a specific focus on having an integrated planning approach, which saw the creation of the new Strategy, Performance and Planning (SPP) department which includes the Approvals function. COVID-19 delayed the process so it took a little longer than first anticipated.

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Question: With those increases in gold and copper recovery, how long does it take to recoup the cost of CXP? (**Bob Meyenn**)

Answer: You can't look at that in isolation, IRR is the best gauge. Cadia must always be looking at ways to improve and has a long-term view to its future, so we make investment decisions based on a broad range of factors. We know that there is a declining ore grade, so this influences our improvement actions.

Question: Does Cadia hedge its gold and copper prices? (Chris Baker)

Answer: No (Aaron Brannigan)

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NTSF and STSF Dust Management - Update



- Erizon has completed the application of hydro-mulch on the NTSF. Initial schedule delays due to wet weather were recovered by bring a second tractor system to site.
- Erizon is maintaining site capability, as per its contract, to re-spray areas as required.
- Extensive areas of the NTSF have grass coverage which is assisting to bind the surface with its root mat.
- The Panther is operating full-time on the STSF to complete another full coverage in preparation for the warmer weather leading into summer.
- Community members have been invited to undertake inspections of the TSFs during Nov and Dec.





<u>Aaron Brannigan</u> advised that he had just approved a project to apply the hydro-mulch product to the STSF as well, as it provided superior protection.

<u>Graham Brown</u> commented that by the end of Nov to Dec that grass will be haying off and could become a fire risk.

<u>Matt Armstrong</u> advised that Cadia had extended an invitation out to community members to come and inspect the NTSF and STSF. Any interested community member should be directed to him.

PTSF Tailings Deposition – Update



- · All tailings are currently directed to the Pit Tailings Storage Facility (PTSF).
- The tailings decant pond level is currently at 509mAHD which represents 24% of the approved capacity. Cadia is approved to deposit tailings to 713mAHD.
- There is approximately 6,300ML of water stored over the tailings.
- Two monitoring bores have been constructed in the pit (MB94 and MB96) to monitor groundwater levels and chemistry adjacent to the pit. The existing monitoring bore (MB95) has been decommissioned prior to being inundated by the tailings.
- The water level in MB95 has consistently been 2-3m above the pit water level, indicating that the flow of groundwater has remained towards the pit.





Question: What are MB94 and MB96 indicating? (Chris Baker)

Answer: They are indicating the same as MB95 – water is flowing towards the pit, not away.

Question: Is that what was expected and is expected in the future? (David Johnson)

Answer: Assessment of our rock in the pit indicate that this will always be the case due to the characteristics of the rock preventing water from flowing outwards from the pit.

Projects - Updates



Surface Preconditioning Trial

- Trial completed on 10th Sep with results exceeding expectations.
- No accidents or injuries, environmental incidents or community complaints.
- All contractors and equipment safely demobilised from site.
- Hydraulic fracturing lasted 14 days, pumping on dayshift only.
- After each pumping stage, the fractures closed and forced water back to the surface where it was re-used on the next hole.
- The cased drill holes will be pumped out to ensure no leakage into the rock mass and the water recycled back to the Mine system (Nov-Dec).
- Drillholes are capped with a steel flange & barricaded.

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Projects – Updates



Drilling Activities to the south of the Southern Tailings Storage Facility

- Cadia Valley Operations (CVO) is continuing with the drilling program to the south east of the Southern Tailings Storage Facility (STSF).
- The site investigations form part of studies that are examining the feasibility of constructing a new Tailings Storage Facility.
- These studies are currently in the Feasibility Stage which will take at least 6 months.
- 24 geo-tech drill holes have been completed, 6 completed with the larger sonic rig.
- An further 8 drill holes are planned to complete the program of work.
- A number of the drill holes are being converted to groundwater monitoring bores.

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Question: What depths are the bore holes? (Graham Brown)

Answer: The bore holes have various purposes – sterilisation (no gold or copper), assessment of foundational material and for subsequent groundwater monitoring – so there are a variety of depths. (*Jane Chung*)

Question: With any new tailings dam, is there a requirement to stay in the Rodds Ck catchment? (*Graham Brown*)

Answer: No, but it is a guide. (Jane Chung)

Question: The area you're looking at isn't all in Rodds Creek catchment is it? (Chris Baker)

Answer: It is all in the catchment or predominately in the catchment, but we'll confirm this. (*Jane Chung*)

Answer: The drilling program footprint doesn't necessarily indicate the footprint of a potential new TSF. Sterilisation drilling is being conducted over a larger area within the Exploration Lease area. *(Jane Chung)*

Modification 14 - Processing Rate Increase and NTSF Repair



- Cadia Holdings Pty Limited) permitted to process ore at 32 Million tonnes per annum (Mtpa).
- Modification seeking to increase the processing capacity from 32 Mtpa to 35 Mtpa:
 - increased rate to be met through upgrades to existing ore processing infrastructure and changes to train operations at Blayney.
- · The Modification also proposes to:
 - repair the slumped section of the Northern Tailings Storage Facility (NTSF) to allow recommencement of tailings deposition,
 - alter design of TSF embankment lifts to achieve the approved deposition volumes,
 - continue pre-conditioning of the Cadia East overburden (to assist with subsidence management), and
 - NaHS plant for the Moly Plant.

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Question: What is NaSH? (Graham Brown)
Answer: Sodium hydrosulfide. (Jane Chung)

Question: Does the design include changes to the STSF embankment and the leachate

pond? (Chris Baker)

Answer: Yes. The leachate pond will be relocated. (Jane Chung)

Question: Will the STSF continue to leak? (Chris Baker)

Answer: Cadia will need to maintain the leachate pond to collect leachate. (Jane Chung)

Question: Do you have to dig out the buttress? (Chris Baker)
Answer: The embankments will be buttressed. (Jane Chung)

Question: During construction will there be night works? (Chris Baker)

Answer: No. In accordance with the Project Approval, construction work will be during the

day only for normal TSF construction projects. (Jane Chung)

Question: Will all the rock come from existing stockpiles on site? (Chris Baker)

Answer: Yes. (Jane Chung)

CVO – Processing Rate Increase Modification Environmental Assessment



- The following assessments/reviews will be available in draft form in late October:
 - Air Quality and Greenhouse Gas Assessment and Noise Assessment,
 - · Surface Water Assessment,

 - Exhibition of Modification Report expected late 2020 or early 2021 (DPIE process).

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



Question: Was the PIN related to an exceedance? (Chris Baker)

Answer: No. The PIN is from the EPA and relates to EPL not our PA – which has the figures-based criteria. (*Jane Chung*)



Question: How does Cadia manage biosecurity on its farmland, particularly ones with Sticky Nightshade? *(Graham Brown)*

Answer: Biosecurity requirements on the farms are managed through the leasing agreements. I'll provide a detailed response to the committee on this. *(Matt Armstrong)*

<u>Graham Brown</u> spoke to the Committee about the history of Sticky Nightshade being introduced to the area through fodder that was brought to Narambon by the previous owner [Cadia is the current owner]. The previous Cadia people managing that property didn't manage it and let it get away.


<u>Matt Armstrong</u> advised the Committee that Cadia's contractor treating the weed over the last few years have developed a very good understanding of what works and have been sharing this information. This information can be distributed again.




Question: Can Cadia please include Orange effluent water volumes in the Water Balance Table? *(Graham Brown)*

Answer: Yes (Jane Chung)

Question: Are the roadworks on Forest Rd related to the effluent water pipeline? *(Graham Brown)*

Answer: No. (Matt Armstrong)



<u>Graham Brown</u> noted that it was interesting that the bores that weren't increasing were in the pine forest. The introduction of the pines stopped the 'gully rakers' during big storms and made the flows more even.

<u>Matt Armstrong</u> noted that there plenty of report to show that pine plantations in some areas do intercept a lot of rainfall.'


Community Support Fund

Matt Armstrong provided an overview of recent Complaints, noting:

- Cadia's dust management activities, particularly the use of the hydro-mulch product, was the main contributing factor to the lower level of complaints in FY21.
- Cadia had a good process to identify Cadia workers driving vehicles that are reported for poor driving behaviour.

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<u>Aaron Brannigan</u> added that he, as General Manager, takes the driving behaviour of Cadia Workers very seriously and there is no excuse for, or acceptance of, poor driving. Every time that a community member sees poor driving behaviour and suspects that it may be a Cadia worker they should report it using the Complaints line.

<u>Chris Baker</u> advised that he wanted to table negative feedback that he'd been receiving about the last farm leasing process. Chris advised that some community members felt that the Caringle farm should have been leased to a farming family from the area or whom the additional area of land could have really made a difference to their operation and their ability to keep the younger generation on the farm.

<u>Jane Chung</u> advised that she was the Superintendent at the time and stands by the process. The process is fair and there are two independent people as well as a Cadia representative assessing the tenders.

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Safety shares



<u>Mark Hodges</u> – Inspected Ginns Road in response to a concern raised about for road safety (near Forest Road (dirt road to airport). Someone had dumped lime onto the road which looked like it was done by a spreader, around 5-10mm thick, right near Spring Creek. The lime was forcing drivers to cross onto the other side of the road to avoid the mess.

Previous week had a tractor roll over in tall grass, didn't see the culvert. With the long grass, extra caution has to be given to ensure there are no unseen obstacles of dangers. Luckily the driver was not injured. This demonstrated the safety benefit offered by a full cab.

<u>Matt Armstrong</u> – Driving on Forest Rd last Thursday during storm, due to the high rainfall there was water pooling on the road. The water was noticeably pooling in slight wheel track depressions which creates the risk of the ute aquaplaning. East of spring terrace. Driving to conditions meant that the vehicle's speed had to be significantly reduced below the speed limit.

<u>Graham Brown</u> – Noted that this area has been impacted by the gravel trucks who use this road. The road isn't sufficient / strong enough for truck use.

Production and Site Update – Aaron Brannigan




Cadia has set a new quarterly record, reporting an All In Sustaining Cost (AISC) for the period of negative \$6/oz which reflects a higher realised copper price, higher copper sales volumes and timing of sustaining capital expenditure. These benefits were partially offset by the impact on operating costs from the strengthening of the Australian dollar against the US dollar and higher royalty and concentrate treatment, refining and transport costs.

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The Moly Plant

Progressing well, with zero LTI's (Lost Time Injury). On track for completion prior to the end of this financial year.


<u>Bob Meyenn</u> – The Moly Plant, is it an additional source of revenue or just reducing waste?

Transition to Sustainable Energy

Cadia recently announced a 15-year renewable PPA (Power Purchase Agreement) with Tilt Renewables Limited to secure a significant portion of the future projected energy requirements of Cadia mine. The first step in working towards Newcrest's 30% reduction. Once completed, the farm will be the largest wind farm in Australia.

<u>David Johnson</u> – What is the <u>status of the</u> wind farm status project? Has it been through the approval process yet?

Jane Chung - Yes, it has. It's going through a modification right now.

<u>Graham Brown</u> – With regard to carbon footprint, are there any mining activities or agriculture land regulations which Cadia may need to comply with? No work has been completed to the best of my knowledge to identify how much carbon we are producing. Cadia has the potential to run something like this with 7,000 hectares to run a study on.

<u>David Johnson</u> – I am not aware of any study being conducted at any other mine site. <u>Jane Chung</u> – It would be difficult [carbon accounting] to calculate due to having to account for emissions from animals.

Graham Brown – Animals wouldn't impact study.

Kim Masters – Any agriculture burn-off would also have an impact.

Drilling Program

Projects – Updates Drilling Activities to the south of the Southern Tailings Storage Facility Cadia Valley Operations (CVO) has completed the drilling program to the south east of the Southern Tailings Storage Facility (STSF). The site investigations form part of studies that are examining the feasibility of constructing a new Tailings Storage Facility. Results of the drilling program are expected to be received in February/March 2021. A soil sampling program will be implemented as part of the feasibility study.

Is now complete, with results expected Feb / Mar.




Dust

NTSF and STSF Dust Management - Update



- Erizon has completed the application of hydro-mulch on the NTSF (except for the decant area) and have transitioned to a maintenance program of work (monitor and reapply).
- Cadia has now engaged Erizon to treat the STSF as well. Erizon will commence work in mid February.
- The Panther has continued to operate full-time on the STSF to maintain the integrity of the polymer dust suppressant coverage.
- To safeguard against possible dust lift-off from the decant areas (NTSF & STSF), Cadia is undertaking a 14-day aerial campaign to apply the polymer dust suppressant product to these areas in early February.
- On 26/01/21 Cadia received two complaints relating to dust lift-off from the NTSF. These were the first complaints since late October 2020.
 - The cause of the dust lift-off was due to water scouring that had removed the protective hydro-mulch layer on a section of the NTSF surface along the eastern flank.
 - The area had been identified, assessed and scheduled for re-treatment a few days prior.
 The assessment indicated that the risk of dust lift-off from the area would remain low for a number of days, allowing the team to prioritise other areas. However, the area dried much quicker than anticipated.
 - While the dust lift-off event is very disappointing Cadia is confident that it doesn't indicate a performance issue with the hydro-mulch product itself.





ERIZON to commence works on STSF (Southern Tailings Storage Facility), in the near future. The aerial campaign has been postponed a number of times due to the wet weather; we will need to wait for better conditions to get the plane in the air.

On 26 January Cadia received two complaints about dust. These are the first complaints since Oct 2020. The dust was a result of rain runoff in the area.

<u>Matthew Armstrong</u> – Provided additional information and photos from the internal investigation of the dust lift event – any dust lift-off event triggers an internal investigation. This particular investigation found that a trench was the root cause of the incident. Recent rains had resulted in significant runoff on the surface and the trench had been scoured out. The trench didn't have hydro-mulch dust suppressant protecting it and the wind direction on that day was perfectly aligned with the direction of the trench. The area has been identified and was scheduled to be covered however other areas were being treated first.

<u>Graham Brown</u> – noted that Australia Day is known for weather events such as high winds and bushfires.

<u>Kim Masters</u> – Is the aircraft flying off Tunbridge Wells?

<u>Aaron Brannigan</u> – Yes it will, it will be using the same path as December 2019 (Tunbridge Wells and back again)

<u>Matthew Armstrong</u> – Cadia to continue to notify close landholders of plane events and flight plans

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Tailings Dam

Tailings Dust Assessment Project – Update



- The Tailings are primarily inert minerals comprising mainly aluminosilicates which are one of the most abundant set
 of minerals in the earth's crust.
- 35 metals were tested, and none were found in concentrations that cause adverse health effects based on International Agency for Research on Cancer (IARC) standards.
- All metals were found at levels well below the health criteria for hazardous materials based on the Global Harmonised System of Classification and Labelling of Chemicals (used to assess the health, safety and environmental hazard level of all chemicals, mixtures and waste materials).
- Asbestos is not present (nor is it present in the ore).
- · Respirable Crystalline Silica levels in the Tailings were very low.
- Community Tank Drinking Water testing results are below Australian Drinking Water Guidelines.
- Additional air quality sampling for metals (arsenic, chromium and lead) and silica results are below applicable community health guidelines (adopted from Vic & Qld as no applicable NSW guidelines).
- Final data sets from monitoring results in December 2020 have been analysed and a Community Factsheet is being
 prepared for distribution to conclude project.
- This monitoring program was developed in response to community concerns, it is not required as part of our compliance program but set up to address concern within our local community.

<u>Graham Brown</u> – Image wise, is there a possibility to put something on top of Ridgeway pit or use it for tailings?

<u>Jane Chung</u> – We wouldn't be able to without consulting the Resource Regulator and obtaining necessary approvals. It would sterilise the remaining reserves and resources.

<u>Aaron Brannigan</u> - We have reserves remaining at Ridgeway so it wouldn't be considered until mining has been completed.

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Project Modifications and Approvals Update – Jane Chung

Modification 14

Modification 14 - Processing Rate Increase and NTSF Repair • Modification 14 seeks approval to increase Cadia's processing capacity from 32 Mtpa to 35 Mtpa. The increased rate will be met through upgrades to existing ore processing infrastructure and changes to train operations at Blayney. • The Modification also seeks approval to: • Repair the slumped section of the Northem Tailings Storage Facility (NTSF) to allow recommencement of tailings deposition, • Alter design of TSF embankment lifts to achieve the approved deposition volumes, • Continue pre-conditioning of the Cadia East overburden (to assist with subsidence management), & • NaHS plant for the Moly Plant.

Was originally on public display from 21st of Jan to 5th of Feb,

We received feedback from community who weren't aware of the public submission. Correspondence was submitted to DPI&E that the period wasn't long enough from the local community. Jane Chung talked to DPI&E to discuss concerns with community. DPI&E made a decision to increase the public display period being extended to the 19th Feb 2021.

If submissions are made during this period Cadia will respond accordingly. Cadia is yet to receive any submissions.

After receiving this feedback, moving forward we will notify the community directly using our external contact lists. Australia Post is too slow, as some people didn't receive the notification until last Monday.

There was an advertisement / notice placed in the local paper, the same information was also sent out via email. Nothing that this was for the submission of the modification to DPI&E not for the actual exhibition date. This will also be amended moving forward.


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Environment Update – Vicki Hood



Noise Exceedances

All noise exceedance reports were associated with the train movements at the Cadia Dewatering Facility. Cadia manages the issue with local residents by installing double glazed windows and A/C in affected houses, as well as putting in solar panels to reduce electricity usage.

Incidents

While not in this quarter's (December) reportable incidents, there was an incident in January that is important to talk through. From 19 - 21January there was a pipe failure resulting in an uncontrolled release of approximately 3.9ML water into Cadia Angullong creek. The water discharged was primarily fresh water with a portion of

water runoff (from recent rains) from the NSTSF.Cadia immediately implemented a water monitoring / sampling regime to confirm there was no contamination. The results have shown that the discharge didn't have negative impacts on the creek.

Cadia is currently providing the Mining Regulator with incident information and test results. We will provide a full briefing to the CCC at the next meeting.

Cadia Dewatering Facility



Demolition is now complete. The remaining concrete foundations were removed along with the copper contaminated soil from the site, with the soil transported to Cadia for placement and encapsulation in the Cadia South Waste Rock Dump.

A detailed soil testing regime was implemented to verify that contaminants had been properly removed with no residual risks for the owner of the property.

Site was backfilled with clean soil followed by a layer of gravel placed over the surface and compacted, allowing future industrial use of the site, and Cadia is currently liaising with a neighbouring landholder regarding the removal of some additional contaminated soil in an adjoining area, these final works are expected to be undertaken in early 2021.

<u>Mark Hodges</u> – What is the water quality like in the new catchment site [the Cadia Dewatering Facility]?

<u>Vicki Hood</u> – Unsure at this stage, we test the soil rather than the water but are yet to complete soil testing since the completion of the project

<u>Jane Chung</u> – Drainage of the new site is a lot more controlled, making the area near the containers much better and uncontaminated. Also ensuring that operators are cleaning the containers in the shed before moving them outside. Processes and training for these changes have been updated accordingly <u>to</u> reflect these changes.






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Groundwater

<u>Jane Chung</u> – Cadia has an extensive network of groundwater bores which are used to monitor groundwater at various depths and aquifer types.

Vicki Hood - Will discuss with Nic for more information on the bore water levels.

<u>Action</u> – Vicki to explain why 'estimate' figures are used and send through electronic version of graphs to Mark

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<u>Updated Actioned Response:</u> (from after the meeting) - Groundwater monitoring bores are used to measure the level and water chemistry of groundwater around Cadia, in various aquifers (aquifers are groundwater 'zones'). Groundwater monitoring bores are not licensed for water extraction. The licensed groundwater extraction at Cadia occurs mainly from several licensed production bores and from groundwater that flows into the underground mine.

Licensed groundwater extraction for Orange Basalt and Lachlan Fold Belt occurs from bores and mine dewatering activities. While bores are metered, the groundwater extraction from the mines is determined based on a reconciliation of input and output data which includes water pumped in, water pumped out, ore moisture, rainfall ingress and ventilation losses. Throughout the year, groundwater extraction is stated as an estimate and a final reconciliation is done each financial year to report annualised usage to Water NSW.

Re: Lachlan Ford Bores - Lachlan Fold Bores extraction is metered. This was incorrectly stated as an estimate.

Aaron Brannigan provided an overview of the Newcrest and Cadia highlights for the financial year and previous quarter.

Aaron Brannigan provided an overview of current site activities.

Aaron noted that since finalisation of the meeting agenda, that a positive case of COVID-19 has been reported at Newcrest's Lihir Operation in Papua New Guinea. Lihir's COVIC-19 procedures worked as they should have and the person was identified while in isolation.






NTSF and STSF Dust Management - Update



- Erizon has now applied over 500 batches of hydro-mulch and is maintaining a 3 ha per day coverage rate.
- · Grass seed mixed into the hydro-mulch batches has continued to sprout well.



PTSF Tailings Deposition – Update



- All tailings are currently directed to the PTSF
- The tailings decant pond level is currently at 592.6mAHD which represents 21% of the approved capacity
- There is approximately 2,600 ML of water stored over the tailings.
- Two monitoring bores have been constructed in the pit (MB94 and MB96) to monitor groundwater levels and chemistry adjacent to the pit. The existing monitoring bore (MB95) has been decommissioned prior to being inundated by the tailings.
- The water level in MB95 has consistently been 2-3m above the pit water level, indicating that the flow of groundwater has remained towards the pit.

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Drilling Activities to the South of the Southern Tailings Storage Facility



- Cadia Valley Operations (CVO) is planning on conducting a drilling program to the south east of the Southern Tailings Storage Facility.
- The site investigations form part of studies that are examining the feasibility of constructing a new Tailings Storage Facility.
- These studies are currently in the Feasibility Stage which will take at least 6 months.
- The activities include drilling, test pits and environmental studies to gain a better understanding of the geology, geotechnical conditions and biophysical strategic agricultural land (BSAL).
- · Near neighbours & tenants have been engaged via 1:1 meetings.
- This information was also provided at a residents meeting on 1 July 2020.

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Projects on-site - Updates



Moly Plant

- Construction on-track for first production to commence FY21 and Full Load commissioning FY22
- Community concerns raised about construction crews using a public UHF channel that was in use for farm communications.
- Cadia is currently engaging with near neighbours to identify UHF channels that are not in use and can be used by contractors.





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

Surface Preconditioning Trial

- · 3 of 3 drill holes completed (5th Jul).
- No community concerns raised during drilling stage.
- Hydraulic fracturing starts 11th Aug and will take ~20 days, pumping on dayshift using diesel pumps with night shift coverage for equipment readiness and general maintenance only.
- Water used is the same as pumped into Cadia East.



- The cased drill holes will be pumped out to ensure no leakage into the rock mass.
- · The valves shown above will be removed and holes capped with a steel plate.



- Monitoring was conducted at several properties surrounding the mining lease and the Cadia Dewatering facility during the period. Noise levels were found to be non-compliant on one occasion at Rosebank and on six occasions (train noise) at 247 Newbridge Road Blayney.
- The investigation of the exceedance at Rosebank was concluded to be a source not associated
 with mining operations as no surface operating equipment was operating at the time or in the
 vicinity and possible community contribution could not be discounted.

Tailings Dust Assessment Project - update

- Geochemical and mineralogy testing of 'tailings' dust sampled from neighbouring properties using high-volume air samplers – sampling commenced, analysis to be completed in September 2020.
- Geochemical and mineralogy testing of 'vent' dust using low-volume air samplers sampling commenced, analysis to be completed in September 2020.
- Community Tank Drinking Water testing sampling in August, analysis in September 2020

Preliminary Results

- All preliminary results indicate there are no community health impacts.
- Report is due Sept / Oct 2020. Community Factsheets will be prepared and distributed, 1)
 Preliminary Results in August, and 2) Final Results at the completion of the project.

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Site Water Balance



Water

- Cadia currently has an estimated 11,800 ML of water on site in July 2020, with approximately half held in Upper Rodds Creek Dam.
- Total water storage has increased significantly over the past few months due to good rainfall runoff in the mine's catchments.
- Cadiangullong dam has increased to 42% with recent peak inflows of nearly 390 ML/day.
- Cadia has been extracting water from the Belubula river under its Supplementary water licence which permits extraction of river water during periods of high flow.

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


Regional Rainfall - significant deficit


This rainfall is clearly evident on the CRD chart below.



Cadia East Groundwater

MB44A (142m deep) MB50 (217m deep) and MB51 (56m deep) are screened in the deeper Silurian Sediments.

MB44A is located due east from the Cadia East mine and has showed a slightly declining trend over the past past 6 months although the rate of decrease has slowed.

MB50 and MB51 are located just south of the Cadia East mine, next to one of the ventilation risers. It has displayed some recovery since the recent rainfall.

MB88 (90m deep) and MB44B (47m deep) are screened within the Tertiary Basalt aquifer.

MB88 is located in the pine forest near Woodville Rd and has showed a small increase in level over the past 12 months.

MB44B is located to the east of Cadia East mine and has displayed a relatively stable trend over the past 6 months and increased by 0.26m compared with last month's reading.

Moving further north, MB49 (39 m deep) and and MB64 (66m deep) are screened within the Tertiary Basalt aquifer.

MB49 displayed an overall declining trend when looking at the long-term, however the latest measurement in April inicated a small increase relative to the previous month.

MB64 showed a minor decrease in level from November 2019 to March 2020

Moving further from the mine, MB72 (44m deep) is located on Waldergrave Rd and MB74 (27m deep) is located at Rapley's Lane. Both are screened within the Tertiary Basalt aquifer.

Both of these bores also showed a decrease in water level from March 2019 to November 2020. The next monitoring of these bores will be conducted in May 2020.
