The Mount Pleasant Optimisation Project

MACH Energy propose to double the rate of run of mine coal production at their Mount Pleasant operations and seek a 22 year extension to their mine life (to 2048).

This proposal poses significant environmental impacts on surrounding land uses and the townships of Aberdeen and Muswellbrook. The community here has been required to comment on a 6,500 page Environmental Impact Statement, which is highly technical in nature, in a very limited time frame. In our view, this does not help engender genuine community engagement nor give communities, recently recovering from drought and currently suffering from the effects of COVID, sufficient time to properly assess the impacts of significant (and numerous) mining proposals which will impact on their livelihoods and futures.

We support the Hunter Thoroughbred Breeders' Association submission in opposition to this project and highlight the following concerns with this proposal:

- An inadequate economic analysis which underestimates the costs and over estimates the benefits of the project;
- The absence of cumulative impact assessments importantly for air quality and water sources in the Hunter contrary to the Secretary's Environmental Assessment Requirements (SEARs) and NSW Guidelines;
- Unacceptable air quality impacts exacerbating already unacceptably dusty and polluted conditions in the Upper Hunter;
- Unacceptable resulting health impacts for humans and horses;
- Deficient surface and groundwater assessments and an undesirable final void that will take 300 years to fill, 500 years to reach equilibrium and will increase in salinity, year on year;
- Unacceptable visual impacts on residents, towns and roads including a overburden dump that is 6km long and 360m high;
- Deleterious impacts on investment and economic diversity in the region;
- Unassessed impacts on the Hunter's Equine Critical Industry Cluster; and
- Incompatibility of this project with surrounding agricultural land uses.

In addition to not complying with the SEARs and NSW Guidelines, this project is at odds with key Government policies aimed at protecting the Hunter's equine industry cluster; protecting the environment; protecting our cultural and Aboriginal heritage and fostering growth and diversity as we transition away from coal and towards more sustainable, zero emissions future.
