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1.0 INTRODUCTION

1.1 Introduction

This Conservation Management Strategy has been prepared by NBRS+Partners for Moore Theological College as part of the Environmental Assessment required by the Director-General of the Department of Planning for a Part3A Concept Plan Application. Its purpose is to provide the framework for the continuing use and conservation of the most significant parts of the site and mitigate potential impacts arising from redevelopment of the site. The site is a complex of buildings of varying ages and condition developed and redeveloped since the mid-nineteenth century which Moore Theological College has progressively acquired and consolidated since the 1950s. The site also includes land owned by others – notably the Deaconess Institution which was established on part of the site from 1916.

This strategy is intended to be a practical working document to guide future works at Moore College Newtown Campus *Part3A Concept Plan Site*. This report addresses the following:

- Historical evidence for the development and use of the site;
- Analysis of the physical fabric of the site;
- Statement of Significance; and
- Conservation policy and management section to assist in guiding the redevelopment of the site and conservation of its most significant aspects.

1.2 Definition of the Study Area

The site is located within Moore College's Newtown Campus and is shown in Figure 1. The study area includes those items within the Part 3A Concept Plan site. These elements are:

The terms fabric, place, preservation, reconstruction, restoration, adaptation and *conservation* used throughout this report have the meaning given to them in the *Australia ICOMOS Charter for the Conservation of Places of Cultural Significance, 1999 (Burra Charter).* The assessment of Indigenous heritage values is outside the scope of this plan. *Ask First: A guide to respecting Indigenous heritage places and values* can provide guidance in that regard.

2.2 STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE FOR MOORE THEOLOGICAL COLLEGE NEWTOWN CAMPUS PART 3A CONCEPT PLAN SITE

Moore Theological College Newtown Campus Part 3A Concept Plan Site is of cultural heritage significance because:

- It contains two of the earliest buildings on King Street (33 and 35 King Street) and the substantially intact Little Queen Street west which together demonstrate the first phase of residential subdivision and development of the Camperdown Terrace Subdivision;
- Little Queen Street is an enclosed laneway streetscape with simple and austere two storey row houses with bald-faced facades which is rare in the locality and provides an intimate ambience and distinct sense of place;
- The site contains Deaconess House which was established on Carillon Avenue in 1916 and has continuing significance in the history of theological education of Anglican women as well as aesthetic significance as a two storey brick and slate building with characteristics of the Federation Queen Anne style;
- The corner position at Carillon Avenue and King Street has landmark significance as a principal gateway site from the city into Newtown; and,
- The site demonstrates the expansion and development of Moore Theological College on the southern side of Carillon Avenue following the 1939-45 war.

Overview of Archaeological Potential

The first post-1788 use of the land is unknown. As part of Bligh's land, it was outside Grose's Farm but it was likely also used for pastoral and agricultural uses. There are no known structures or areas of intensive use from the period before subdivision of the land in 1841. As the primary access from the town of Sydney to the Cook's River, evidence of roadway use may have been deposited at the margins of the King Street properties by passing traffic. The likelihood of such relics is generally similar for all land at the margins of King Street.

The first residential subdivision occurred to the western parts of the site in 1841. The was progressively developed throughout the nineteenth century with some parts (including extant structures) erected in the 1850s. The early period immediately following the 1841 subdivision has the greatest significance.

Subsequent development included that undertaken in the late nineteenth and early twentieth century of the eastern portion of the land and redevelopment of parts of the initial 1841 subdivision. Progressive redevelopment in the post-World War Two period would have included excavation and erasure of strata associated with the 1850s and earlier period.

The retained early structures on Little Queen Street, at 33-35 King Street and beneath the former White Horse Hotel have the greatest potential to hold relics of significance. There is no evidence to suggest that the significance of relics elsewhere on the Concept Plan site is of local or State significance specific to this site relative to other late nineteenth inner suburban residential developments. The sites with greatest potential to yield an archaeological resource associated with the early use of the place remain the retained early structures noted above. Within these sites, it is possible that there are relics of local significance to the historical development of Newtown and Camperdown within the local context of the development of inner suburban Sydney.

The moderate archaeological potential of some of the site and the low potential of most of it could likely be appropriately managed by a Section 140 (Heritage Act) Application and monitoring of any proposed excavation with any relics of local or State significance retained on site and interpreted.

2.3.6 Historical notes

Moore Theological College was first established in Liverpool in 1856. It was established as a result of the initial efforts of Bishop Broughton and following the benefice of a prominent churchman, Thomas Moore to the Anglican Church following his death in 1840. A purpose built college and chapel were erected at Liverpool adjoining the former house of Thomas Moore and accommodated 14 students, a lecture room, library, dining room as well as a small chapel.

Growth in the importance of The University of Sydney gave impetus for the relocation of Moore College to Sydney and in 1886 land was purchased on the northern side of Carillion Avenue Newtown (adjoining the Sydney University Site) for this purpose, with the college opening there in 1889. The college continued to purchase land on either side of this site up until 1927.

Moore College operated solely from the north side of Carillon Avenue (Bligh Street) until the 1950s, though they did purchase on the southern side of Carillion Avenue Nos 10-16 in 1916 and Nos 2-8 in 1923. The Deaconess Institution purchased land on the southern side of Carillon Avenue, Nos 18-28

and constructed Deaconess House in 1916 which was enlarged in 1961. After the 1939-45 war, the College began to purchase surrounding properties in Newtown with the view of enlarging their land holdings to enable a master plan to be implemented. Acquisition began in earnest from the 1950s when the idea of a master plan for the southern properties was first presented.

Part 3A Concept Plan Site, Moore College Newtown Campus

The Part 3A Concept Plan Site, Moore College Newtown Campus, currently owned by both Moore College, the Deaconess Institution and The University of Sydney, lies on land which was originally part of a grant of 240 acres to William Bligh in 1806 and part of the first subdivision of this land in 1841 known as the Camperdown Terrace. The site also includes a small triangular portion of land, corner City Road and Carillion Avenue, which was initially set aside for the Church of England but when unused was re-granted in 1871 to Christopher Rolleston, Thomas Breillat, Stephen Brown and William Crane , who subdivided the land as DP 105 in 1873.




Figure 2 Parish Map No. 14072901 showing approximate location of subject land circled. Department of Lands.

The first subdivision of William Bligh's 240 acres was in 1841 when John Kettle and John Davis purchased an area of just over 5 acres which they subdivided into 54 lots known as the Camperdown Terrace subdivision.¹ Development on this land began almost immediately in the form of residential and commercial buildings. In the 1880s, a second wave of development began with much of the early development demolished to make way for new more substantial buildings and land that had been left vacant was built upon. Moore College now owns the

majority of land in the original Camperdown Terrace subdivision. Many of the properties are used by the college for staff and student housing. Some sites have been redeveloped to house dining and lecture spaces.




Figure 3 Deposited Plan 939363 dated 1841. Department of Lands.

The Deaconess Institution purchased land on the southern side of Carillon Avenue (Lots 34, 35 & 36 of the Camperdown Terrace Subdivision), in 1916. They demolished the existing buildings which included sheds and a small residence fronting Campbell Street, and constructed Deaconess House on Lot 36 and part Lot 35 numbered 28 Carillon Ave. A further L shaped wing, known as Mary Andrews College (formerly the Archdall Wing) was constructed on Lot 34 and across the rear of lots 34 to 36, in 1961. This building is numbered 18-26 Carillon Avenue.

Lots 47 and 45 of the Camperdown Terrace subdivision, part of the land shown shaded above, was included in land resumed by the government in 1841 for a public school. This land was included in the site of the North Newtown Primary and Intermediate High School. By 1888 however, only the western portion of Lot 47 had been developed with a building of domestic scale. An aerial photograph from 1943 and a drawing from 1956 show no change to the development on the site with the eastern portion still remaining vacant. The building now in place on the site may have been relocated there from a

previous site as the weatherboard building on brick footings is somewhat similar to school buildings of the 1920s. This building has been remodelled and is currently in use as a child care centre owned by the University of Sydney.

The small triangular portion of land, corner City Road (formerly Newtown Road) and Carillion Avenue (formerly Bligh Street), was subdivided into 13 residential allotments in 1873 as DP 105. The land was developed with cottages, gardens, terrace buildings and sheds in the 1870s. All of these allotments are now in the ownership of Moore College, having been purchased gradually since 1916.

Lots 2,3,4,9 and pt Lot 1 DP 105 originally contained a house and garden built for Joseph Abbott in 1873 to 1874. These buildings were demolished in 1960 for the construction of the Master Builders Association Building which currently occupies the site. On Lots 5,6,7, & 8 DP 105 the properties now numbered 3,5,7,9 & 11 King Street were constructed between 1873 and 1874. These properties still occupy the land. Construction on Lots 10,11,12 & 13 (4-6 Carillion Avenue) originally consisted of a pair of semi detached cottages, a small cottage and a shed built in c1876. These were demolished in the 1950s as part of the site for the construction of a dining and lecture hall for Moore College.




Figure 5 - Part of Map of Newtown dated 1890 Land outlined in red is the land included in Part 3A Concept Plan Site Moore College Newtown Campus. Land shaded green was included in DP 105. Department of Lands.




Figure 9 - 1956 City Building Surveyor's Detail Sheet showing the Part 3A Concept Plan Site Moore College Newtown Campus outlined in red. Source: City of Sydney Archives

The South Sydney Local Environment Plan 1998 includes Newtown North Primary School at 48-90 Carillon Avenue as a heritage item and shows the site at 48 Carillon Avenue on the LEP Heritage Map. However, the State Heritage Inventory entry for the school cites it as 50 Carillon Avenue and makes no mention of the building on 48 Carillon Avenue. The SSLEP and the heritage study which informed it contain a number of such anomalies in property description and the delineation of the sites of heritage items. Although arguably within the boundaries of a heritage item, the site is not a significant component of the public school site and is of little significance.




Figure 10 City of Sydney Conservation Area 5 "Bligh & Camperdown Terrace' showing contributing, neutral, detracting and heritage items. The map has been annotated by NBRS+Partners to show the Concept Plan site bordered in blue. The Carillon Avenue sites and Campbell Street (North) sites have been identified for exclusion from the conservation area following a review by the City of Sydney.




Figure 11 City of Sydney Conservation Area 31 "King Street' showing contributing, neutral, detracting and heritage items. The map has been annotated by NBRS+Partners to show the Concept Plan site bordered in green. Note that heritage items within the LEP schedule are not all shown on this drawing and that 21 King Street (a heritage item) is indicated as "detracting'.

3.0 CONSERVATION POLICY AND MANAGEMENT

3.1 General Statement of Conservation Approach

The general approach to conservation is to retain and conserve items of highest significance while adaptively reusing them in an integrated campus plan (concept plan) for the site. The approach also includes further development and consolidation of parts of the site with lesser significance so as to reinforce the continuing significance of Moore College and the Deaconess Institution on the site and to further reinforce the landmark significance of the Carillon Avenue and King Street junction as a gateway to Newtown from the city.

3.2 Owner's or Steward's Requirements

The owners' require an increase in capacity and improvements in the standard of education accommodation and facilities within a coherent campus environment which integrates its existing landholdings within the urban context of King Street and Carillon Avenue.

3.3 What are the items/fabric that must be conserved?

The items of greatest significance that must be conserved are the early houses and streetscape of Little Queen Street, 33-35 King Street, the former Deaconess Institution (now Mary Andrews House) at 28 Carillion Avenue and other contributory elements.

3.4 What are the items/fabric that can be altered?

Items of lesser significance can be removed if preceded by adequate recording and supplemented with heritage interpretation.

3.5 What are the exemptions from the Heritage Act?

No place within the site is listed on the State Heritage Register so, the Minister for Planning's Standard Exemptions of March 2006 do not apply to the site. The ordinary exemptions for unlisted sites apply for excavations.

3.6 What to do with archaeological material?

The moderate archaeological potential of some of the site and the low potential of most of it could likely be appropriately managed by a Section 140 (Heritage Act) Application and monitoring of any proposed excavation with any relics of local or State significance retained on site and interpreted. Found relics of local and State significance or otherwise of interest could be retained on site and conserved and interpreted within the provisions of an interpretation strategy.

3.7 What are the gaps in existing knowledge about the item?

Detailed knowledge of earlier forms of the buildings requires further research which is recommended in detailed conservation management planning for individual items before conservation and reconstructive works commence.

3.8 Who should receive copies of this document?

- Copies of this CMS should be provided to Moore College property managers, private lessees, maintenance managers, short and long term lessees, and contractors, as required;
- A copy should be provided to the Department of Planning.

• A copy should be provided to the City of Sydney.

3.9 If the item is to be open to the public, what are the risks to public safety and how might they be mitigated?

Parts of the site will be open to the public. Risks will be assessed during the design development phase of the developments and mitigated by compliance with building codes and other requirements as necessary.

3.10 What are the item's conservation needs and interpretation requirements?

The items of highest significance require physical conservation and some degree of reconstruction and restoration to reveal their significance and conserve them. The whole site would benefit from a coordinated interpretation strategy to explain the significance of the site and Moore College and to integrate, as far as possible, interpretive strategies into the new development proposed.
