- The adequacy of the methodology used to describe direct impacts is questionable. The lack of a development footprint by which impact could be measured according to 'whole of government' guidelines gives uncertainty to the outcomes.
- Levels of indirect impact haven significantly under-estimated. Using fox predation as a measure, pre-mitigation levels of indirect impact should be at least doubled in magnitude, based on available evidence.
- Survey effort for some key fauna species appears to be deficient and would have adversely affected the ability of the EIS to adequately account some species.
- A NSW and Commonwealth-listed threatened ecological community White Box Blakely's Red Gum-Yellow Box Woodland (and derived native grassland) has been mis-identified and presumed to be not present in the study area. New data confirms its presence along Bohena Creek.
- The description of important habitat for a number of key fauna, such as the Regent Honeyeater, Pilliga Mouse, Koala, Black-striped Wallaby and Five-clawed Worm-skink does not appear to be accurate.
- New information regarding the presence of the Koala in the study area discounts the assertion made in the EIS that it is not currently present.
- Due to deficiencies in the in the survey and assessment for two 'matters for further consideration' (Regent Honeyeater and Five-clawed Worm-skink) statutory requirements under the NSW Biodiversity Offset Policy have not been met.
- Direct impacts upon Brigalow Park State Conservation Area remains uncertain as do the magnitude of indirect impacts upon the adjacent Nature Reserve and existing corridors.
- A Biodiversity Offset Strategy does not provide any surety for how well it will 'retire' the impact of the Project because the strategy provided in the EIS does not provide any like-or-like land-based offsets apart from an unproven rehabilitation plan and rests on the hypothetical efficacy of a feral animal control proposal. The suitability of the offset package with respect to the statutory requirements under the NSW Biodiversity Offset Policy is poor

Based on these findings, the Secretary for the Environment should reject this part of the overall Project assessment as being data-deficient and inadequate under the terms of NSW Biodiversity Offset Policy or request the matters outlined above be addressed by the proponent.

Not in Australia, and not around the world. In fact, there's the opposite: a global glut of it. BHP has already admitted there's enough gas in Bass Strait to supply the east coast "indefinitely". And globally, by the end of 2015 the gas industry was capable of producing about 25 per cent more liquefied gas than the world wanted to import.

By 2020, production capacity looks set to increase another 30 per cent. Even if demand is increasing - and that's not absolutely clear - it's not keeping pace with that. The world's biggest importer, Japan, has been reducing its demand for several years, and according to its own government, will be buying 30 per cent less gas by 2030 as it turns its focus to renewables.

We are being fed a false 'crisis' in an attempt to squash opposition to unconventional gas extraction in states that have dared to ban or discourage it, and to hype up production in states where it has been allowed to proceed. The story of CSG extraction in the US is clear and has alarmed people in Australia. With good reason there is widespread community opposition to the Narrabri Gas Project proposal.

Very little is known about the long-term effects of this industry, and where there is some knowledge, estimated figures vary 50 much that no sane decision could be based upon them. If we look at water usage, for instance, the Gas companies estimate annual water usage at 61 Gigalitres, whereas the Federal Government "Water Group" estimates vary from a low of 488.8 Gl to a high of 1500 GII These are figures for the Great Artesian Basin and its aquifers, which underly Narrabri, and must form part of the assessment to be done by the Department of Planning and Environment.

The project will, if approved, drill through a groundwater recharge zone of the Great Artesian Basin and threaten food and fibre production in the Narrabri region.

Waste salt is produced by the extraction process, and the gas companies admit that they have no idea what to do with it! The amount is of concern, and, logically, it varies by as much as the waste water figures vary. So we have the gas companies estimate over 30 years at 7.8 million tonnes, and the government figures at a low of 48 million tonnes and a high of 154 million tonnes over the same period. How can we make a decision with such variance?

In the specific case of Narrabri, the project would:

1. Extract over 35 billion litres of salt laden groundwater, much of it in the first five years. This water will be treated and will generate almost 500,000 tonnes of salt waste, for which there is no safe disposal plan.

"The Queensland Government says that if CSG mining causes groundwater levels to drop below specified "trigger" points then companies must "make good" to affected water users. The trigger points are:
a five-metre drop in bore-water levels for sandstone and fractured rock aquifers;
a two-metre drop in bore-water levels for alluvial aquifers; and
a 20-centimetre drop in the water table surrounding springs.
While the Queensland Government has set out the make-good arrangements, there is concern over how these will actually work in practice.

For instance, Rabobank wants more certainty on the question of how CSG will pay for future reparations because some of the impacts may not be evident for decades. The agri-bank wants CSG companies to take out insurance for this.

Will similar, or stricter guidelines on water usage be imposed for the Narrabri project, and will they be strictly enforced, or will there be the same doubt as exists in Queensland?

We must not allow this project to go ahead, we must use the time and resources to work on sustainable energy projects instead.

There is no evidence provided which shows there is no connectivity between aquifer strata. Recent studies document migration of coal bed methane to the surface (https://www.nature.com/articles/srep15996). All well casings will fail in time. How will we maintain the well integrity after Santos have gone? We will have 850 potential leaking wells through the GAB
(http://www.pnas.org/content/111/30/1095S.full). Santos want to release treated water into Bohena Creek during high and moderate flows, ignoring in their EIS that this creek is a recognised surface groundwater ecosystem (Australian GDE Atlas). Santo have ignored pubic health risks from fugitive emissions, including from methane, sulphides and ozone. How can this gas be so clean when all others are so dirty? Recent work has shown that the levels of methane emissions from CSG operations are high to pose significant risks to greenhouse gas levels. The region is an astronomy destination providing jobs, business and tourism. Flaring gas and dust creation is a huge risk to this sector and the region. Fragmenting the bush of the Pilliga forest will add to pressure from fox predation on threatened species. No control program will compensate the additional areas of forest which will see increased fox activity.
