BLOCK N-KINDERGARTEN BLOCK

In times past the local environment around Medowie was favourable for the 'hunter-gatherer' lifestyle of the Worimi people. It provided them with an abundance of 'foods, medicines and raw materials for a variety of traditional tools and implements.

"Fishing spears were made from the flowering stem of the Gymea Lily or the grass tree and tipped with 4 prongs of ironbark. The lot was held together with Yellow Gum (grass tree)," (Portstephens.nsw.gov.au). Boomerangs were made with Wild Myrtle. The wild Cape Gooseberries that grew on Cabbage Tree Island were highly sought after. Fern root and daisy yam were eaten when fish were scarce.

Medowie is positioned on the edge of the Tilligerry State Conservation Area where many of these species of vegetation still remain.

The colour green within our interior, symbolises growth, abundance and a sense of safety.





BLOCK M-YEAR 1 AND 2 BLOCK

This is an area that contains one of the most visible cultural sites on Worimi land, the Middens. The Middens are shell deposits found within the sand, and are areas where food remains and cooking implements were discarded after meals. They are an archaeological treasure trove giving us an insight into the life of the Worimi people. The Middens at Birubi contain pipi shell, mud whelk and cockle shells. Worimi Conservation Lands NSW say, "Some also contain stone artefacts from tool making and bird, fish and animal bone"

Traditionally, the Worimi people used this beach to travel between the northern and southern parts of the Worimi Conservation lands, from Nelson Bay to Stockton.

We are choosing to represent the dunes in yellow, a colour that evokes hope, optimism and happiness.

BLOCK O-YEAR 3 AND 4 BLOCK

The marine environment of Port Stephens was an important source of food for the Worimi people.

Pacific and Sydney Rock Oysters were a large part of the Worimi peoples diet. Along the foreshore of Lemon Tree Passage lies an ancient Aboriginal Shell Midden that travels for more than 2 km and is up to 1m deep. The Worimi people made canoes from the bark of Stringy Barks, that can still be seen lining the shores of Little Beach. Fishing lines were made from the inner linings of the inner bark of Kurrajong Trees or Twisted Sally Wattle and sealed with the sap of the Bloodwood tree. Hooks were made from ground down oyster shells.

The cool blue tones of Port Stephens, will be depicted to reference a sense of peace, calmness and harmony.







YEAR 5 AND 6 BLOCK

Today serves as the areas water supply and is a man-made dam catching water from the Williams River and covering an area once know as the Grahamstown Moors. A number small towns were subsumed by the dam, including Ferodale and Ringwood, which survive on today in the street names of Medowie. Many of the residents of these townships also relocated to Medowie when the dam was formed.

For the more senior spaces of the Primary school we are choosing to represent the fusion of natural resources with man made structure that the dam represents. A little hint toward a more industrial existence with orange as the focus, a colour which can represent vibrancy, movement and energy.
















larrakia / darwin








BLOCK F TAS awabakal / newcastle
