I **object** to AGL's project application 09_0048 ("Stage 3 project") to mine for coal seam gas in Campbelltown and Camden. The main reasons for my objection are as follows.

CSG risks

I am concerned about the risks of CSG extraction due to the negative impacts evidenced throughout the USA (gas extraction from coal seams and shale); in QLD (coal seam gas extraction causing irreversible damage to underground aquifers and the Great Artesian Basin, damage to drinking water, creeks and rivers, air quality, fires burning out of control, health problems amongst residents and animals, and plummeting property values; in NSW in the Pillaga Forest where the mismanagement of CSG exploration has resulted in serious environmental damage; and in AGL's Camden Gas Project where to date there has been non-compliance with licence conditions (EPL No. 12003) in every year since this licence was issued in 2004. There have been minimal groundwater tests conducted in the early stages of this particular project, therefore resulting in no adequate baseline studies to compare later studies to, and I have not heard of any baseline air quality studies being conducted prior to the start of that project.

Although AGL has been operating under an Environmental Protection Licence (EPL no. 12003) it has been allowed by the State government to self-monitor its compliance, self-investigate incidents and self-report. Any consultants and laboratories engaged by AGL could never be truly independent.

<u>Water</u>

I attended AGL's "drop-in" session in Campbelltown on 1 December 2012. This session lasted for only two hours (due to the venue opening half an hour later than the designated

starting time for the session) on a Saturday morning. I note the ads in local newspapers specified an RSVP date. Not surprisingly, an extremely limited number of locals attended (my estimate is less than 10).

I was informed by staff there that the quality of water in and around the coal seams, known as "produced water" is of no value because it shares the same salinity as a salt water swimming pool. They told me that once the gas is separated from the water, salt and chemicals used in the mining process, the water is trucked to Windsor where it is filtered and reused in industry such as brick-making. I was not informed what happens to the salt and the chemicals.

These chemicals used in the hydraulic fracture stimulation process ("fraccing") were described to me as "food grade" but considering many food grade chemicals are in fact toxic, shouldn't truly independent scientists be given the necessary time to analyse the list which AGL has given to the NSW Government (pp 37-38 Camden Gas Project Northern Expansion Submissions Report October 2012) to understand how these chemicals will interact under the ground in the saline conditions and in combination with each other, and any results then be reported to the public as part of an appropriate consultative process?

Further, many residents feel it is reasonably foreseeable that in removing water from in and around the coal seam, any resultant cracking or dislodgement of the underground soil levels could damage aquifers, such that moisture levels in the upper soils could drain down to these deeper levels, thereby drying out the upper layers. Can AGL guarantee the health and longevity of all plant-life and watercourses on our land above and around these areas where the mining removes groundwater?

Another question is where the **aquifers** under Campbelltown and Camden flow to. Do they flow towards the water catchment area of Sydney? AGL staff have apparently advised they do not know where the aquifers in our area flow to, but "probably Sydney harbour". Is this a flippant comment intended to allay any concerns about Sydney's drinking water?

As for the Upper Canal which runs through the Scenic Hills (both the Campbelltown and Camden local government areas) towards Prospect Reservoir, AGL plans to run their main gas gathering pipeline beside (or under?) this Heritage Listed water channel which was constructed in the 1880's and provides Sydney's backup water supply, with access tracks at times running alongside this canal. I note the NSW Government's Sydney Catchment Authority's Guidelines

(http://www.sca.nsw.gov.au/ data/assets/pdf file/0013/13207/Guidelines-for-Development-adjacent-to-the-Upper-Canal-and-Warragamba-Pipelines.pdf) which relevantly provide:

"1. The Upper Canal and Warragamba Pipelines corridors are essential public Infrastructure whose key purpose is the supply of drinking water to the Greater Metropolitan Sydney region. Water supply infrastructure must always be safe and serviceable.

- a. The SCA will not approve development proposed by external parties within the corridors unless:
 - i. the development is for the purpose of essential infrastructure and services that cannot be feasibly located elsewhere; and
 - ii. the proponent can ensure to the satisfaction of the SCA that there will be no adverse impact on the Upper Canal and Warragamba Pipelines infrastructure. Infrastructure and services must not compromise the SCA's future proposals for canal and pipeline infrastructure.
- b. The SCA will not support development or planning proposals adjoining the corridors unless it can be shown that there will be no adverse impact on the Upper Canal and Warragamba Pipeline infrastructure.
- 2. Water quality and quantity within the Upper Canal and Warragamba Pipelines corridors must be maintained and protected.
 - a. The SCA will not approve infrastructure and services proposed by external providers within the corridors unless the providers can ensure to the satisfaction of the SCA that there will be a neutral or beneficial effect on water quality and quantity.
 - b. The SCA will not support development or planning proposals adjoining the corridors unless it can be shown that there will be a neutral or beneficial effect on water quality and quantity."

Is AGL immune to these requirements or can they prove to the Government and the public prior to any approval of this project that they will not breach these requirements?

Interestingly, I note that the State government has just appointed to the Board of the Sydney Catchment Authority a former Liberal Party official with strong ties to the mining industry, Mr Mark Bethwaite (Sarah Gerathy, ABC, Yahoo 7 News website updated 10/12/12). What are the residents of Sydney supposed to make of this?

Of further concern is the **Georges River**, which is within the Subsurface Project Area (see attached map). Can AGL guarantee that any gas extraction from under or around this river or nearby aquifers will not damage the river, its accompanying bushland reserve which runs from St Helens Park to Airds and Ruse, and across to Holsworthy, or the diverse wildlife in this area (which includes koala and platypus populations)?

I would like to complain at this point about an AGL map (attached) which is ambiguous about whether gas gathering lines lay under or next to roads and/or rivers/creeks. Is this AGL's idea of community consultation? Will roads and/or pathways and any part of the Upper Canal be dug up by AGL?

Hydraulic fracture stimulation

I was informed during this session by Jenny O'Brien (AGL Community Relations Manager) and a fellow staff member of AGL (Andrew?) that AGL will not be fraccing in the Stage 3 Project, unlike in the earlier stages in Camden because that they now employ "horizontal drilling" techniques. They explained in detail the method of forcing water containing salt and food grade chemicals under high pressure into the well to fracture the coal seam in order to release the gas. If water is pumped into the wells in this manner after horizontal drilling has been carried out, I am unable to see a substantial difference between this and fraccing.

I have since heard that that although AGL claims the use of horizontal wells in the Stage 3 Project will *reduce* the need for fraccing, it seems this is not entirely true since it has reserved the right to fracture stimulate these wells in the future if/when the technology becomes available. Further, in a letter to the editor of the Macarthur Chronicle on 11 December 2012, David Kelly (Head of Land Approvals, Upstream Gas) stated "AGL has not ruled out hydraulic fracturing, but if the proposal is approved we intend to use horizontal drilling which we do not fracture stimulate and which minimises above-ground impact." This is not an unequivocal statement that AGL will not use fracture stimulation to release coal seam gas in the Stage 3 Project.

How can the community trust AGL to do the right thing under their land when AGL staff lied to residents on 1 December 2012?

Recommendation 9 of the Upper House Inquiry requested an extension of a fraccing ban until the fraccing chemicals are fully assessed. I note the government response that it will lift the fraccing moratorium, yet the initial assessment of approximately 100 fraccing chemicals "is likely to take 18 months". Although the government has rightly banned the use of BTEX chemicals, I fail to understand how the government response ensures the safety and transparency of AGL's operations now and within the 18 month period this "initial assessment" is expected to take.

Traffic

I dispute AGL's claim that traffic will not significantly increase. From my understanding, heavy truck movements will significantly increase between the hours of 1am and 6am in particular, and these truck movements are on public roads, many within residential areas, and also on access tracks to well-sites, some of which are very close to or directly next to residential areas and schools. I have not met anybody who lives near the well-sites or access roads at Currans Hill and Eschol Park who received an impromptu visit from AGL staff for the single purpose of informing them of plans to place industrial infrastructure close to their homes, and none received letters about the company's intentions.

In relation to the Eschol Park wells (CU 26 and CU 29) I believe from the attached map and from speaking to residents in Chasselas Ave, Eschol Park, that the access track will be via a property on the corner of Badgally Road and St Andrews Road. So far my reading of AGL documentation has shown public roads will be used. I note from p.125 of the Camden Gas

Project Northern Expansion Submissions Report October 2012 that "Similarly, due to changes to the proposed access to CU26 and CU29, there would be no traffic generated by the Amended Project through Eschol Park." I would appreciate receiving further information on this, particularly relating to Badgally Road and Eaglevale Drive, and I reserve the right to further comment or lodge a complaint once I have read further material.

Perceived attitude of AGL and the NSW Government

Although I am disappointed Campbelltown Council has not done more to protect the Scenic Hills in Campbelltown which are zoned Environmental Protection (prohibiting extractive industries and mines), I am more disappointed to see the NSW Government's attitude towards concerned residents of Campbelltown/Camden (as evidenced by Mr Hazzard's "antics", Channel 7 news 27 November 2012, http://au.news.yahoo.com/nsw/latest/a/newshome/15461992/exclusive-cross-city-csg-drilling/). Despite the State Labor party's granting of the exploration licences, and permitting a 5 year royalty-free period of payments to the State, if Mr Hazzard's views are reflected amongst the rest of the Liberal government, then the state Liberal Party's resounding win in Campbelltown at the 2011 election will be a never-repeated event.

The exploitation of this non-renewable source of energy which I understand to have a high carbon footprint (Paddy Manning, "What the Frack?", published 2012) would go some way towards filling the coffers of the NSW state government, and save AGL any costs involved with contracting with third parties to supply gas to NSW. But BHP has assured the public that it can easily provide enough conventional gas (without the risks inherent in CSG extraction) to the eastern states for an unlimited time.

The Upper House Inquiry recommended monitoring of decommissioned well integrity for five to twenty years. This is vitally important because these wells pose the greatest risk to health, water quality and the environment generally. The government response that they will consider "expanding the monitoring of decommissioned wells using a risk based approach" is completely inadequate.

In relation to point 11 of the Upper House Inquiry, the government assures us that coal seam gas companies are "already responsible for the full costs of rehabilitating any environmental impacts". What if homes and property are damaged (whether real estate or not)? What if rivers and creeks are damaged? What if health problems impact the residents of these areas. What right to compensation do the homeowners of Campbelltown and Camden have during the project life and into the future? How would it be assessed?

Many new residents of Gregory Hills and Currans Hill were not aware of plans for CSG mining under their new homes because the plans have not been approved. Obviously the ethics of staff at local sales offices and local real estate agents, can be called into question, but ultimately people are buying into an area without being told there are plans to mine for coal seam gas under their new home. AGL and the government are not taking enough steps to make new residents aware of the risks they may face before they commit themselves so heavily.

AGL's claims they have adequately consulted with our community in relation to their application are inaccurate and unreliable. The ads in the local papers from AGL have not been seen by 99% of residents I have canvassed living in streets closest to the proposed well-sites. If AGL was serious about community consultation they would have ensured a letterbox drop of a well-written leaflet containing honest details to the entire Campbelltown and Camden areas affected by AGL's proposed Stage 3 plans, not just random streets. I do not know the number of houses they letterbox-dropped, however nobody I have spoken to was aware of having received any AGL leaflets. I believe that Schools and pre-schools have not been notified either.

Fortunately for me, I did receive a leaflet in my letterbox one leaflet entitled "AGL Camden Gas Project. June 2012 Project". Its assertion that it will make further information available "in the months" [ahead?] "in a variety of ways including letterbox drops, advertorial in the local media, community open days at Rosalind Park Gas Plant and the Camden Project area, community information sessions, and mailout distributions" is a gross overstatement. Despite being a Campbelltown resident living within the surface project area I have not received any further AGL letterbox drops nor a personal invitation to attend any information session as to the impact on the surrounding areas.

I would also like to point out that the words "mine" and "mining" were not used once in this leaflet. If AGL was committed to an open and transparent approach throughout the life of the Project they have not made a good start.

AGL's methods of adaptive management do not engender trust within the community either — there seems to be such a rush to push this project into full operation as quickly as possible, when most of the community feels concerned that not enough preliminary studies have been done. Why not impose a ban on coal seam gas extraction until the relevant research has been done? Currently the Camden Project accounts for only 5-6% of NSW's gas supply. Surely the concerns of the National Water Commission, the National Toxics network and Doctors for the Environment should be given time to be researched properly. If the safety of this unconventional mining operation can be guaranteed then residents might feel more amenable to coal seam gas mining within their communities.

Residents would like to know whether compensation will be available for health problems, river damage, catchment poisoning, house damage from subsidence, and diminishment of property values (which was discussed at the Senate Inquiry 2011), including all Heritage Listed properties. Truly independent studies on the likelihood of these occurring should be carried out and it should be *proven* to the residents of NSW that mining and residential and/or rural areas can truly co-exist.

Why does AGL and the NSW Government put the onus on the people of south western Sydney to prove what damage could occur as a result of mining CSG from under our homes and rivers? The onus should be firmly on AGL. To say any damage would be minimal is unacceptable given the value of this land environmentally and economically to both the State and the communities of Campbelltown/Camden. To place such infrastructure right next to Sydney's Upper Canal defies logic.

Conclusion

The communities in Campbelltown and Camden are shocked by AGL's sense of entitlement to extract coal seam gas from around and underneath their homes and properties. We are expected to believe AGL when they say CSG mining within our communities can harmoniously co-exist within residential and Environmentally Protected areas. Where is the proof? There has been insufficient community consultation and insufficient baseline studies done to ensure a right for these communities to compensation if anything goes wrong.

Why can't 5 year baseline studies in relation to air and water quality be conducted prior to granting AGL licences to build wells. Residents should not be bullied by AGL or the NSW government into accepting something which they have honest and grave concerns about.

The community here is angry at the due date for submissions being 18 December 2012, one week before Christmas. Most of the residents I have spoken to have only recently become aware of AGL's application and are of the opinion that this date was chosen unfairly in favour of AGL, as many residents do not have the time or ability to construct an informed and heartfelt submissions at this time of year.

The perceived arrogance of AGL and the NSW Government in relation to this issue has created a murmur amongst western Sydney which is growing into a deafening roar. If our elected government does not listen to its constituents people will take matters into their own hands.



The size of the proposed well clusters and any fracking of horizontal wells are both new and untested here. It will therefore be entirely experimental with unknown outcomes on health and property including the possibility of subsidence under so many urban properties.

As a resident of Camden Shire, I object strongly to the proposal to extract Coal Seam Gas (CSG) in an area that has had over recent years, and is proposed to have over coming years, such a large increase in residential population. The consequences of CSG extraction have not undergone sufficient research to ensure that there will not be significant negative repercussions on the environment and the health and well-being of residents. In particular the water table and water quality, the possible health impacts on residents exposed to the above-ground well heads at such a large number of locations throughout the region, and the potential impact on the amenity of the region in general call into question the wisdom of allowing such a project to go ahead without further studies being conducted beforehand. The need to commence the extraction of CSG is not immediate as the current reserves of alternative energy sources are not dwindling, and this plan appears to be predicated solely on the opportunity to reap large profits from a previously untapped resource. As such, there ought to be much more stringent investigations conducted prior to the commencement of the project. I object to AGL's project application 09_0048 to mine for coal seam gas (CSG) in Campbelltown and Camden. The key reasons for my objection are stated below.

I am concerned that CSG mining is a technologically-evolving industry whose impacts have not been independently and scientifically fully researched and remain largely unknown. This view is supported by professional organisations and academics in evidence to the NSW Upper House and Senate Inquiries into Coal Seam Gas Mining in 2011 and by subsequent research here and overseas. We have had to rely on the industry for much of our information when the industry has a vested interest in the outcome. AGL is no different. It claims that the Camden Gas Project has been safely operating for 10 years. Yet we understand that impacts on groundwater and air quality have not been adequately monitored, and while AGL has been operating under an Environmental Protection Licence (EPL No. 12003), it has been allowed to self-monitor its compliance, self-investigate incidents and self-report such that we do not know what true impacts it may have had. Third party consultants and external laboratories that are engaged and paid for by the industry are not independent. Nor is any funded or cofunded research by the CSG mining industry. These lessons should have been learnt with asbestos in Australia and with 'Big Tobacco' in the USA. The National Water Commission in its Position Statement (3rd December 2010) said that impacts may emerge over a long time period. I am deeply concerned that the costs of unforeseen problems will be borne by the community and taxpayers after AGL is long gone from the area. This is grossly irresponsible.

Doctors for the Environment Australia claims that health impacts from CSG mining have not been assessed. Preliminary research from Queensland (e.g. by Southern Cross University in Tara) and overseas is deeply concerning, especially where fracking has been used. As at December 2011, 85% of the production wells in the Camden Gas Project had been fracked (evidence from the NSW Upper House Inquiry) with inadequate monitoring of its impacts on water in particular. AGL claims that the use of horizontal wells in the proposed Stage 3 will reduce the need for fracking, but it seems that this is not entirely true since it has reserved the right to frack these wells in the future if/when the technology becomes available. The size of the proposed well clusters and any fracking of horizontal wells are both new and untested here. It will therefore be entirely experimental with unknown outcomes on health and property including the possibility of subsidence under so many urban properties.

I am also concerned about evidence from Queensland and overseas on air quality and the cumulative impact of AGL's expansion into an area that already experiences incidents of unacceptable levels of air pollution (ozone and fine particles) associated with respiratory problems (NSW Environmental Protection Authority). AGL's past performance gives no confidence that it has <u>not</u> already contributed to this or that it can be managed in the future,

having admitted in August this year that it had not conducted continuous air monitoring at its Rosalind Park Gas Treatment Plant for three years in breach of its EPL No.12003.

Allowing CSG mining in areas that are not zoned for heavy industry undermines zoning controls and confidence in the planning process, and creates severe land use conflicts, economic instability and inequity. It will disrupt religious communities whose vocations have so far been protected by the Scenic Hills zoning; it will place undue burden on small rural allotments whose capacity to cope is severely reduced by size (thereby threatening the survival of the entire historic Scenic Hills), and it is unsightly and unsafe in urban areas with a potential escalation in CSG mining incidents and accidents associated with the more intense urban activity (traffic, people etc.), the presence of children, and potential for vandalism. The consequent impact on land and house values for existing land and home owners may be devastating. For many people the home is their largest asset and is often leveraged to support small business. Any devaluation by bank assessors may destroy livelihoods and life savings.

I do not believe that the NSW Government's new regulations for CSG mining will ensure its safe operation here. As the only commercially producing CSG field in NSW, the Camden Gas Project has already been operating under consent conditions. Yet the NSW Government has not been able to ensure compliance, as evidenced by on-going breaches by AGL of its licence conditions, and the discovery of incidents that might not have been reported were it not for community vigilance, such as the Sugarloaf well incident in May 2011 in Menangle that allowed well contents to drift over Sydney's water channel and to nearby Glen Alpine houses.

The proposal poses risks to Sydney's water in general and to the South West in particular that have not been adequately assessed. While AGL claims that the *geology of the Sydney Basin is well known*, AGL's rationale for the constant modification of prior stages of the Camden Gas Project seems to contradict this, as does its admission to the Scenic Hills Association that it does not know where the aquifers here run to but *probably Sydney Harbour*. Potential impacts on Sydney Harbour, on the nearby Sydney Water Catchment, and AGL's proposal to run its gas gathering pipeline along Sydney's Upper Canal on public land are unacceptable risks to Sydney's water, and are an abuse of public property for the benefit of private investors.

AGL will only ever produce about 5% of NSW's gas from the Camden Gas Project according to evidence it gave under oath at the NSW Upper House Inquiry. This does not justify the risks and potential costs to the community, particularly since 150,000+ people already live and work in the immediate affected area, and this is in Sydney's south west growth corridor. It is socially, environmentally and economically unjustified, and has no social licence to operate here.

I object to AGL's project application 09_0048 to mine for coal seam gas (CSG) in Campbelltown and Camden. The key reasons for my objection are stated below.

I am concerned that CSG mining is a technologically-evolving industry whose impacts have not been independently and scientifically fully researched and remain largely unknown. This view is supported by professional organisations and academics in evidence to the NSW Upper House and Senate Inquiries into Coal Seam Gas Mining in 2011 and by subsequent research here and overseas. We have had to rely on the industry for much of our information when the industry has a vested interest in the outcome. AGL is no different. It claims that the Camden Gas Project has been safely operating for 10 years. Yet we understand that impacts on groundwater and air quality have not been adequately monitored, and while AGL has been operating under an Environmental Protection Licence (EPL No. 12003), it has been allowed to self-monitor its compliance, self-investigate incidents and self-report such that we do not know what true impacts it may have had. Third party consultants and external laboratories that are engaged and paid for by the industry are not independent. Nor is any funded or cofunded research by the CSG mining industry. These lessons should have been learnt with asbestos in Australia and with 'Big Tobacco' in the USA. The National Water Commission in its Position Statement (3rd December 2010) said that impacts may emerge over a long time period. I am deeply concerned that the costs of unforeseen problems will be borne by the community and taxpayers after AGL is long gone from the area. This is grossly irresponsible.

Doctors for the Environment Australia claims that health impacts from CSG mining have not been assessed. Preliminary research from Queensland (e.g. by Southern Cross University in Tara) and overseas is deeply concerning, especially where fracking has been used. As at December 2011, 85% of the production wells in the Camden Gas Project had been fracked (evidence from the NSW Upper House Inquiry) with inadequate monitoring of its impacts on water in particular. AGL claims that the use of horizontal wells in the proposed Stage 3 will reduce the need for fracking, but it seems that this is not entirely true since it has reserved the right to frack these wells in the future if/when the technology becomes available. The size of the proposed well clusters and any fracking of horizontal wells are both new and untested here. It will therefore be entirely experimental with unknown outcomes on health and property including the possibility of subsidence under so many urban properties.

I am also concerned about evidence from Queensland and overseas on air quality and the cumulative impact of AGL's expansion into an area that already experiences incidents of unacceptable levels of air pollution (ozone and fine particles) associated with respiratory problems (NSW Environmental Protection Authority). AGL's past performance gives no confidence that it has <u>not</u> already contributed to this or that it can be managed in the future,

having admitted in August this year that it had not conducted continuous air monitoring at its Rosalind Park Gas Treatment Plant for three years in breach of its EPL No.12003.

Allowing CSG mining in areas that are not zoned for heavy industry undermines zoning controls and confidence in the planning process, and creates severe land use conflicts, economic instability and inequity. It will disrupt religious communities whose vocations have so far been protected by the Scenic Hills zoning; it will place undue burden on small rural allotments whose capacity to cope is severely reduced by size (thereby threatening the survival of the entire historic Scenic Hills), and it is unsightly and unsafe in urban areas with a potential escalation in CSG mining incidents and accidents associated with the more intense urban activity (traffic, people etc.), the presence of children, and potential for vandalism. The consequent impact on land and house values for existing land and home owners may be devastating. For many people the home is their largest asset and is often leveraged to support small business. Any devaluation by bank assessors may destroy livelihoods and life savings.

I do not believe that the NSW Government's new regulations for CSG mining will ensure its safe operation here. As the only commercially producing CSG field in NSW, the Camden Gas Project has already been operating under consent conditions. Yet the NSW Government has not been able to ensure compliance, as evidenced by on-going breaches by AGL of its licence conditions, and the discovery of incidents that might not have been reported were it not for community vigilance, such as the Sugarloaf well incident in May 2011 in Menangle that allowed well contents to drift over Sydney's water channel and to nearby Glen Alpine houses.

The proposal poses risks to Sydney's water in general and to the South West in particular that have not been adequately assessed. While AGL claims that the *geology of the Sydney Basin is well known*, AGL's rationale for the constant modification of prior stages of the Camden Gas Project seems to contradict this, as does its admission to the Scenic Hills Association that it does not know where the aquifers here run to but *probably Sydney Harbour*. Potential impacts on Sydney Harbour, on the nearby Sydney Water Catchment, and AGL's proposal to run its gas gathering pipeline along Sydney's Upper Canal on public land are unacceptable risks to Sydney's water, and are an abuse of public property for the benefit of private investors.

AGL will only ever produce about 5% of NSW's gas from the Camden Gas Project according to evidence it gave under oath at the NSW Upper House Inquiry. This does not justify the risks and potential costs to the community, particularly since 150,000+ people already live and work in the immediate affected area, and this is in Sydney's south west growth corridor. It is socially, environmentally and economically unjustified, and has no social licence to operate here.

Potential impacts on Sydney Harbour, on the nearby Sydney Water Catchment, and AGL's proposal to run its gas gathering pipeline along Sydney's Upper Canal on public land are unacceptable risks to Sydney's water, and are an abuse of public property for the benefit of private investors.

AGL will only ever produce about 5% of NSW's gas from the Camden Gas Project according to evidence it gave under oath at the NSW Upper House Inquiry. This does not justify the risks and potential costs to the community, particularly since 150,000+ people already live and work in the immediate affected area, and this is in Sydney's south west growth corridor. It is socially, environmentally and economically unjustified, and has no social licence to operate here.

I object to AGL's project application 09_0048 to mine for coal seam gas (CSG) in Campbelltown and Camden. The key reasons for my objection are stated below.

I am concerned that CSG mining is a technologically-evolving industry whose impacts have not been independently and scientifically fully researched and remain largely unknown. This view is supported by professional organisations and academics in evidence to the NSW Upper House and Senate Inquiries into Coal Seam Gas Mining in 2011 and by subsequent research here and overseas. We have had to rely on the industry for much of our information when the industry has a vested interest in the outcome. AGL is no different. It claims that the Camden Gas Project has been safely operating for 10 years. Yet we understand that impacts on groundwater and air quality have not been adequately monitored, and while AGL has been operating under an Environmental Protection Licence (EPL No. 12003), it has been allowed to self-monitor its compliance, self-investigate incidents and self-report such that we do not know what true impacts it may have had. Third party consultants and external laboratories that are engaged and paid for by the industry are not independent. Nor is any funded or cofunded research by the CSG mining industry. These lessons should have been learnt with asbestos in Australia and with 'Big Tobacco' in the USA. The National Water Commission in its Position Statement (3rd December 2010) said that impacts may emerge over a long time period. I am deeply concerned that the costs of unforeseen problems will be borne by the community and taxpayers after AGL is long gone from the area. This is grossly irresponsible.

Doctors for the Environment Australia claims that health impacts from CSG mining have not been assessed. Preliminary research from Queensland (e.g. by Southern Cross University in Tara) and overseas is deeply concerning, especially where fracking has been used. As at December 2011, 85% of the production wells in the Camden Gas Project had been fracked (evidence from the NSW Upper House Inquiry) with inadequate monitoring of its impacts on water in particular. AGL claims that the use of horizontal wells in the proposed Stage 3 will reduce the need for fracking, but it seems that this is not entirely true since it has reserved the right to frack these wells in the future if/when the technology becomes available. The size of the proposed well clusters and any fracking of horizontal wells are both new and untested here. It will therefore be entirely experimental with unknown outcomes on health and property including the possibility of subsidence under so many urban properties.

I am also concerned about evidence from Queensland and overseas on air quality and the cumulative impact of AGL's expansion into an area that already experiences incidents of unacceptable levels of air pollution (ozone and fine particles) associated with respiratory problems (NSW Environmental Protection Authority). AGL's past performance gives no confidence that it has <u>not</u> already contributed to this or that it can be managed in the future,

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having admitted in August this year that it had not conducted continuous air monitoring at its Rosalind Park Gas Treatment Plant for three years in breach of its EPL No.12003.

Allowing CSG mining in areas that are not zoned for heavy industry undermines zoning controls and confidence in the planning process, and creates severe land use conflicts, economic instability and inequity. It will disrupt religious communities whose vocations have so far been protected by the Scenic Hills zoning; it will place undue burden on small rural allotments whose capacity to cope is severely reduced by size (thereby threatening the survival of the entire historic Scenic Hills), and it is unsightly and unsafe in urban areas with a potential escalation in CSG mining incidents and accidents associated with the more intense urban activity (traffic, people etc.), the presence of children, and potential for vandalism. Preliminary research from Queensland (e.g. by Southern Cross University in Tara) and overseas is deeply concerning, especially where fracking has been used. As at December 2011, 85% of the production wells in the Camden Gas Project had been fracked (evidence from the NSW Upper House Inquiry) with inadequate monitoring of its impacts on water in particular. AGL claims that the use of horizontal wells in the proposed Stage 3 will reduce the need for fracking, but it seems that this is not entirely true since it has reserved the right to frack these wells in the future if/when the technology becomes available. The size of the proposed well clusters and any fracking of horizontal wells are both new and untested here. It will therefore be entirely experimental with unknown outcomes on health and property including the possibility of subsidence under so many urban properties.

I am also concerned about evidence from Queensland and overseas on air quality and the cumulative impact of AGL's expansion into an area that already experiences incidents of unacceptable levels of air pollution (ozone and fine particles) associated with respiratory problems (NSW Environmental Protection Authority). AGL's past performance gives no confidence that it has <u>not</u> already contributed to this or that it can be managed in the future,

having admitted in August this year that it had not conducted continuous air monitoring at its Rosalind Park Gas Treatment Plant for three years in breach of its EPL No.12003.

Allowing CSG mining in areas that are not zoned for heavy industry undermines zoning controls and confidence in the planning process, and creates severe land use conflicts, economic instability and inequity. It will disrupt religious communities whose vocations have so far been protected by the Scenic Hills zoning; it will place undue burden on small rural allotments whose capacity to cope is severely reduced by size (thereby threatening the survival of the entire historic Scenic Hills), and it is unsightly and unsafe in urban areas with a potential escalation in CSG mining incidents and accidents associated with the more intense urban activity (traffic, people etc.), the presence of children, and potential for vandalism. The consequent impact on land and house values for existing land and home owners may be devastating. For many people the home is their largest asset and is often leveraged to support small business. Any devaluation by bank assessors may destroy livelihoods and life savings.

I do not believe that the NSW Government's new regulations for CSG mining will ensure its safe operation here. As the only commercially producing CSG field in NSW, the Camden Gas Project has already been operating under consent conditions. Yet the NSW Government has not been able to ensure compliance, as evidenced by on-going breaches by AGL of its licence conditions, and the discovery of incidents that might not have been reported were it not for community vigilance, such as the Sugarloaf well incident in May 2011 in Menangle that allowed well contents to drift over Sydney's water channel and to nearby Glen Alpine houses.

The proposal poses risks to Sydney's water in general and to the South West in particular that have not been adequately assessed. While AGL claims that the *geology of the Sydney Basin is well known*, AGL's rationale for the constant modification of prior stages of the Camden Gas Project seems to contradict this, as does its admission to the Scenic Hills Association that it does not know where the aquifers here run to but *probably Sydney Harbour*. Potential impacts on Sydney Harbour, on the nearby Sydney Water Catchment, and AGL's proposal to run its gas gathering pipeline along Sydney's Upper Canal on public land are unacceptable risks to Sydney's water, and are an abuse of public property for the benefit of private investors.

AGL will only ever produce about 5% of NSW's gas from the Camden Gas Project according to evidence it gave under oath at the NSW Upper House Inquiry. This does not justify the risks and potential costs to the community, particularly since 150,000+ people already live and work in the immediate affected area, and this is in Sydney's south west growth corridor. It is socially, environmentally and economically unjustified, and has no social licence to operate here.
